The Tinari has arrived out. The Cheesbrough has finished lightening. She starts up this morning. Since Saturday a heavy fog has held its own, and at nightfall settles down thick and cold a la San Francisco. The regular chimney blaze yesterday afternoon called on the department at half-past three. No damage. Considerable street work will be done this season; the opening of Genieve street from Chenamus south, has already begun. A devil fish, with eight arms, each four or five feet long, was recently caught by a Custom House employe while grappling for an anchor at Port Townsend. At the Portland school election last Monday, 1,009 votes were cast. John Wilson, Nicholas Versteg and Philip Wasserman were elected directors, and Wm. Church, Jr., clerk. The case of the city of Astoria vs. John Stephens, charged with violation of Sec. 4, ordinance No. 370, came up in the police court yesterday. Defendant pleaded "not guilty." The case went to trial and was speedily submitted to the judge for decision. He took the case under advisement for the purpose of visiting and examining the premises. Every passenger steamer that comes across the bar from California brings vegetables to Astoria. We send away a good many thousand dollars every year in this way that could better be kept at home. There is plenty of chance to raise all the vegetables and garden truck that this city needs, out on Clatsop plains. But there must be a bridge built before the thing can be made a paying success. We are in receipt of a notice from the government at Washington that the whistling buoy at the mouth of the Columbia has been transferred to the entrance to the south channel. It is now about a month since THE ASTORIAN called attention to the fact that the bar pilots were using the south channel, and that it should be buoyed for their convenience and the general safety of commerce. This was promptly done. There are twenty feet of water in that channel at low water.

School Matters. At the school meeting last Monday evening, a report of which appeared in yesterday's issue, the following resolution offered by W. W. Parker was carried: Resolved: That the directors of this school district are hereby instructed to build by contract to the lowest responsible bidder in time to use the ensuing autumn, a school house just double the size of the one they were instructed at the April meeting in 1882, to build that year, with such modifications as to ventilation, sewerage, etc., as they shall deem proper, and that the moneys now on hand and due to the building fund be used for that purpose, and the balance necessary be raised by issuing ten year district bonds, and selling them to the highest bidder or for the lowest interest, and that only the four rooms on the lower floor of the schoolhouse be finished this year, and that the directors do properly furnish the rooms to be used this year. At a meeting of the school directors and advisory committee in Capt. Hustler's office yesterday afternoon, modification and rearrangement of the plans were discussed. The proposed building will be on the lot on Court street between LaFayette and Benton, will be eighty-two feet eight inches by eighty-seven feet, three stories high, and will cost in the neighborhood of \$24,000.

New Postal Order.

A new style of money order for all sums less than \$5, which may soon be obtained at any postoffice for a fee of three cents in addition to the amount to be sent, is a printed blank much after the style of an overland railroad ticket, with figures indicating the amount transmitted, that may be punched out, thus preventing "raising." These figures are on the right-hand side of the blank, with a column for dollars running from 1 to 4, a column for dimes from 0 to 9 and a column for cents running from 0 to 9. Suppose the amount to be sent is \$2.76. The postmaster punches the "two" out of the dollar column, the "seven" out of the dime column and the "six" out of the cent column. The purchaser then pays the postmaster \$2.76, and is given the slip, which is in reality an order on the postmaster in the city where the creditor lives. The debtor places the blank in a letter addressed to the creditor and sends it on to New York, Boston or Oskosh, as the case may be; the creditor presents it to his postmaster and receives in return \$2.76. A stub showing the date of issuance, the number of the order and the amount transmitted is retained by the postmaster issuing the order, which acts as a perfect check against loss by theft, fire, accident or otherwise. The present money orders cost ten cents, and it is believed that the new ones will be received with much favor by the public. Well Fixed. It is currently rumored on the streets and generally believed, that the Oregon Improvement company has purchased all Ben Holladay's right, title and interest thereunto pertaining, to certain real estate in the cities of Portland and East Portland, and the incipient metropolis of Albina. The Oregon Improvement company is said to have paid \$1,500,000 for Ben's interest in the Clarendon hotel property, 200 blocks of land in Albina, real estate in the vicinity of Weidlers mill, the Clatsop property, the Oregon Transfer company, the First Street Railway company, the residence at the southwest corner of Third and Stark streets, and several lots in and about East Portland. Persons who have imagined Ben Holladay a bankrupt, and living on the interest of his debts, will see how far they have been from the truth, and those who have wondered how he could live so extravagantly in Washington, giving excellent dinners, and "sporting" driver and footman in livery, will now be able to account for it. His claim against the government, on account of Indian depredations, will not be so necessary to his pecuniary welfare, after all. Welcome. The Date of a Check. The N. Y. Produce Exchange reports the following in regard to a point of commercial interest: A certain party recently began an action against the West-Side bank to recover \$700. In April last he drew a check for \$700, which he left with his book-keeper, Morgan by name, with instructions to draw the money on a certain day, for the purpose of paying the wages of Crawford's employes in case he did not return by that time. The check was dated April 22. Morgan did not wait till April 22 to draw the money, but changed the date to April 21. On the trial Judge Arnoux dismissed the complaint. The general term recently reversed the decision of Judge Arnoux, holding that the date of a check is an essential part of it, and that a bank which pays a check with a forged date, is liable for that amount to the drawer. The Salmon Market.

Latest London advices say: What is of chief importance at the moment is the outlook for the trade in preserved salmon during the next few months. The Glenary has just arrived here with 26,359 cases from Astoria. This makes the total arrivals of Columbia river fish in the United Kingdom, for the present season, equal to about 300,000 cases, and, so far as can be ascertained, not more than 60,000 cases are expected to arrive between now and May next. Of course, it must not be forgotten that there are heavy consignments of Fraser river salmon yet to come forward, but these are well known by the trade as not being of the most desirable character, and though easier terms may be accepted as the year rolls on, sales are not likely to be effected with much facility while any quantity of Columbia salmon (which is preferred) remains on hand. The Liverpool Grocer says: The demand for salmon, although not quite so good this last week, has, nevertheless, been fair, and would probably have resulted in more business had holders shown a disposition to meet buyers. It is evident, however, that growers somewhat anticipated their lent requirements by buying in advance. There is, however, a good consumptive demand, and no doubt the comparatively mild winter has contributed very much to the satisfactory inquiry that has been experienced during the last few weeks. All the cases landed from the Wallacetown having been removed from the quay, dealers find they cannot replace their stocks at previous prices, and are now beginning to ask higher prices in country districts. The next week or two will no doubt develop how far this will succeed. The San Francisco Grocer and Canner reports prices firm under small sales, but there is no market for the reason that there is no material to make a market with. Sacramento river fish have been well cleared up, a few small spot lots remaining in second hands. No sale for future delivery has been reported during the week. Packers are not anxious to rush into contracts. They are waiting for further developments. The sale of the pack of the Benicia Packing company for 1883, which was reported some days ago and then denied, has at last developed into an actual sale, to a commission house on the street, at \$1.25 f. o. b. cars. Columbia river fish are in fair supply with prices well maintained. The large arrivals at Liverpool have had no effect upon that market, except upon outside brands, which show some weakness, and, as a rule, are not up to the standard. The arrival of the Glenary at London with 26,359 cases of Columbia river fish on the shipment adfiant, except about 15,000 cases. The latest mail advices report a quiet European market, with firm prices—25s. 6d. for Columbia river. Buyers are not over and above anxious, but are in the market nibbling.
