Cleveland on Politics.

In a recent New York speech, Grover Cleveland, the newly-elected governor of that state, said: "I am quite certain that the late demonstration did not spring from any pre-existing love for the party that was called to power, nor did the people place the affairs of state in our hands to be by them forgotten. They voted for themselves and in their own interest. If we retain their confidence we must deserve it, and we may be sure that they will call on us to give an account of our stewardship. We shall utterly fail to read aright the signs of the times if we are not fully convinced that parties are but instruments through which the people work their will, and that people desert or destroy them. The vanquished have lately learned these things, and the victors will act wisely if they profit by the lesson. Let us not forget that the intelligent, thinking and reading people will look to the party which they put in power to supply all their various needs and wants, and the party which keeps pace with the developments and progress of the times, which keeps in sight its landmarks, and yet observes those things which are in advance, and which will continue true to the people as well as to its traditions, will be the dominant party of the future."

The World's cable from London says Mr. Gladstone's probable retirement from the chancellorship of the exchequer and then from public life with the consequent reorganization of the ministry is now being much discussed in London papers. The premier's nearest friends are in doubt what his intentions really are. He would like to resign while himself and his party are at the zenith of strength and popularity, and yet he wishes to retain the power which he has always found such a fascination in wielding. The Times puts forth a feeling for the Marquis of Hartington as premier upon Mr. Gladstone's retirement but this choice would not be by any means satisfactory to the radical element.

A Washington despatch says Ben Butler is not giving Democrats much comfort. The other day he was in a street car and Mrs. Blaine was there, too. They engaged in conversation. She congratulated him upon his election as governor of Massachusetts. "Yes," replied Butler, "the Republican governor of Massachusetts."

He then went on to explain, in answer to her look of surprise, that he did not credit his election to the Democrats. He was elected because the people of the state were dissatisfied with the Republican party management. He was the people's governor, and should not forget the fact that a majority of the people in Massachusetts were Republicans.

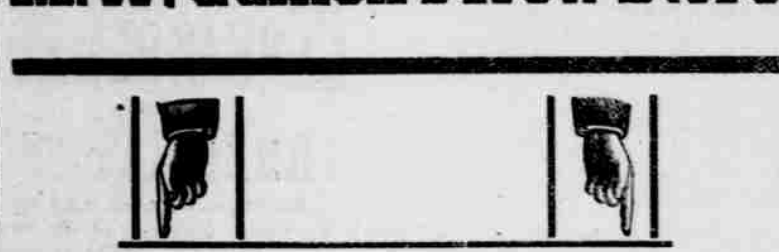
