The railroad land grants in this state aggregate in area 5,800,000 acres.

The Queen arrived in at eight yesterday morning, and left up at eleven.

Robert Hamilton has been appointed a notary public at upper Astoria.

E. C. Holden's regular Saturday auction sale will be at eleven this morning.

The Portland "small pox investigation" is about ended, with no established result.

The copper and iron mines of Josephine county are attracting considerable attention.

The Henry Villard, with an \$118,000 cargo on board, is the only loaded vessel inside the bar.

Henry Villard left New York for Portland last Thursday. He will get up this far about the 10th prox.

The Oregon iron and steel works has bought the Albina iron works, and 400 feet river front at that point.

The new college building of the Pacific university at Forest Grove is now building. It will cost \$25,000.

Valuable horses are still dying in the Willamette valley, and no remedy for the mysterious disease has yet been found.

The extension of Portland's city limits gives the municipal treasury \$26,000 additional revenue from taxes this year.

At the latest fire election in Corvallis Ed. Belknap was chosen chief engineer; N. L. Rabar assistant.

The Oregon comes down to-day. The Queen will leave here for San Francisco next Tuesday, instead of Wednesday.

We are informed that I. C. Johnson, well and favorably known in these parts, will have charge of the Seaside House the coming season.

Superintendent Sloop informs us that there are 1,105 census children in the county: last year there were 961, showing an increase of 15 per cent.

How long before a daily steamer will arrive from San Francisco, and three river steamers will arrive at and depart from Astoria to and for up river ports?

Captain Kuris, of the wrecked Tacoma, arrived in this city yesterday. He went over to Knappa, from which place he will take the schooner Bada to San Francisco.

There will be a public examination for teacher's certificates on Friday and Saturday, March 30th and 31st, at the superintendent's office, commencing at 9 o'clock.

The location of the Willamette bridge has been definitely made. It will start from Portland at the intersection of N. 17th and W. streets, and will be built by the N. P. T. Co.

Among the attractions of the Knight Templars' excursion to this coast next July, will be an Alaska trip, the excursionists touching at this point on their way to the far north.

The services in Grace church on Easter day will be a celebration of holy communion, at 6:30 a. m. Morning prayer and sermon at 11 a. m. Evening prayer and sermon at 7 p. m.

To-day is the last day of Lent, and is held in special commemoration as the day in which the body of Christ lay in the sepulcher awaiting resurrection, the occurrence of which event will be celebrated to-morrow.

The time for paying county taxes is drawing to a close; but a few more days remain, and Sheriff Twombly gives a friendly notice that it is cheaper to settle up now than to let the taxes become delinquent.

The projectors of the incipient city believe that the N. P. R. ferry landing will be at that point, and that there must a shipping point be located.

The executive committee of the English international fish exhibition, in addition to the 230,000 square feet of covered space, had added about 8,000 square feet more, such having been the demand for additional room. This extension it is believed, will give the fullest opportunity for the display of the many objects. There will be twenty sea-water tanks and as many fresh water, besides provision for the exhibition of live oysters.

A Good Move. A San Francisco dispatch of the 22d says that a number of improvements are contemplated by the life saving service of the Pacific, including improvements at Cape Gregory station, near Coos bay, among other things, a new boat house will be constructed at a more accessible point.

It is also proposed to connect that station by telephone with Empire City. A new building will be constructed at the station at the mouth of the Columbia, to which a life boat, wagon and a number of Castor patrol lights and other supplies were recently shipped. The increased facilities at the Cape will be appreciated. It is the intention of Major Blakeney to use every effort to aid the life service on this coast, and bring it up to a high standard of efficiency.
