—This snow and slush retards all outside work and is an abomination.

—Soil from the depth of fifteen inches in Seattle during the recent cold snap.

—The Eureka came down the river yesterday afternoon, and went to sea at four o'clock.

—The American bark Elsinore was sold last Tuesday to J. C. Merrill, of San Francisco, for \$14,500.

—J. G. Ross has removed his family from Knappa to this city where he thinks of engaging in business.

—Puguet Sound never freezes.—Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

—Nor the Columbia at Astoria or below.

—Yesterday was a big day for the boys under sixty, and many a one had his dignity suddenly snatched from him by a well-directed snow-ball.

—Never in the history of Astoria has there been such a demand for real estate as there is at present. The purchasers are all men desirous to build and abide.

—R. H. Cardwell, of Portland, has made an assignment of his property to D. C. Ireland, for the benefit of his creditors; assets, \$1,025; liabilities, \$4,427.68.

—The keeper of the life saving station at Cape Arago shares with Captain Korte the odium of the loss of life and property occasioned by the Tacoma disaster.

—Frank Pixley grows in his paper because Wells, Fargo & Co. charged him nearly a dollar apiece expressage on some little trees he had sent from Los Angeles to San Francisco. Express charges are extraordinarily high.

—Our contemporaries are still discussing the question: "Where shall be the terminus of the Oregon Short Line?" as if every one didn't know Astoria is the proper terminus of a great trans-continental route seeking tidewater.

—Quite an excitement was occasioned near Knappa last Tuesday by a report of small pox. It was occasioned by the development of a case of measles on the body of one of a party of new comers, and when the true state of affairs was known it was a relief to all concerned.

—Before Justice Fox yesterday appeared C. H. Smith and C. A. Cronin, the two gentlemen from below that started the little "change for the drinks" game last Monday. They were charged with larceny, and in default of \$50 fine were sent to the county jail for thirty days.

—The Queen of the Pacific crossed to sea at two thirty yesterday afternoon; the British bark Garnock, Bristol, master, eighty days from Brisbane, arrived in; the Tam O'Shanter arrived in; the Gen. Miles crossed out to Gray's harbor; the Argonaut from San Francisco for Shoalwater Bay passed the Cape; the Caspar crossed out bound for Puget Sound.

—The North Bend has among her cargo a large lot of stuff for the Astoria gaslight company: among the assortment are pots, pipes, bricks, meters, burners, rests, pumps, plugs, casings, hoop, sheet and angle iron, buckets, posts, chests, rollers, coke, brick dust, fire brick, castings, cement and miscellaneous stuff for the erection and maintenance of the works. Progress is being made as rapidly as the weather will allow.

—The postoffice was unusually lively yesterday, and all day long the delivery window was besieged by juveniles who were happy or downcast according to the receipt or refusal of favors. One little fellow not more than five years old tip-toed up to the window about four o'clock and respectfully inquired "Have 'oo got a valentine for I?" The regret that overtook the countenance of the infant upon being denied, was shared by the spectators.

Unusual Navigation.

Capt. Cummins, of the British bark Renfrewshire, which arrived in last Tuesday evening, had an unusual experience during his voyage hither from Australia. Upon his arrival at Bunkerberg with 400 emigrants from Glasgow he sailed northward to Port Hinchinbrook, to land some sugar mills, etc., at that place. Being on the north-east coast the winds are greatly unfavorable to vessels beating out, and it is only by constant tacking and filling that a vessel is able to get down the five or six hundred miles of tortuous winding through the Barrier reefs. This part of the voyage was rather ticklish navigation. On every hand in that southern sea arise great reefs of coral, and only by special device is a vessel able to get through. In the afternoon, when the sun was at his back, the captain mounted to the maintop, that being requisite to enable him to see the channel, and from that lofty look out directed the steering of his vessel. Within a ship's length on each side the water was white with foam, or a streak showing where the submarine formation was almost to the surface, the deep blue indicating where safety lay. In the mornings it was impossible to tell what course to pursue and at best it was a dangerous though unavoidable course. The atoll inside which he saw the abandoned bark, the captain describes as a scene of singular beauty. The lines of coral reef here assume a circular form and rise slightly above the water line; along the shore the waters break unceasingly; inside the rock-girt circle reigns eternal quiet, the enclosed water blue and placid as a mountain lake. On the sandy ledge that forms the circular barrier grow stately palms whose feathery fronds waving high in the sunny air seem to rise from the bosom of the ocean. Birds of gorgeous plumage make their island home vocal, but beyond that no sign of life was seen. He thinks it possible that the bark he saw inside may have sailed head on with such force as to lift over the thin ledge that encircles the atoll and thus imprison itself in a sea within a sea. Of course no effort could save the vessel which must eventually drop piecemeal into the abysmal depths or float to loggment on the coral shore.

The captain reports good luck throughout from the time he left Glasgow; he arrived in just in time to save his charter which would expire to-day.

Report of the Renfrewshire.

From Port Hinchinbrook, Queensland to Astoria. Sailed from Port Hinchinbrook on Nov. 24th, had light S. E. trades for several days. On Nov. 30th took my departure from Cape Upstart and passed the Barrier reefs by Flinders passage; stood across the Coral sea with moderate S. E. trades, passing between Solomon and Santa Cruz islands; sighting the islands of Benuel and San Christoval. On Jan. 5th passed through the Gilbert group. Passed within two miles of Apamama (Hopper Island) which is circular with trees on its high parts, in the center of which I observed a vessel of about 500 tons to all appearances safely anchored. There was no sign of life about the ship or on the island, and she had the appearance of being abandoned. Crossed the meridian 180 deg. on Jan. 24th encountering heavy westerly gales for several days, and from Jan. 30th had moderate winds from N. E. to S. E. with high barometer, at one time it reached the unusual height of 30.95. On Feb. 11th, 7 A. M., sighted Cape Disappointment, received pilot on board, and was obliged to stand off owing to the rough state of the bar. The weather was very severe all last night and following day; lost some sails and main top-gallant yard. Were towed in on Feb. 13th; anchored off Astoria at 6 P. M. Passage from Cape Upstart 75 days.

Council Proceedings.

At the regular meeting of the city council held Tuesday evening, a petition from C. Rahr, F. Sherman, and M. Meyer, asking the council to have the crossing of Washington and Jefferson streets improved, was referred to the street committee.

A communication from C. E. A. F. D. was referred to appropriate committee.

The certificate of J. W. Gearhart for work done on Benton street was received and filed.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

A report from committee on public property in reference to the purchase of Clatsop cemetery was filed and recommendation adopted. The purchase comprises 71.18 acres of land at Skipanon Landing, for which \$711.80 was paid.

A report from street committee recommending that a remonstrance against the improvement of Cedar street be laid on the table, was received and adopted.

A report from same committee on letting contracts for improving Astor street was received and filed.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS.

The reports of police judge and street superintendent for January were referred to proper committees.

ORDINANCES.

"An ordinance making appropriations out of the general fund to pay the claims of Astoria Iron Works and Jos. Buchtel," was passed under suspension of the rules. "An ordinance making an appropriation out of the Benton street fund for the purpose of paying contractors and refunding any surplus funds" was passed under suspension of the rules. A similar ordinance in reference to Astor street was passed.

"An ordinance providing for the time and manner of improving Squemoqua street from the west side of Cass street to the east end of Squemoqua street," was read first and second times and referred to street committee.

"An ordinance providing for the time and manner of making certain repairs and improvements in a portion of Cedar street," was read third time and passed.

CLAIMS.

The following claims were allowed: Thos. Logan, \$75; Theo. Broemser, \$59.20; Lillie Sanguinetti, \$1.70; J. H. D. Gray, \$5.50; J. W. Gearhart, \$11; Louis Sanguinetti, \$1.70; Astoria Iron Works, \$209.16; Jos. Buchtel, \$1,200; Gill & Clinton, \$84. The rest of the claims were referred.

RESOLUTIONS.

The following resolution offered by Councilman Case was unanimously adopted: Resolved, That the auditor and clerk be and is hereby instructed to issue warrants for the collection of the assessment made for the improvement along the line of Hemlock street in accordance with ordinance No. 498.

The following was also unanimously adopted: Resolved, that the city attorney be and is hereby instructed to immediately take the proper legal steps to obtain the right of way for the extension of Cedar street from the boundary line between Shirley's and Olney's Astoria to Olney Street.

The report of the committee on streets on the extension of Cedar street to Olney street and Cushing's Court street to Jefferson street, was read, and on motion received and placed on file.

Councilman Case moved that the resignation of Councilman Taylor be taken from the table and accepted; carried. Councilman Taylor placed the name of J. W. Hume in nomination to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of F. J. Taylor. By unanimous vote J. W. Hume was elected councilman from the second ward to fill the unexpired term. On motion council adjourned.
