The Chinese merchants at Yale, British Columbia, have organized a benevolent society and intend to build a hospital for the care of their countrymen, especially those engaged in building the Canadian Pacific Railroad.

The Union Pacific railroad company has reduced the price of meals on the great thoroughfare to seventy-five cents. They were bad enough at a dollar; what will they be now? The traveling public is entitled to commiseration.

The Roman Catholic archbishop of Toronto has issued an address in which he says: "Mr. Gladstone has done more than any other English statesman to redress the unjust grievances of Ireland, and would do more if his countrymen would sustain him."

Ex-Governor Stone, of Iowa, one of the straightest of the sect of prohibitionists, has come to this conclusion: "The Republican party can gain no strength by shouldering this issue again, and I have never thought the temperance question one that could be safely drawn through the pool of party politics."

His father was born in Georgia when it was a colony of Great Britain, his grandfather was an immigrant from Wales, and his grandmother was a native of South Carolina, and her father emigrated from Ireland.

A bright little twelve-year-old girl has died in Buffalo from the effect of Wiggins' prophecy. She was a great reader and very nervous about storms and became intensely excited as the time for the great storm drew near. The family tried to divert her thoughts, but it was impossible, and after a few days' illness the poor child died of meningitis, brought on, the doctor and her parents say, by excitement over the idle words of the Canadian fraud.

The vastness of the pension system is shown by the fact that the forthcoming list, which is to contain merely the name of each pensioner, his postoffice address, a statement of the amount of the pension, and the reason why it is granted, will make a volume of 4,200 pages. Street Grade Notice.
NOTICE is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Astoria intend to establish the grade of Arch street, in Shively's Astoria, in Clatsop County, Oregon, from West-6th street to the west end of Arch street, the grade to be as follows: At the intersection with West-6th street, 120 feet; at West-7th street, 116 feet; at West-8th street, 124 feet; at West-9th street, 120 feet; and at the west end of Arch street, 106 feet above the base of grades, as established by ordinance No. 71, of said City, and unless a remonstrance signed by the owners of two-thirds of the property adjacent to said part of said Arch street, be filed with the Auditor and Clerk of said city within ten days from the final public sale, on or before April 21st, 1883, said grade will be established. And notice is also hereby given that said Common Council propose to improve said part of Arch street by grading the same to its full width and to said proposed grade, and by constructing side walks six feet wide on each side thereof, and unless a like remonstrance against said improvement be filed with said Auditor and Clerk within said time, said Common Council will order said improvement to be made.
