Day and night are becoming more equalized.

C. C. Kinsey arrived on yesterday's steamer.

Ross Bros. have received the new scenery for their theater.

The O. R. & N. Co., will run three excursions to Alaska next summer.

The revenue cutter Corwin crossed out at 4.58 p. m. last Sunday.

Regular communication of Temple Lodge No. 7, F. and A. M. at the Masonic hall this evening.

The excavation for the gas pipe has reached Concomly street, up which street from Main, the mains are now being laid.

The coal bunker on the O. R. & N. dock looms up. There is 100,000 feet of lumber in its construction: the cost of building will be \$4,300.

The Young America goes down to bar anchorage at five this morning. The Henry Villard has finished loading; the Selene arrived down yesterday.

The Gen. Miles arrived in from Gray's harbor yesterday. She towed out the Garfield and Giroude, lumber laden for San Francisco. Her return cargo was light, the flume of the Cosmopolis cedar mill having been damaged by ice, and but little lumber on hand for shipment.

The San Francisco Journal of Commerce has an item in reference to the wreck of the Tacoma, "on the Columbia bar." Such gross ignorance merits the severest censure, but on looking at the date line of the issue before us we see that it reads "February 29th, 1883." There is a density of ignorance which includes itself and is imperishable.

In the police court yesterday Mike Sherry and C. Smith, arrested on a charge of smoking opium, each forfeited ten dollars. A bench warrant was issued for the appearance of the latter. Jas. Cannon got \$40 or twenty days in jail for misdemeanor; the case of John Stevens was continued by consent of counsel till tomorrow at two p. m.

One of the steam colliers ordered in England for the British Columbia coal trade was launched from Newcastle-on-Tyne January 27th under the name of Wellington. She is 2,700 tons burthen, and will make 10 knots an hour. She was built for Dunsuir & Diggle of San Francisco, and will bring coal to that city from the Wellington mine in British Columbia.

That was a tremendous crowd that came up on the Oregon yesterday. Among them were a good many Californians, too, who came to stay. Just why they came from California may be briefly explained by stating the fact that in many churches in California last Sunday, prayers were offered for rain. Here, in this favored land, the great Giver of all good sends rain without having to be asked for it. The immigration of 83 toward this northwest coast will be unprecedentedly large.

Captain Al. Harris, of the life saving station at the Cape is in the city. He reports everything working well with him and his crew. He has a good set of men and should occasion unfortunately require it they would distinguish themselves. Indeed had there been a line to the Cape so that instantaneous news of the Tacoma's disaster could have reached them, a tug could have been quickly obtained and assistance rendered the poor fellows who one by one dropped into the merciless surge in sight of those on shore.

A very curious gun is being made at the Empire foundry in Marysville, California. It is to be used for the purpose of bursting logs. The gun is of steel, two and a half inches in diameter and with a bore of one inch. The length is twelve inches. The breech is very solid and has a vent like a cannon's. An augur thread is turned on the outside of the gun for two inches from the muzzle. In use the gun will be charged with half a pound of powder, and then screwed into the end of a log. A fuse connected with the touch hole being lighted, the gunner will retire to a safe distance. This is believed to be the first gun of the sort ever made in the United States. The idea, however, is not a new one. Log guns have been successfully used in Australia, it is said.

The Cheesbrough

The American ship Cheesbrough, Hunt master, 138 days from Philadelphia, arrived in last Sunday morning, drawing twenty two feet four inches, with 2,400 tons of railroad material aboard. Capt. Hunt reports a good voyage. The second day out from Philadelphia he encountered a cyclone which stripped his vessel of canvas. When the fury of the gale had abated he rigged up spare sail and had good weather from that on to Cape Horn. He crossed the Atlantic Nov. 15, in Lon. 30 degrees; in the Pacific February 1st, Lon. 112 degrees; made Tillamook March 1st; and the following day took pilot aboard; crossed in on the 4th and anchored in stream at 10 a. m., in 39 fathoms of water.

The Cheesbrough is a fine vessel, and is in perfect trim, evincing care and attention on the part of her officers. The work of discharging the cargo begins to-morrow.

Notice to Mariners

An automatic whistling buoy has been moored off the south channel entrance to the Columbia river to take the place of the one lately injured, which will be removed when opportunity offers. Magnetic bearings and distances of prominent objects are as follows: Cape Disappointment lighthouse, N. by W. 1/2 W., distant 6 1/2 miles; Point Adams lighthouse, N. E., distant 4 1/2 miles; bar buoy, N. W. 1/2 N., distant 2 1/2 miles.

The south channel bar buoy which drifted out of position has been replaced. Magnetic bearings and distances of prominent objects are as follows: Cape Disappointment lighthouse, N. 1/2 W., distance 5 miles; Point Adams, ENE 1/2 E, distance 4 1/2 miles; No. 2 buoy, south channel, N., distance 2 1/2 miles.

English Salmon Market

Mail advices from Liverpool regarding that salmon market, are as follows: "The arrival of the Wallace-town has caused very little change in the market, as not only was the effect of her arrival previously discounted, but the major portion of her cargo was sold last summer at high prices, and therefore does not get thrown on the market. Business is very limited at 24s per case or quay for good ordinary brands, but even at this low price buyers are not anxious to operate. The demand in the country has been very good lately, and has materially helped to decrease stocks in dealers' hands. This, coupled with the usual large consumption during Lent, will probably cause a favorable reaction, and in place of the present plethora of offers, we shall find a brisk demand and an advancing market."

Astoria Musical Society

At the M. E. church last evening was organized the Astoria Musical Society, with a membership of 65, under the leadership of Prof. E. Cook of Portland. The organization is a success, and no doubt will go on to a successful conclusion. Any one desiring to join this society can do so at any time, though it is better to affiliate as early as possible. The meetings will be every Monday evening at seven o'clock.

Talking of the possibilities and probabilities of the salmon market, the S. F. Grocer and Country Merchant of Feb. 23d says: "A wide difference between the views of the buyers and sellers is still apparent, and few transactions are reported for forward delivery. Parties who are out of the market appear to discredit reports of transactions made by those who are in the market. The situation is best expressed by saying there is no market. Telegraphic advices from the Columbia river say one party is bidding 90c for fish, a figure which no doubt will prove most satisfactory to the fishermen but disastrous to canners. It does not seem possible that strife among canners will be carried to a point which precludes the possibility of a profit in this business. Only canneries controlled by the fishermen themselves can be run profitably on a 90c per fish basis, and even to these the profit is not in the canning."

School Meeting

At the annual school meeting of district No. 1, held in the Main street school house last evening, J. W. Gearhart was chosen chairman, and J. G. Hunter secretary. The report of the clerk of the district was read and referred to a committee to report next Monday. The next business in order was the election of a school director for the term of three years, which resulted in the election of C. H. Stockton by a vote of 21 to 17 for J. W. Gearhart. Following was the election of clerk, J. O. Bozorth being chosen to fill the position by a vote of 28 to 21 for J. G. Hunter. It was decided by ballot that there be a tax of five mills levied for the support of the schools during the ensuing year. The matter of the new schoolhouse and all business pertaining thereto was referred for further consideration to an adjourned meeting to be held at 7.30 p. m., next Monday, the 12th inst.
