### Presidential Election.

THE manner of electing the President of the United States is a present subject of discussion in Congress. There are some in favor of having the election by a direct vote of the people: others think the present system is the best yet devised. The electoral system of choosing a president is very different in practice from what its originators intended, and is really as direct a system of voting for president as can be sue cessfully practiced. The primal idea of the framers of the constitution was to have the people choose a certain number of electutable and learned, who would upon a certain day meet, and with due care decide upon some one worthy to fill the high office of President of the American Republic: the theory was excellentas a theory -but impracticable Party lines were soon drawn, and the matter became one of political significance throughout: for the last sixty years a whig, or federalist, or free soiler, or abolitionist, or constitution man, or republican or democrat knew just exactly how his candidates for presidential elector would vote at the time he voted for him, and not once, not even in the memorable contest of '76, did a presidential elector prove recreast to his political pledges. The man in Oregon, in Nov. 1880, who voted for the Democratic presidential electors most assuredly knew he was vot ing for Gen. Hancock: the man who voted for the Republican state presidential electors was equally certain that he was voting minor modifications the presa good one and

The main argument in favor of the "direct" system of voting for president, singularly enough comes from those who call for "state rights," and yet, if their system of electing president was to prevail tond to a total sul of state rights. We believe that each state in this Union is an in tegral commonwealth with right that should be maintained, and privileges that should not be curtailed nor surrendered, yet belieging that nation should be "spelled with a big N," when used in connection with American Unless, we do not believe in making each commonwealth practically independent. But it should be independent in the matter of choosing a president, and should n a be overawed or overridden by its higger sisters. Take a few figures. In 1880 there were cast in the United States 4,454,416 votes for the field; and 4,444,952 votes.

### Presidential Succession.

THE bill to provide for the performance of the duties of the president, in case of his removal Fresh Stock; Direct Importaby death, resignation, or inability of both the president and vicepresident, passed the senate last Tuesday. All of that portion of Cedar street be-

tween the east side of Salmon street and the west end of said Cedar street in that portion of said City of Asteria which was laid out and recorded by John M. Shively in Clatsop County, State of Ore-gon, shall be repaired and improved as hereinafter provided, and the costs thereof assessed on the adjacent prop-erty. The said repairs and improve-ments shall be made by removing all of the defective piles, cans, stringers and the defective piles, caps, stringers and timbers now in that portion of said Ce-dar street which is between the east side of Salmon street and the west side of West oth street, and by replacing the same with new and sound fir piles, caps, stringers and timbers, and all such timstringers and timbers, and all such timbers that have been by any means, taken away or displaced, shall be also replaced with new and sound oges; all timbers so replaced to be of the same size and dimensions as those of the same kind now in the street; and said portion of and Color street between said cost sade. said,Cedar street between said east side of Salmon street and the west side of West 6th street shall be replanked over the portion and to the width it is now planked, with new and sound fir planks three inches in thickness and twelve inches wide. That portion of said Ce-dar street from the west side of West 6th street to the west side of West 9th street shall be remained and improved as street shall be repaired and improved as follows: By filling it three feet at its intersection or crossing with West 9th street, and by excavating and lowering three feet at the west side of the croing of West 7th street, and by filling, grading or excavating the other parts or portions so as to be on a grade cor-responding with such crossings when so graded and West 8th street crossing as the center to the width of sixteen feet with sound fir planks not less than three inches thick and twelve inches wide, to be laid on decourse of fellowing the company comprises the following well-known Artists:
