An Eastern Opinion.

OREGONIANS, says the Springfield Republican, have long cherished a deep-rooted faith that their particular corner of the earth would sometime become one of its most important parts. As the day approaches when the state is to secure railroad connections with the East and with California they grow more and more confident of the future and talk enthusiastically of the grand development that lies before them, of which they already see the beginnings. This is not strange. The state has hitherto been unfortunately isolated. Its population is very small. The people who came here to the Willamette valley 40 years ago, and their followers since, have built up a sturdy, vigorous civilization; they have prospered materially, but they have suffered seriously in many ways on account of the difficulties and slowness of communication with the East. The motto that rests on the state escutcheon, 'Alis volat propriis,' 'he flies with his own wings,' is singularly appropriate to the circumstances of Oregon's settlement and early career, and the free translation, 'She paddles her own canoe,' is a perfect epitome of the state's history.

WASHINGTON advices are of the tenor that Republican Congressmen make no secret of their intention to press the admission of Dakota, or rather of the southern half of that Territory at this session. This matter will probably be made a subject of caucus action at an early day, and there is no doubt that the decision of the party will be to make a state of Dakota if it can be accomplished. Democrats are determined to oppose the scheme, and it will become a party question. The Republicans having a majority in the House, can, without any more difficulty than a minority is able to present, pass the bill unless the Democrats, as is openly threatened, filibuster to prevent its passage. Dakota, particularly that portion which is selected for admission is Republican.

THE performance of "Uncle Tom's Cabin" occasions considerable trouble in some localities. Besides the one that played in Astoria a few nights ago there are four or five troupes giving a rendition of that drama of slavery days in different parts of the country. One of those wandering galaxies was compelled to desist in Lynchburg, Virginia, and in Richmond there were but twelve in the audience.

Street Improvement Notice.

NOTICE is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Astoria did on the 20th day of December, 1882, pass an ordinance, entitled "An ordinance declaring the intention of the Common Council of making certain repairs and improvements in a portion of Cedar street," the repairs and improvements to be as follows:

All of that portion of Cedar street between the east side of Salmon street and the west end of said Cedar street in that portion of said City of Astoria which was laid out and recorded by John M. Shively in Clatsop County, State of Oregon, shall be repaired and improved as hereinafter provided, and the costs thereof assessed on the adjacent property. The said repairs and improvements shall be made by removing all of the defective piles, caps, stringers and timbers now in that portion of said Cedar street which is between the east side of Salmon street and the west side of West 9th street, and by replacing the same with new and sound fir piles, caps, stringers and timbers, and all such timbers that have been by any means, taken away or displaced, shall be also replaced with new and sound ones; all timbers so replaced to be of the same size and dimensions as those of the same kind now in the street and said portion of said Cedar street between said east side of Salmon street and the west side of West 9th street shall be replanked over the portion and by the width it is now planked, with new and sound fir planks three inches in thickness and twelve inches wide. That portion of said Cedar street from the west side of West 9th street to the west side of West 10th street shall be repaired and improved as follows: By filling in three feet at its intersection or crossing with West 9th street, and by excavating and lowering it three feet at the west side of the crossing of West 10th street, and by filling, grading or excavating the other parts or portions so as to be in a grade corresponding with such crossings, when so graded and West 9th street crossing as it now is, and then by planking it over in the center to the width of sixteen feet with sound fir planks not less than three inches thick and twelve inches wide, to be laid on sleepers as follows: One sleeper four inches by twelve inches shall be imbedded in the center of the street and by the width it is now planked will rest firmly on by two sleepers four inches by six inches shall be placed on either side of and parallel with the center sleeper, the outer edge of the center sleeper shall be eight feet from the center of the center sleeper, the other sleepers shall be placed in the middle between the center and outside sleepers, on the center and right angles between the planks shall be laid each plank to be spiked to the sleepers, two spikes to each sleeper. From the west side of West 9th street to said west end of Cedar street repairs and improvements shall be made by constructing bent work and planking the same to the width of sixteen feet on a grade running from the west side of said West 9th street to the grade as above provided, to the top of the planking on the roadway in Olney street in said City as laid out and recorded by John M. Shively, the said bent work and planking to be done as follows: Mud sills, 4 inches by 12 inches 16 feet in length, shall be laid in the center of the street and at right angles to the line of it, and distant from each other fifteen feet from center to center; on each end and in the center of each mud sill shall be placed a post, in an upright position and of sufficient height to bring the top of the planking up to said grade; the posts shall be 12 inches square, braces 2 inches by ten (10) inches, shall be firmly spiked to each post and placed diagonally upward from bottom to top across the mud sills, shall be fastened to the mud sills by spiking. On the posts and at right angles to the line of the street, shall be placed caps two inches square and sixteen feet long, to be securely bolted to each post with iron bolts 5/8 of an inch in diameter and 18 inches long; upon the caps and at right angles thereto, shall be placed stringers as follows: One directly over each post and one between each outer stringer and the center stringers, the stringers to be 4 inches by 12 inches and not less than 32 feet long, and the outside stringers shall be bolted to the caps with iron bolts as above described, and the inside stringers shall be firmly spiked to the caps. Planking not less than 3 inches thick and 12 inches wide, shall be laid on, at right angles to the stringers, and shall be spiked to each stringer on alternate edges of the plank, one spike to each stringer. On either side of the roadway thus constructed, shall be placed a rail 2 by 4 inches, spiked to stanchion, 3 by 4 inches, and not over 7 1/2 feet apart and three feet above the planking.

All of said planking, caps, stringers, mud sills, braces, rails and timbers to be of good sound fir timbers, and the spikes used shall be not less than six inches long.

A notice is hereby given that unless a remonstrance signed by the owners of two-thirds of the property fronting on said portion of said street be filed with the auditor and clerk within ten days from the final publication of this notice to-wit: Tuesday, Jan. 23, 1883, the council will order the repairs and improvements to be made.
