Good—For a Starter. In the senate last Thursday, Senator Slater introduced a bill appropriating \$500,000 to be expended under the supervision of the secretary of war in the construction of a jetty on Clatsop spit at the mouth of the Columbia river, Oregon, in accordance with a plan submitted by a majority of the board of engineers for the permanent improvement of the mouth of the Columbia river. The bill provides that the sec'y of war may order such further examinations and surveys to be made at the mouth of the river and adopt such modifications and changes as he may deem proper. The estimates for this work furnished by a majority of the board are that it will require \$3,710,000 to complete it, and if allowance for contingencies is made, the position being one of great exposure, the total estimate is \$5,500,000. The board recommends the construction of a jetty slightly convex to the north, extending from the shore near Fort Stevens, in a northwesterly direction towards a point three miles south of Cape Disappointment. This jetty is to stop short of that point or be prolonged beyond it as experience may indicate to be necessary. Estimates are made on the basis of building the jetty of stone.
