—Late San Francisco charters are thirty-five shillings to U. K. —A \$7,000 fire at Seattle last Saturday, burned the North Pacific brewery.

—The Archbishop of Canterbury is a member of the Liverpool chamber of commerce. —The sunrise drill of the Astoria Fire department yesterday was a surprise to some of the boys.

—Frank Crocker, a Yakima stage driver was drowned while crossing the Klickitat, last Wednesday. —Attention is directed to the adv. of Jay Rial's Uncle Tom's Cabin troupe, which appeared here last summer.

—Mrs. Edward Carney, of Portland, got tired of living, last Sunday morning, and threw herself into the Willamette. —Hanson Bros. are putting up a saw factory 50x80 feet near Kinney's cannery, and will be ready for business about the 1st of next February.

—George Stevens, Daniel Simpson and David Medine, were drowned last Saturday in Yaquina bay, while crossing for the government works to Newport in a skiff. —Lewis G. Haven has built a little steamer, the "Relic," which is now ready for business. She is thirty-four feet long, eleven feet beam, and draws forty-two inches. See adv.

—Astoria Chamber of Commerce will hold a special meeting to-morrow evening to consider and adopt a memorial to congress for speedy action on improvement of the bar. —The Portlandites are disappointed at the failure to raise capital to build a large hotel. There isn't much sympathy about capital; it is purely a question of per cent. and security.

—Remember the special auction sale of fine bedroom suit, secretary, side board and other household furniture, by E. C. Holden, at Dr. J. C. Shafter's rooms over Conn's drug store, at 2 p. m. to-day. —The report of the chief engineer is in the hands of the committee on commerce, and when published we will know what recommendation the board of visiting engineers to the Columbia river bar has made in full.

—The Langrigh Hall, which sailed from Astoria June 20th, with a \$248,000 cargo, and made the voyage safely to Liverpool, started on her return voyage but was lost on Tuskar Rock, off the Wexford coast, last Friday, and twenty-four of her crew drowned. —The latest amusement in rural districts back east, this season, is "cat shaking." After a quilting bee is over a cat is put upon the quilt. The young folks take hold of the corners and toss the animal till it jumps off upon one of the young ladies, who is then crowned queen of the bee.

—Those who were along the docks in the bright sunlight of yesterday afternoon, witnessed the unusual spectacle of six vessels in port that were flying the stars and stripes. The Mississippi and State of California came in; the Birker cleared for Queens-town; the Henry Villard goes up this morning. —The brick work on the Odd Fellows building will be completed—weather favorable, to-morrow. Yesterday began the work of putting on the roof; to-day the workmen will begin cementing and putting up the cornice. The work has been pushed ahead as fast as possible, the showery weather making all progress necessarily slow.

—A discouraging object of attack for astroph hunters is Mrs. Christine Nilsson. One of the fraternity, album in hand, managed to gain access to her parlor in the Palace Hotel, San Francisco, the other day. But the moment he made his errand known she arose in all her dignity, and pointing to the door, exclaimed: "You go right out of that door, this instant!" And he went. —A tramp offered to drink as much liquor as anybody in an Eranville bar-room would pay for, and proved it by emptying a full tumbler. He then said he would drink twelve glasses of beer as fast as they could be drawn, and succeeded in that undertaking. A few minutes afterward, in another saloon, he drank two brimming tumblers of whisky. Then he died. —Remember the Entertainment at Liberty Hall to-night.

FIAT LUX. The Astoria Gas Light Company. THREE MILES OF PIPE.

The barkentine North Bend was yesterday discharging some fifteen thousand linear feet of iron three inch and four inch pipe on Main-street wharf, for the Astoria Gas Light company. There is also aboard a lot of meters, rotors, tools, etc., for use in the plant of the affair. The San Francisco partners write that the rest of the outfit will be sent on the next vessel of Simpson's line, and an engineer will arrive this week, to begin operations at once. Two lots have been secured between here and upper Astoria, and the necessary brick buildings, tanks, etc., will be built as speedily as possible. The enterprise is now all underway, and the days of cussing at oil that won't burn, will soon pass away.

Trouble on the Kylemore.

Four sailors belonging to the Kylemore, now lying in the stream, were yesterday arrested and brought before the U. S. commissioner; the specific nature of the charge being something of which we are un-informed. One of them was particularly boisterous, having on two or three occasions informed the captain that he would remove his (the captain's) sanguinary intestines and other portions of that gentleman's inner works in a summary manner, and would make such further disposition of them as would render them practically useless to that gentleman. To this, the captain naturally objects, and wants such relief from such stress of speech and action as our national laws afford.

The old trouble seems to be at the bottom of the affair. The sailors claim that the boarding house runners did not give them what was agreed, that they have no clothes and have got the worst of the bargain, and they naturally feel like making it lively for some one whether he be responsible or not. Any one would feel just the same way about it, but "what is everybody's business is nobody's business," and the sweet little cherub that is said to "sit smiling aloft to watch over the life of poor Jack" must be at present asleep on his watch in Astoria.

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COLUMBIA RIVER BAR IMPROVEMENT. Report of the Board of Visiting Engineers.

MAJOR MENDELL MANIFESTS MISGIVINGS. The report of the commission of engineers appointed to examine into the proposed improvement of the mouth of the Columbia river, was sent to the senate last Friday. The report favors the building a single jetty from Point Adams, so as to make the distance between its outer end and Cape Disappointment nearly the same as that between Chinook Point and Point Adams. They say that inasmuch as at the section between Cape Disappointment and the proposed jetty the wave action is very potent, and that it does not exist at Chinook section, it is thought best to make the new mouth of the river narrower than the present Chinook section. They estimate the cost of the improvement, including contingencies, at \$3,500,000. The report says the use of stone is desired, but the expense would be materially reduced by using wooden mattresses. Major G. H. Mendell filed a minority report. He says he is unable to agree with the other members of the commission as to the extension of the jetty to deep water. He says the peculiar circumstances of heavy sea waves and strong and alternating currents, and the presence of sand in unstable positions, introduce obstructions of so serious a nature that they may be said to place limitations upon the application of well-known principles at the mouth of the Columbia river.
