A Commendable Enterprise.

Nothing so binds communities together as easy and rapid means of communication. Nothing helps to build a country up and give it the requisite population so quickly as lines of travel by land and water, that penetrate into isolated regions and bring the inhabitants a market for their produce. To the north of us lies a vast and fertile region, of great natural wealth and almost unlimited resource. We refer to Pacific, Chehalis and Wahkiakum counties. By the enterprise of certain residents of Astoria and Pacific county a regular line of travel has been established between this city and the headwaters of the Chehalis, and now from the Seattle Post-Intelligencer we learn that it is the intention of the Port Blakely Mill company to build a railroad from the Sound to the Chehalis. The company own a large quantity of timber in that direction—22,000 acres in one body, and it is said its object in building the road, will be to make their timber available, and incidentally to develop the country and share in the benefits of the immense transportation certain to arise. The company has definitely concluded many of its plans, and has determined to build from Skookum Bay to the Chehalis river, near Elma. The distance is about eighteen miles. The grades will be comparatively light, the worst being 110 feet to the mile, for a short distance. The right of way is already secured. Not only will the road be equipped for log hauling in the best known style, but it will also be equipped for the freight and passenger traffic; the whole cost being about \$400,000.

This affords grand opportunity to that vast empire comprised in western Washington. With a line of boats from Astoria to Skookum Bay, Gray's Harbor, and points on the Chehalis river to Montesano and Elma, and a railroad running to the Sound to connect therewith, that country will receive an impetus that will put it forward half a century in advance of its present status.

The consular service for the last year netted the government a profit of \$51,000, the expenditures having been \$838,000 and the receipts \$889,000. This is, of course, a tax on shipping equal the total of receipts. Like the burdens imposed on inventive genius through the heavy fees of the patent bureau, it is often too very serious objection. The British government lays no burden on the commerce of Great Britain for support of the consular system, paying the entire cost of it out of the general fund. It appears to be the policy of our government to keep our foreign trade and our ocean carrying trade down to their present rather contemptible limits.

There are but two colored men elected to the next congress, and it is interesting to know that the name of one is Mr. O'Hara, of North Carolina, and of the other, Mr. Lynch, of Mississippi. This fact may or may not be symbolic of the final settlement of the color question in America. A century hence there may be no black race in this country, while the whole or a large section of the population may be a little "off color."

The old reliable Wells, Fargo express company do not intend to give up their business on this northwest coast without a tussle. They have commenced proceedings in the U. S. circuit court, praying that the O. R. & N. Co., and N. P. R. R. Co., be restrained from interference with their established business.

The late Thurlow Weed was the originator of two sayings that are likely to be permanently retained in our political parlance—"a good enough Morgan until after election," and the use of "roor-back" in place of the French "canard."

By a majority of two the Portland board of trade has very properly declared in favor of abrogating the Hawaiian treaty, which permits Speckles to cinch the sugar consumers of this coast.

A WASHINGTON despatch says: It is quite probable a couple of new states may be admitted, and perhaps three. Washington, Dakota and New Mexico, will make very vigorous efforts for admission. Already favorable reports have been made upon Washington and Dakota. Their admission would give the Republicans increased strength in the senate where the majority is so small as to be quite a serious matter. Representative men from New Mexico are also here, urging the admission of that territory, but as its politics are a little uncertain, it will not probably be successful in its efforts.




