—Read "Jeff's" adv. this morning. He means business.

—The British Columbia salmon pack for '82 aggregated 249,761 cases.

—Wm. DeLashmutt and Frank Horns are booked for Salem this morning.

—Washington Territory has thirty-five lodges of Masons, with a membership of 1,200.

—Capt. J. C. White, lately stationed at Fort Stevens, has gone east on an indefinite leave of absence.

—Mr. John Hobson has disposed of his interest in the canning business both here and at Tillamook to his former partners.

—A. M. Simpson expects to have his lumber carrying steamer ready to run between here and San Francisco by the 1st prox.

—Pilot Campbell, who had the misfortune to break his arm on the Pioneer a week ago, is doing well, and will be out in a few days.

—An up-country exchange wants "subjects for discussion at a lycium." How would this do: "What is the tangible effect of a chimney revolving in a vacuum?"

—The London Lancet says you should be very careful about drinking cold water. Water will rot the soles of one's boots; there's no telling what it would do to one's stomach.

—"What becomes of all the cocoon shells?" was lately asked a New Orleans fruit-seller. "I send 150,000 a year to New York, to be ground up with black pepper," was the reply.

—The 1882 cut of pine in Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota, will amount to about 10,000,000,000 feet, against 7,768,000,000 the previous year, and everybody wonders how long it can go on.

—Yesterday was bright and breezy, but little was done in the way of shipping movements. The Jeanie Landies went up stream; the Selena came into the dock, and will discharge 450 tons coal.

—The Columbian, our nearest neighbor, is one of the most original papers on our exchange list. It is run by a man who evidently believes in saying just what he thinks, and is always welcome in this office.

—The commissioner of the general land office has decided that married women and minors are not entitled to enter timber culture land in California, Nevada, Oregon and Washington territory under the act of June 3, 1878.

—The Alpha, Capt. Starr commanding, arrived in yesterday afternoon from Tillamook, after a stormy voyage. He has 100 barrels salmon aboard, and four passengers, among them Claude Thayer, son of ex-Governor Thayer.

—The Clara Parker brought down a large cargo on her last trip. Unloading yesterday we noticed 19 M lumber, 50 M shingles, 20 tons pig iron, 75 barrels of lime, besides brick, flour, and feed, etc. To-day she goes to the Cowlitz.

—There are all sorts of causers afloat up country about "small pox at Astoria," having been carried in on the steamer from San Francisco. Dr. W. D. Baker, health officer at this port says there is not a word of truth in the report; that in no instance has there been any case of the kind referred to.

—There is some dissatisfaction in the minds of high eastern officials in relation to the shelling of an Indian village in Alaska, by Commodore Merriman. Geo. Kastrometoff, who has long resided there as an interpreter, and who was in the city last Sunday, on his way to San Francisco, declares that "it was just right." That such a display will have a better effect than six months' pulver, and that Merriman should be upheld in his action. This seems to be the general opinion.

Astoria Chamber of Commerce

At the last meeting of the Astoria chamber of commerce considerable business was transacted. It being the first meeting of the year, election of officers was in order, with the following result: President, J. Q. A. Bowley; Vice-President, A. W. Berry; Secretary, E. C. Holden; Treasurer, M. C. Crosby. The following new members were elected: A. T. Brakke, C. H. Cooper, Wm. McCabo. The Executive Committee appointed by the president, is S. Elmore, F. J. Taylor, F. L. Parker. The reports of the secretary and treasurer were read and approved. They show that the organization is in a prosperous condition, with an active membership, and money in the treasury. In the matter of building a steamer to ply between Astoria and San Francisco, communications to the chairman of the committee, from George Sawyer & Parker, of Bath, Maine; Pusey & Jones Manufacturing company, Wilmington, Del.; Hall Brothers, Port Blakeley, and others, were read. Further action was deferred until more information and statistics be received in relation to the subject.

Communications were read by the secretary from Senators Grover and Slater, and Representative George, and Representative Brents, of W. T., acknowledging receipt of memorials and pledging their active co-operation in the petition. It was resolved that the secretary be instructed to send to the Portland board of trade a copy of the memorial lately forwarded Prof. Spencer E. Baird, on the subject of propagating salmon, with a request that that body endorse the memorial in question and send such endorsement to that gentleman, and our congressional delegation. On motion the meeting adjourned.

The chamber has now been in existence for a number of years, and with pride refers to its record as being that of Astoria's progress. It has done a great deal for the place; has inaugurated improvements, obtained concessions, protested successfully against slight and encroachments, instituted measures for the common prosperity and good, and at all times has been in the van in calling attention to our wants as a community and devising means whereby those wants and necessities can be successfully dealt with. Since last fall, it has by increased membership and renewed interest been able to still further increase the sphere of its usefulness, and should, in this instance, but serve as an index of what can be accomplished by an even wider co-operation on the part of our business men. Its acts and deliberations affect every citizen of the place, and have always tended to increase our prosperity at home and our standing abroad.

Attempted Escape. Yesterday morning at Constable Oliver was about taking the prisoners at the county jail their breakfast an attempt at escape was made which was unsuccessful. He says: "I opened the outer door and then going forward set down the basket and opened the iron door directly in front, as I did so there was a rush to get out on the part of those inside; I presented my revolver and ordered them back. Then one said he wanted to 'see' me inside, but the light was better where I was, so I didn't go in."

Found Drowned. About one o'clock yesterday afternoon some passers-by near the Occident Packing Co.'s cannery, saw the body of a man in the water about knee deep and but a short distance from the roadway. The body was brought to shore and proved to be Andrew Solomon, a fisherman who was last seen in a saloon on the roadway about half-past eleven last Sunday night. There was an ugly gash over the left temple, but no other marks of violence were found on the body.

Tin Plate

The reported action of the house committee on ways and means concerning the duty on tin plate, which is to be advanced from one and one-tenth cents to two and one-fifth cents per pound is said to be instigated by certain New York parties who want to establish a tin plate factory in that state, and, of course, want "protection." There is a good deal of injustice under the head of "protection," and it has a good deal to answer for already. This is but illustrative of the whole system which is founded on fraud and upheld by monopoly. To our Columbia cannerymen it will make a little difference, not enough to amount to anything, but to the domestic consumers of canned goods it will make a tremendous difference, the consumer being the one who has to pay for the tin plate from New York who wish to be "protected" because they think they can make money manufacturing tin if the government can only be made help them. From present appearances their chances are excellent.

The importation of tin plate into Astoria is an important item: From the 1st of December '81 to the 1st of December '82, Astoria imported 38,782 boxes of tin plate; during the sixteen days of January, there has come 24,921 boxes. A box of tin will weigh 109 pounds. The average value of the tin is \$6.50 per box. On this there is a duty of one and one-tenth cents per pound, or \$1.20 a box. The government increasing that duty to \$2.40 a box would compel every one in the United States who eats canned fruits, vegetables, meat or fish to pay extra. Of course the fruit or vegetable canner isn't going to lose it; all he can do is just as the man in Arkansas that stole the mule, "in self-defense"—put up the price. Our Columbia cannerymen are allowed a rebate, so that it will not bear so hard upon them, though the whole thing is onerous. Some of our canneries ship their salmon pack, or a good portion of it, east. They get nothing back in the way of rebate. It takes 107 boxes of tin to pack a thousand cases of salmon; out of this there is a certain waste, and the custom house authorities, by frequent measurement, have averaged that allowance shall be made for 96 cases out of 107. The tin in the tin is worked up into cans and shipped back to England, the importer gets back the duty he paid on what he is credited with shipping back, less ten per cent. For instance a cannery packs 1,000 cases of salmon; it has paid duty on 107 boxes tin; when the ship is ready for sea the government gives back the duty on 96 boxes, say \$115, less ten per cent., or \$103.50. But California or eastern packers of fruit, etc., finding their market in this country get no rebate and, eventually, "the dear people" have to pay. But what's the difference, so that two or three men in New York can amass a fortune by being "protected" even though ten million of people have to contribute to said private fortune without any resulting benefit.

Circuit Court. In the Circuit, yesterday, a jury was empaneled in the case of Jas. McCarty, charged with kidnapping, and the trial went on. The evidence was all in at 7:30 last evening and the case was given to the jury with brief argument. The cases of Lloyd, McCormick and Driscoll, charged with the same offense will go over till next term. The Bain case comes up this morning.
