The largest telescope in the world will soon be completed for the Russian Government by the firm of Alvan Clark & Sons, of Cambridge. This largest of all glasses is for the Russian Observatory at Polkovo, which was founded in 1839 by the Czar Nicholas.

GEN. SHERMAN, in his report for the past year, says that the fear of exceeding the limit of 25,000 men in the army, or the difficulty of enlisting men in these prosperous times, has kept the army below what the honor or the necessity of

the country demands, and he advises the change of the limit to 30,000. The troops during the transition period on the frontier, he says, have lived in holes in the ground, in houses made of green cottonwood logs, infested by vermin, in temporary shanties, generally without a murmur; but now this battle with poverty is over, or nearly so, and he appeals to congress to confer on the president, the secretary of war, or on a board of general officers, the power to designate the places of strategic importance at which to erect suitable permanent buildings for properly quartering the troops.

Cedar Street Improvement.
