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Nearly every interior town in the state complains of "tramps."

Idaho and eastern Oregon papers report a mild winter thus far.

Boston elected a Democratic mayor by 2,000 majority last Wednesday.

Skulls and thigh bones found in barrels along the road horrify the Portlandites.

A Jacksonville farmer raised cane enough on one acre of land to make 270 gallons of molasses.

Mrs. Felix Scott, one of the pioneers of the state, died at her residence in Polk county last Sunday.

The Salem Fire Department intend to have a big time over the housing of their new engine next Tuesday.

A powder factory is the latest enterprise talked of in Portland. It will be a bonanza for the newspaper men.

The Idaho started to sea yesterday noon. The Queen of the Pacific is due this morning from San Francisco.

The first locomotive crossed the line from Colorado into Utah, over the Denver and Rio Grande road, last Wednesday.

The grate bars of the river boats owned by the O. R. & N. Co., are to be altered so that coal will be used as fuel in future.

John A. Carr, of Portland, was arrested last Wednesday charged with the murder of a man in Oroville, Cal., nineteen years ago.

The sum of \$3,100 has been recommended by the department of the interior for supporting the Forest Grove Indian school next year.

The average rate of speed on the N. P. R. R. is 25 miles an hour. This is better than the C. P., where trains poke along with the brakes on.

We are in daily receipt of requests from eastern parties for papers, and information respecting this vicinity. There will be a large immigration this way next spring.

German Catholics have purchased a section of land near Graves' Butte, Marion county, paying therefor \$30,000. It is the intention of the society to erect a monastery.

Captain Gage, formerly of the barkentine Portland, has been assigned to the command of the ship City of Brooklyn, at British Columbia, recently purchased by Simpson Brothers.

Rev. Winfield Scott delivers a lecture at Ilwaco this evening. Subject, "Cortez' conquest of Mexico." A choir has been formed from volunteers of Co. E., 21st regiment and others.

The railroad conference, now in session, reported last Wednesday that there be no more railroads built in the northwest. By "the northwest" they mean Minnesota, Wisconsin and Dakota.

The late storm spread over a large area of the state and did considerable damage to roads and bridges in the Willamette valley. Thirteen inches of rain fell here during the thirty-six hours of the storm's duration.

J. E. Edmiston, says the Dayton Chronicle, will ship seven dozen live prairie chickens to New Zealand if they can be procured this winter. The New Zealand Insurance company intend to turn them loose there to see if they will propagate in that country.

The Josie Troop cleared yesterday and goes to join the fleet that floats in Baker's bay. One more vessel will make the even dozen awaiting exit. "There's plenty of water on the bar, what is wanted is more tug." That remark is not so frequent in our interior exchanges as it used to be.

Recently there has been shipped from this port to Salem, Oregon, by the Walla Walla Democrat, 4,500 pounds of corn cob, for use in manufacturing vinegar. Saturday another order was received for the shipment of a ton of cobs. It seems a little singular that manufacturers in the Willamette valley should send clear to eastern Washington, which has never been noted as a corn country, for cobs.

At the last government letting of mail contracts for this section some singularly low bids were made for carrying mails by non-residents, to whom several bids were awarded. Several in this county are now being carried at prices far below the actual cost of transportation, and if the contractors expected to have the service expedited they were mistaken, for the last year's developments in "the star route frauds" have made the government chary of granting increased remuneration. H. S. Campbell, of Salt Lake, who had the contract for carrying a bi-weekly mail between here and Olympia, threw up his contract yesterday morning, alleging as his reason that he "can't make anything on it."

"One morning" says Tom Merry in the Sunday Oregonian, "I was on the Pacific Mail dock, taking a look at the new steamer San Jose. She is a trifle longer than the Columbia but not as large a carrier. The second officer, at request of Capt. Joe Cavarly, showed me over the ship, which is one of the latest turned out by Roach. On my expressing my belief that while she was as good and able-bodied a ship as I had ever seen, she was inferior to the Columbia in her equipment, the officer answered: 'Yes, and you might have said that this company has no ships equal to the Columbia, if you except the two Australian ships. Outside of the Sydney trade, this company has no trade as good as that of Oregon. For the sake of getting rid of the Stephens and two or three other old hulks, they sold a route that is to-day the best in America for its length. Its passenger travel is at the rate of eight dollars per day for cabin passage, while ours hardly averages five. The Savannah line is the best out of New York and it does not compare with the Oregon line, either for passengers or freight. There is a great deal of outcom: to your state, sir, and it is a pity our folks had not the patience to wait for it.'"

Agents for the Oregon Short Line are negotiating for a large tract of land below Albina for terminal purposes. Jay Gould has given orders to push the road to deep water as fast as money and muscle will do it. They will cut through Burnt River pass on a grade just above the O. R. & N. line. This grade through the pass will necessitate the blasting through solid rock the entire length of the pass and will cost many thousands of dollars more than the lower grade of the O.
