The Cincinnati Commercial thinks it is high time the country was aroused on the subject of pension frauds. The tried and true soldiers should be foremost in the exposure of the enormous swindles that are draining the Treasury and disturbing the peace of the country for the heroes of the war.

What objection is there to the publication of the pension lists? So far as they are of the deserving they are rolls of honor, and nothing would be so effective to point out the undeserving as the daylight glare of publicity.

There are nearly 300,000 pensioners drawing money from the public treasury, with an enormous and increasing number of applications, including a great number on the rejected files "subject to re-examination," and now we hear of projects to pension everybody who was in the remotest way engaged in the late war with England (seventy years ago) and all who were in the Mexican war.

There is an organized effort to have \$10 a month paid to each soldier who lost a limb or suffered injury "equivalent" to that, and there are pension agents who could make out on the papers a hind could caught by a janitor equivalent to the loss of a leg by a soldier. Here is what the commissioner of pensions tells us in his late report, which has not been so extensively read and carefully studied as it should be. He says:

There are now on file 252,618 pending and rejected late war claims, which were filed prior to July 1, 1880, and allowing twenty per cent for rejection, there would be 202,919 for admission and entitled to the benefits of the act. If these should be placed on the pension roll simultaneously, he calculates that the amount of arrears of the present value of each case allowed would be in the aggregate, in round numbers, \$201,295,000. On the same proportion it would increase the present roll of pensioners from 291,656 to 491,575, and the annual value would be, in round numbers, \$50,000,000.

Heretofore it has been our boast that when the rebellion was over our army disbanded and returned to the ways of peace and the paths of industry, and our first point when we compare ourselves with the other nations of the earth is that we do not burden ourselves with a standing army. But no other nation ever had such a standing army of pensioners.

Street Improvement Notice. NOTICE is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Astoria did on the 30th day of December, 1882, pass an ordinance, entitled "An ordinance declaring the intention of the Common Council of making certain repairs and improvements in a portion of Cedar street," the repairs and improvements to be as follows:

All that portion of Cedar street between the east side of Salmon street and the west end of said Cedar street which was laid out and recorded in the Common Council of making certain repairs and improvements in a portion of Cedar street, shall be repaired and improved as hereinafter provided, and the costs thereof assessed on the adjacent property. The said repairs and improvements shall be made by removing all of the defective piles, caps, stringers and timbers now in that portion of said Cedar street which is between the east side of Salmon street and the west side of West 6th street, and by replacing the same with new and sound fir planks, caps, stringers and timbers, and all such timbers that have been by any means taken away or displaced, shall be also replaced with new and sound ones; all timbers so replaced to be of the same size and dimensions as those of the same kind now in the street; and said portion of said Cedar street between said east side of Salmon street and the west side of West 6th street shall be repaved over with three inches in thickness and twelve inches wide. That portion of said Cedar street from the west side of West 6th street to the west side of West 7th street shall be repaired and improved as follows: By filling it three feet at its base and crosswise with West 6th street, and by excavating and lowering it three feet at the west side of the crossing of West 7th street, and by filling, grading or excavating the other ends or portions so as to be on a grade corresponding with such crossings when so graded and West 8th street crossing as it now is, and then by making it over in the center of the street to the width of sixteen feet from the center of the street to the center of the street, and by placing in the middle between the center and outside sleepers; on the sleepers and at right angles thereto the planking shall be laid with one plank to be spiked to the sleepers, two spikes to each sleeper. From the west side of West 9th street to said west end of Cedar street, said repairs and improvements shall be made by continuing bent work and planking the same to the width of sixteen feet on a grade running from the west side of said West 9th street then graded as above provided, to the top of the planking on the roadway in Olney street in said City as laid out and recorded by John McClure, the said bent work and planking to be as follows: Mudsills, 4 inches by 12 inches 16 feet in length, shall be laid in the center of the street and at right angles to the line of it, and a distance from each other fifteen feet from center to center, on each end and in the center of each mudsill shall be placed a post, in an upright position and of sufficient height to bring the top of the planking up to said grade; the posts shall be 12 inches square, braces 2 inches by ten (10) inches, shall be firmly spiked to each post and placed diagonally inward from the center of the posts, the posts shall not be fastened to the mudsills by spiking. On the posts and at right angles to the line of the street, shall be placed bent work and planking to be sixteen feet long, to be securely bolted to each post with iron bolts 5/8 of an inch in diameter and 18 inches long; upon the caps and at right angles thereto, shall be placed stringers as follows: One directly over each post and one between each other stringer and the center of the stringers to be 4 inches by 12 inches and not less than 32 feet long, and the outside stringers shall be bolted to the caps with iron bolts as above described, and the inside stringers shall be firmly spiked to the caps. Planking not less than 3 inches thick and 12 inches wide, shall be laid on, at right angles to the stringers, and shall be spiked to each stringer on alternate edges of the plank, one spike to each stringer. On either side of the roadway thus constructed, shall be placed a rail 3 by 4 inches, spiked to stanchions 2 by 3 inches, and not over 7 1/2 feet apart and three feet above the planking.

All of said planking, caps, stringers, mudsills, braces, rails and timbers to be of good sound fir timbers, and the nails used shall be not less than six inches long.

A notice is hereby given that unless a remonstrance signed by the owners of two-thirds of the property fronting on said portion of said street be filed with the auditor and clerk within ten days from the final publication of this notice to-wit: Tuesday, Jan. 23, 1883, the council will order said repairs and improvements to be made.
