Rev. David Wills, D. D., will preach in the Presbyterian church at seven o'clock this evening.

The clouds wept copiously yesterday, and at this writing it seems to have set in for a steady rain.

According to the Statesman the state officers at the capitol improve their leisure hours by riding upon bicycles.

The Mississippi and State of California went to sea yesterday, the former for the Sound, the latter to San Francisco.

Rev. Fred'k Ewald will hold divine service in the Baptist church, in the German language at two o'clock this afternoon.

Thos. Parker, captain of the Canby, was married to Miss Mary L. Scannell, at Walla Walla, last Sunday. The newly-married pair came down on Friday evening's boat.

Rev. Dr. Wills has received orders to proceed to California, and will leave on Wednesday. He will deliver another lecture in the Presbyterian church on Tuesday evening.

Thos. H. Bronts, congressional delegate from Washington Territory, was among our callers yesterday, en route to Washington. He is not very sanguine over the prospect of statehood for our sister Territory this session, but thinks she will get in time to help elect the next president.

The Olympia board of trade is discussing the propriety of creating a joint stock company, the object of which shall be to purchase the requisite machinery, implements, etc., to carry on a systematic business in prospecting for the precious metals. The machinery will be of such a character that it can be readily transported from point to point as occasion may require.

The commissioner of the general land office says, relative to the location of soldiers' homestead rights on noncontiguous land, that the land office does not construe the law so as to require tracts entered to be contiguous. In regard to homesteads he holds it as a fundamental principle of the laws that entries be made only for use, occupation and benefit of the homesteaded party.

The oldest inhabitant of Olympia fails to remember when the bay was so full of dog salmon as it is at the present time. Every stream putting into salt water is literally choked with them, and it is not exaggerating to say that wagon loads of their carcasses can be shoveled up, in many places, from a hundred square rods of ground. Like the transit of Venus, such a phenomenon is of rare occurrence.

Council Proceedings.

The city council met last Friday evening, Mayor Hahn in the chair. Present—Councilmen Case, Carruthers, Taylor and Wright; absent—Gray. In attendance—C. W. Fulton, city attorney, and F. C. Norris, auditor and clerk. A communication from Chief Engineer Barry in regard to the drainage at the crossing near No. 1's engine house was referred to committee on streets. An ordinance providing for the improvement of Astor street, was passed under suspension of the rules. An ordinance declaring the probable cost of such improvement and assessing the same upon adjacent property, was passed. An ordinance "authorizing a contract to be made by the committee on streets and public ways with the Columbia Water Co., and granting said company the right to construct water works within the city, and to use the streets and public ways for the purpose of laying pipes there," was read first and second times, and on motion referred to committee on fire and water. On motion council adjourned.

Six Gentlemen of Benton.

We have been informed that there are six gentlemen in Benton county, says the Corvallis Leader, all well known and highly respected, who held a conference in this city on Wednesday for organizing a company to build a schooner for the smuggling trade. We were furnished their names, but for prudential reasons will refrain from publishing them at this time.

The plan, as discussed at this meeting, is to build a large steam yacht at Yaquina Bay, ostensibly for the coasting trade. She is to be very substantial, to carry a large amount of canvas, and be supplied with the most improved and powerful machinery, with the view of making her the swiftest craft on northwest waters.

The crew is to be tried and fearless men, each bound by what is known among pirates as the "black oath." After making a few trips along the Oregon coast she will run to Vancouver island, where the principal cargoes of contraband goods are to be secured. Returning, they will land the articles in small quantities at the mouth of the Siletz river, Cape Fonweather, and Yaquina and Alsea bays. They will also undertake to arrange with vessels engaged in the Portland-China trade to bring opium from China, which will be packed in watertight barrels and rubber sacks, and thrown overboard two or three days' sail outside of the Columbia bar, to be picked up by the schooner, which will be cruising in the vicinity. They expect to do a thriving business.
