Hurray for Arthur!

A WASHINGTON despatch of the 13th says: President Arthur gave Don Cameron a valuable lesson to day. This morning there arrived in this city Hiram Young the stalwart editor of the Evening Dispatch of York, Pa. He came for the post-office at that place. He is a friend of Cameron, and when he mentioned the subject to the senator the latter said he would have it attended to right away. Cameron and Young called at the White House. Cameron explained the matter briefly and then said: "I would like to have this man's nomination made right off, as he wants to go back home to-night."

The president asked: "Where are his papers?" "Why, he has none! I endorse him. Is not that enough?"

The president then said firmly "I cannot appoint Mr. Young unless he be endorsed by the Republican members of the delegation and some evidence is filed here showing that Young is endorsed by the business men of York."

Cameron went away in a very thoughtful mood, while the last heard of Young he was round hunting for members of the Pennsylvania delegation.

"We do not want cheap whisky; give us cheap clothing," says the Palmetto, South Carolina, Post, in an editorial address to the congressional delegate from that state. The same journal calls on congress to "lighten up the burden of taxation," and to "take it off the necessities of life and place it on the luxuries."

It urges that whisky is "not essential to any man's comfort until he has bestialized himself, and it should be the constant aim of legislation not to foster vice by removing its barriers, but to derive as much good as possible from evils." That is sound doctrine. The use of liquor as a beverage, is an evil in that it works more injury than benefit to mankind. Experience has shown that its suppression is impossible, but that it can be readily made to do a great deal of good in "partial compensation for the evil effects it produces. Indeed the liquor interest does not complain of taxation, but submits to large exactions with becoming grace. To repeal the liquor taxes would be equivalent to raising eight millions a year by taxing the food and clothing of the poor, and presenting that sum to the consumers of liquors as a free and unasked gift.

FRIENDS of the Nicaragua canal bill have begun to press their measure before congress. The state department regards it as a wise policy to have such a bill as is now pending pass. Congress is not asked for money or guarantee bonds, but the bill provides that the government shall insure a profit of 30 per cent. upon the capital stock, not exceed \$75,000,000, in return for which the canal company binds itself to allow the free passage of American war vessels and mails for two hundred years. They concede also a limit of charges upon shipping which shall pass through the canal. Outside circles most directly interested in the canal project say they have little confidence in the passage of the bill at this session.

The official records show that the immigration to the United States during the fiscal year which ended with last June amounted to 789,003. About one hundred and twenty thousand more immigrants were received here than in 1880, when the number of arrivals was greater by over two hundred thousand than in any previous year. For the three fiscal years 1880, 1881, 1882 the arrivals have amounted to 1,915,691, or nearly as many as the total for the eight years just previous, and about one-fifth as many as the total during the whole period from 1820 to 1880.

SENATOR LOGAN says he will press action on his bill introduced last session amending the law in relation to the restriction of Chinese immigration so as to allow Chinese to pass through the coun-

try if they desire to do so, on their return from the west and to China. Certain tobacco growers in Connecticut and Massachusetts, who fought the Chinese Restriction bill last summer, are now feeling the effects of coolie labor themselves. They are petitioning congress daily to press the bill increasing the duty on all tobacco growers elsewhere than in North America to \$1 per pound. They are specially seeking the exclusion of Sumatra tobacco, grown in the East Indies, which is cultivated by coolies. The cost of production there is nominally small. It is mostly used for cigar wrappers. The advantages of coolie labor, now that it begins to worry them, have changed their opinions.

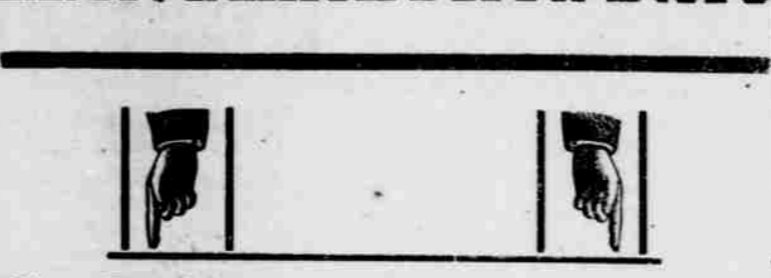
