The Nicaragua Canal.

THE Nicaragua canal bill is being argued in congress. Representative Keason, of Iowa, in arguing for the bill before the house, says: "Seventeen miles by the proposed route—twelve on a straight line—will connect a lake with the Pacific ocean, and ninety miles by river and canal will connect it with the Gulf of Mexico. Sixty-three miles of this distance will follow the channel of the river San Juan—a broad, full river, with slight works on its channel. You have sixty-three miles of canal already made. There remains, therefore, but about thirty-six miles on that side and seventeen on the other—fifty-three miles in all—of excavation by art, and the greater part in alluvial soil. There is no partisanship in this question. To-day France is proud of her inauguration of the Suez canal. England has seen the necessity, although she once strenuously opposed it, of having an interest in the great work, in order to control it. If we lose this opportunity to give the government of the United States the power to control the construction and influence the management of this canal by creating a corporation of American citizens that is to build it, and reserving the right to regulate this corporation hereafter, I fear an opportunity may be lost to the government and people of the United States which will cause them a lasting regret and great future difficulty."

Want to Organize.

A CALL has been issued for a national delegate conference which will be held in Chicago, on the 4th day of July, 1883, for the purpose of organizing a new political party to espouse the cause of legitimate industry in the irrepressible conflict already entered upon between the confederate monopolies and the people.

"All who favor the restriction of the power of corporations, the holding of the public lands for actual settlers, the suppression of gambling in the necessities of life, and of combinations which fix prices against the natural laws of trade, the destruction of legal rights in vested wrongs, and the overthrow of all monopolies and of all systems and laws made in the interest of the few and against the many; all who oppose the control of the currency by banks of issue, and the taxation of all industry for the benefit of favored enterprises under the guise of a protective tariff; all who favor the election of the president, vice president and United States senators by a direct vote of the people—all who favor simple and just government as against that which is complex and corrupt, are invited to choose delegates to represent them in the conference, the basis of representation being four delegates for the District of Columbia, four for each territory, and four for each congressional district in the United States."

The call is signed by men from all parts of the country.

EX-ATTORNEY-GENERAL WILLIAMS, of Oregon, has sold his handsome residence on Rhode Island avenue to a Philadelphia for \$55,000. When Senator Jones, of Nevada first came to the city he tried to purchase this house. Williams' agent then wanted \$125,000 for it. It was furnished in rather grand style by Mrs. Williams, in anticipation of the elevation of Judge Williams to the chief justice of the United States supreme court, which, however, never happened.

LEADING Democratic congressmen say it is "a physical impossibility" to pass the tariff bill this session.

The bill to provide a civil government came up in the House last Monday. It was supported by a good many representatives, including M. C. George, Proctor Knott, of Kentucky, spoke against it. It was his belief that there were not 200 civilized souls in Alaska, and he was opposed to the bill because one of its sections gave the secretary of the interior the power to dispose of such of the lands or mines of Alaska as he chose. The bill was beaten, by a vote of 169 for to 86 against, it requiring a two-thirds vote to carry it. Another effort will be made next week.

A STRONG fight is being made in congress looking to the abolition of future silver coinage. Thus far the opposition proves unsuccessful.
