More Light Breaking.

A DISPATCH from Washington to the S. F. Chronicle, says: In the report which accompanied the bill introduced in the senate by Garland, providing for the forfeiture of railroad grants in certain cases, the judiciary committee says: "Without undertaking to decide whether, in all grants by the United States to railroads, congressmen can declare this forfeiture, the committee considered it best to adopt some means that would avoid this question and place the parties in an attitude towards eachother that would insure to each fair dealing and justice as far as can be done. They propose to direct the attorney-general to institute proper judicial proceedings against any railroad companies that he may have reason to believe are in detault, and the conditions of their grants to bring about forfeiture and secure the rights of the government to the lands. This proceeding, in the nature of information, will bring the supposed defaulting companies into court, to be heard in defense against the proposed forfeiture, and the court can enter such judgment or decree STATE AND COUNTY TAXES FOR THE as in its opinion will secure the government, not merely in declaring the forfeiture if it need be, but in declaring the resumption of the lands granted, an appeal to be allowed as in other cases in court."

The question asked by the holders of the Astoria Land Grant, "What are you going to do about it?" may be answered by congress in a manmer that may be more emphatic than satisfactory to the nabobs whose game is exclusion of settlers from Clatsop county.

Ben in Bis Glory.

A Bosrox dispatch of the 4th says: No inauguration in recent years has been so popularly attended as Butler's. Hours before the time for him to appear the halls and passages were growded, and the throng overflowed down the broad steps and extended even to the common. Butler read his address, in that style which has bene familiar in public speeches frequent touches of humor enlivened it and applause was interspersed as profusely as in any of his stump speeches. Off-hand interpolations were made. Speaking of the abolition of poll tax as a qualification for suffrage, he interjeeted the words, "And such men as Harvard students." His argument for woman suffrage was liberally applanded. 
