Seattle on Deck.

The inhabitants of "The Queen City of the Sound," are of the opinion that they ought to begin building a railroad. At a late meeting of the chamber of commerce of that city, among other speeches, Judge Lewis said: "I went to Iowa in 1854. On one occasion I started on a journey. Before going to bed I paid my fare over the road, and left orders to be called in time for the coach. By some oversight I did not wake up until eight o'clock, and found out that I was left and had to walk twenty-four miles to my destination. Now fellow citizens and members of the chamber of commerce, I've just found out, within the past ten days, that we, as a community, are left, and we have paid our fare, too. I don't believe the people realize what is going on. I went to Tacoma the other day and saw immense coal bunkers being built there. I supposed, of course, they were for the Central Pacific Railroad company, which owns a coal mine up the Payallup, but on inquiry I found they were being built by the Oregon Improvement company for the purpose of handling our Green River coal by way of Tacoma. When I came home I took a map and looked into this thing, and I found that we had been buying and paying for the right of way for the main line of the Northern Pacific railroad, and had sent commissioners clear up into Pierce county, to secure a right of way for a hostile corporation. I learned that no less than \$300,000 have been expended by the N.P.R.R. Co. during the past year in trying to find a practical pass down the Green river to Tacoma, and that not less than eleven surveys have been made, and still they have failed to find a good route as exists by way of Cedar river. I asked a prominent man in the company why they did not accept the Cedar river route, knowing it to be the most practicable, and he replied: 'Mr. Prescott says the route comes too near Seattle.' The Northern Pacific company will, as they can find a practicable route, build a line up so as to carry the Green river coal to Tacoma. Mr. Villard put his hands in the pockets of the people of Portland, and took out six millions of dollars, but in return for that he has increased the value of their property twenty-five million dollars, so that they were gainers, rather than losers, by the operation. Let us raise the necessary \$200,000 within the next ten days, and commence throwing dirt by the first of January."

American Sea Captains.

Mention was made in this journal of the difficulty experienced by the master of the ship Lucy A. Nickels in getting out of port with his crew Monday. Just before the vessel got under way the crew refused to do duty, but the energetic captain obtained the help of a gang of men from shore, and started on his voyage to Cork. A master needs a good deal of pluck to start on so long a voyage with twenty-five or thirty mutinous men, who show their ugly disposition toward him before they get out of port. It is probable that when they are fairly at sea, and the whisky is thoroughly out of them, they will behave better; but any except a determined commander would have waited to make sure before he sailed. This little incident, occurring at a time when there is so much talk about the revival of American shipping, naturally serves as a reminder of how much of the past success of our merchant marine is accounted for by the character of our ship captains, and how much of any future glories it may win will be due to the same cause. The necessities of sea-faring life develop a peculiarly energetic and self-reliant class of men, and it has been the boast of this country that American master mariners were superior in intelligence and other essential qualities than any other nation. Some of the obstacles now often mentioned as hampering the successful competition of American vessels with those of other nations—such as higher pay and better food of seamen than on foreign ships—are such as have always had to be contended with, and in times past it was done successfully. American ships have generally sailed shorthanded, as compared with French, Italian, Portuguese or even English ships, and the American sailor is expected to do more work than any other. It was only by this extra efficiency of masters and men that American merchant ships or whaling ships were able to compete, with the odds in other things so much against them. It is possible that American ships will never again sail with such a class of seamen as used to go out from New Bedford, New London and other ports, on the whalers—young, brave, ambitious, and stimulated to additional exertions by working on a "lay" of the profits instead of for wages. Seamen are now a motley crowd of mingled nationalities, but it is a fortunate thing that the breed of American master mariners is not extinct. A few months ago one of them who found his ship delayed at this port for lack of one man to complete the crew, gave evidence of his grit by placing his brother in command and himself shipping as a common seaman. American shipping will revive some day if that kind of men continue to command it.—S. F. Alta.
