A Pulpit Opinion.

Two weeks ago Rev Dr. Marvin, of Portland, in a sermon on newspapers, said: "America has been called the paradise of newspapers. In this country the press is practically free from all supervisions and restraint. Public opinion, while it holds the editor to certain responsibilities, gives him the broadest liberties. He is theoretically amenable to the law for the way in which he deals with private characters, but in reality he is absolutely free and can do pretty much as he pleases. And he may be sure of success if his paper be fresh and vigorous, for in the eye of the average American dullness is the unpardonable sin. Public opinion when it asserts itself is stronger than any police force, and men who defy law cower before the voice of a united people. When, therefore, the popular heart is right the press is constrained to observe at least the proprieties of life. But the paper makes the reader, and public opinion is often only the editor's shadow. Here lies the great difficulty in restraining and controlling the press—it has a voice, and a very powerful one, too, in the only court that can adequately deal with it."

The newspaper enters thousands of homes; we find it upon the breakfast table; in the dining room; the office; the shop; wherever man goes the paper goes. It is the only library multitudes ever think of or care for. All there is for them of art, culture, history and literature flow into their lives through the columns of a daily newspaper. Men who never enter a church read its religious intelligence; who never go abroad, read its foreign correspondence; who never open a volume of history, read its editorials; who know nothing of science, are familiar with the reports of philosophical associations and of conventions for the promotion of learning. What a power is the newspaper. Maiden and youth linger over its stories and borrow their early dreams from its columns; and the old man, his day of labor ended, forgets the weariness of age while he reads in his paper of human effort and achievement. The editor is a preacher whose pulpit reaches around the globe. Let him betray his trust, and dip his pen in the vinegar of personal hatred and malice, or taint his paper with the thought of evil and hundreds of innocent readers drink in the poison. When an express train is sweeping round a curve with the rapidity of lightning in the darkness of night, the engineer knows that he holds in his hand precious lives no money can purchase, and if in his bosom there glows the spirit of a man he cannot but feel the solemn responsibility resting upon him. Some time ago the steamer Atlantic was dashed upon the rocks off Nova Scotia, and not far from 600 lives were lost. The vessel in a heavy fog was out of her course, but the captain was not attending to his duty—he was down in the cabin at a game of cards. Do you think the men and women who lost friends in that fearful shipwreck hold that captain innocent and would be willing to trust themselves in his care upon the ocean? The editor holds upon the point of his pen the moral character, spiritual growth and intellectual bias of thousands, and is it strange the pulpit cannot view with complacency the circulation of papers breathing the atmosphere of the pit, and instigated of hell? It matters little what is the private character of the editor; if he is not at the post of duty and is not making his paper a safe and upright publication he is an enemy of mankind and should be treated accordingly.

A PHILADELPHIA newspaper man has been enjoined by the court from running his printing press at night, on the ground that he "annoys his neighbors thereby." Courts make queer decisions sometimes.

In reference to the alleged intent on the part of Portland to impose a tax on wheat shipped from that city, the Oregonian denies that any such action is intended.

Indian War.

Tucson, Arizona, dispatch says: The Indian situation is growing worse. Silver advises that a party that arrived there from San Carlos reports that the young bucks in the San Carlos reservation were very restless last week, and showed every evidence of an early outbreak. They talked of victory and said that a big chief in Mexico said he would soon be at San Carlos. A courier states Indians have been constantly passing through the reservation and Jul's band in Sonora, carrying communication and information. The band raiding southeastern Arizona is drawing near the reservation, and increasing in numbers daily. As far as heard from 21 people have been murdered in seven days. Advice from Sonora place the depredate band down there at not less than 150, who are being driven to the Arizona border by Mexican troops.

A Richmond New Mexico special says the Indians attacked the camp of Palmer and Emerick, about 10 miles east of York's ranch at 3 o'clock on the 27th. Jack Haynes and a stranger were killed. John Emerick, missing, is supposed to be killed. The other men in the camp escaped to York's ranch. The military line between this point, Fort Bayard and Fort Cummings is abandoned. It is reported that a large band of Indians are secreted in the mountains north of York's ranch.
