The Queen of the Pacific took on 1,336 cases of salmon yesterday and started for the bar at half past two.

Capt. S. C. Nichols tells us that his new schooner Sailor Boy will soon start southward with her first load of lumber.

In the case of John Stephens yesterday afternoon, Judge Winton after examining the premises decided that the defendant was not violating the ordinance, and rendered a decision of "not guilty."

THE CITY FATHERS.

Pro Bono Publico.

The city council met in executive session last Tuesday evening, Mayor Hahn in the chair; present, Councilman Case, Cooper, Hume, Johns and Trenchard. Absent Carruthers. In attendance, C. W. Fulton, city attorney; C. W. Laughrey, chief of police; F. C. Norris, auditor and clerk. The minutes of last meeting read and approved.

PETITIONS.

From property owners along Squemoqua street from Lafayette to Spruce streets, asking the council to establish the grade of the same, was referred to street committee.

From the Oregon Improvement company asking permission to build coal bunkers on the north end of West-7th street, was referred to committee on fire and water.

From property owners along the line of Genevieve street, from Chenamus to the south side of 7th street, asking to have the same improved to its full width, was referred to street committee.

From the secretary of the board of delegates of the Astoria fire department in regard to moving the bell tower, was referred to committee on fire and water.

The certificate of the superintendent of streets accepting the improvement of Benton street in front of lot 5, block 10, was received and filed.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

From street committee to whom was referred the petition to improve Arch street, received and filed and recommendation adopted.

From street committee to whom was referred the ordinance for the improvement of Squemoqua street, was received and placed on file and the recommendation adopted.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS.

The report of the street superintendent for February was referred to street committee.

The report of police judge for February was referred to committee on health and police.

ORDINANCES.

An ordinance authorizing the Oregon Improvement company to construct coal bunkers upon the O. R. & N. Co.'s wharf, and over the north end of West-7th street in Shively's Astoria, was read first and second time and referred to committee on wharves and water frontage.

An ordinance declaring the probable cost of improving Squemoqua street in McClure's Astoria from the west side of Cass street to the east end of Squemoqua street was read first and second times and passed under suspension of the rules.

An ordinance for removing the bell tower was read first and second times and passed under suspension of the rules.

An ordinance providing for the time and manner of improving Squemoqua street from the west side of Cass street to the east end of Squemoqua street, was read for the third time and passed.

CLAIMS.

The following claims against the city were ordered paid: THE ASTORIAN, \$83.44; Thos. Logan, \$75; Theo. Broemer, \$18.40; H. B. Parker, \$62.50; Stevens and Joplin, \$8.80. The remainder of the claims were referred.

RESOLUTIONS.

Councilman Case offered a resolution instructing the auditor and clerk to give thirty day's notice that the council propose to pass an ordinance extending Cedar street from its present terminus in a westerly direction to Olney street, which on motion was laid on the table.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

The report of the street committee on the petition for widening Water street in Shively's Astoria from West 6th to the west end of Water street was read, received, filed, and recommendations adopted. The report of the street committee on a petition asking council to grade and plank the crossing of Jefferson and Washington streets was received, filed, and recommendations adopted. The report of committee on fire and water on communication from the secretary of board of fire delegates, was received, filed, and recommendations adopted. Councilman Case moved that the resolution in regard to extending Cedar street, be taken from the table. Motion was carried. On motion the resolution was unanimously adopted. Councilman Trenchard moved that the Hemlock street assessment matter be referred to city attorney. Motion carried. Council adjourned.

Oil on Troubled Waters.

The influence of oil in calming the surface of the sea has been occupying a good deal of attention lately. In a paper to the Paris Academy, Admiral Bourgeois expressed his view regarding it, which are as follows:

The principle is hardly contestable; but the practical result which may follow are the object of serious doubts, which the facts recently announced do not wholly dissipate. The witnesses of these facts generally omit to specify precisely the nature of the agitation which the oil is said to have calmed. There is, however, a distinction to be drawn between the two phenomena whose superposition constitutes the wave or surge.

The first, and the most important, because it agitates the water to a great depth, is the orbital motion of the liquid molecules, whence results the succession of waves that catches the eye; a motion produced by the prolonged action of the wind, and which is often propagated to very great distances from the regions where the wind has blown, and continues long after that has ceased.

The second phenomenon is the horizontal motion of translation of particles of the liquid surface, when they reach the crest of the wave, are dis-aggregated from it by action of the wind, and by mixture with the air acquire the whitish color of foam. They then fall over in front of the wave in volute forms, the dimensions of which depend on the force of the wind and the size of the waves. The same phenomenon is observed in the absence of wind, when the swell from a distance breaks on a beach; only it has another cause, the retardation of the lower part of the wave through friction on the bottom.

When the wind having ceased, the first phenomenon is produced alone, it is the swell which raises large ships as well as small boats, and causes them to roll; but which is not dangerous, except for fixed obstacles, such as breakwaters or jetties, against which the swell breaks.

None of the facts recently cited appear to prove any sensible action of oil spread on the surface of the sea on these undulations, and, perhaps, it would have been prudent to wait till experience had shown such action before seeking to explain it by calculation.

The second phenomenon constitutes the breaker. It is observed in the open sea when a breeze begins to blow, and becomes more marked in proportion as the breeze freshens. Small vessels are in danger from it in the open sea or near shore when the breaking wave threatens to fill them. Large vessels may receive dangerous shocks from these breakers, especially if they are not protected by the lee-way (deris); which, by plowing the sea, weakens the breakers, while the swell subsists.

It is incontestable that the presence of oil or any other viscous substance, on the surface of the sea, may hinder the liquid particles being dis-aggregated under the influence of the wind, and so forming the breaker. A fact often observed by sailors in the tropics furnishes an irresistible proof of this. At night, the phosphorescence of the water reveals the presence in them of large masses of organic substances of animalcules, which gives these waters a greater cohesion, and so oppose the dis-aggregation of particles from their surface. Then the wake of the ship, luminous during the night, hardly produces any whitish foam during the day. The waves thus lose their crests, and the ship whatever its speed, glides over the sea, leaving hardly any traces of its passage in daylight.

The presence of an oily matter, then, on the surface of the sea has a certain effect in hindering, not the formation of waves, but that of breakers.

In what measure may this property be utilized in the interest of navigators? That is a point experience has not yet determined. In any case, it is indispensable, in order to its being fruitful, that experimenters should observe, and specify clearly, the nature of the agitation claimed, the wave, or the breaker. The former will perhaps defy all their efforts. The latter seems less difficult to master, and nature, in the vast laboratory of tropical seas, furnishes convincing proof of it.
