FRIENDS of the Nicaragua canal bill have began to press their measure before congress. The state department regards it as a wise policy to have such a bill as is now pending pass. Congress is not asked for money or guarantee bonds, but the bill provides that the government shall insure a profit of 30 per cent. upon the capital stock, new caceed \$75,-000,009, in return for which the canal company binds itself to allow the free passage of American war vessels and mails for two hundred years. 




