O'Donovan Rossa received the following letter at New York last Saturday, in an envelope indicating that it was mailed in London: "To O'Donovan Rossa, greeting and warning: Thou coward, who starts up good, loyal men to rebel against their own country, take this warning: A dagger shall be driven through your heart when least expected. A powerful brotherhood has been formed to slay all such murderers as thou and thy followers. It is bound to destroy all Fenians and so-called Invincibles. (Signed) T. H., by the chief of the Black Cross, P. H. K."

Can Build Them.

New York, April 15.—The first full-rigged ship ever built of iron in the United States was launched yesterday afternoon in the yard of John Roach, Chester, Pennsylvania, in the presence of a large number of people. She is to be called the Tillie E. Starbuck, of this city, who is the sole owner. Roach said of this ship yesterday: "She is an experiment. If she succeeds, then we shall probably have plenty more of them to build. I wonder what is behind the New York press, that they take such mistaken views as to American ship-building? Here in this yard can be done work which can be equalled in only one other yard in the world—only in the Barrow ship-yard—and in this yard can a whole ship be entirely built from raw material, as it comes from the yards; and in no others on the face of the earth are ships in which ore can be smelted, or hammered and forged, and a ship built, furnished and rigged, and we are doing it all the time, right before everybody's eyes, and yet they say we can't build iron ships. Last year we launched from this yard a ship for every month. This year this is the fourth one launched, and another is nearly ready to come here." The Starbuck is 276 feet long and 2,300 tons burthen.

An Extensive Programme.

New York, April 15.—The Mercury prints a long interview with Prof. Mezzrobt, nihilist and one of the head leaders of the Irish dynamite party, who arrived from Europe yesterday. The professor deals at some length with the dynamite warfare to be waged against England. He claims at the outset that the people have the right to the most effective weapon they can procure to defend their lives, liberty and property. He said if England did not lose her hold on Ireland his party would leave her a mass of ruins. That a dozen men could destroy London in a night by chemicals, fire and dynamite, and they meant to do it. He declared that they would blow up every English man-of-war and all merchant marine flying the British flag and plying between British ports on the seas. They could do this without breaking any international law, and irrespective of where they themselves were located at a trifling expense. Every harbor in England could be fired. Then they would blow up every bank in England and take possession of the gold—say ninety-five million a year—that England had forcibly plundered from Ireland. Next they would begin the destruction of private property. The property of the aristocracy, the capitalist and the monopolist. They would then fill English rivers and harbors with torpedoes. Then the harbors in Ireland would be protected with torpedoes and English soldiers fought with explosives. They would not destroy telegraph, but in particular places would destroy railroads, so as to render impossible the transportation of troops. The professor dwelt on the easy method of obtaining and making explosives, even in the heart of London. In closing he said they had England completely at their mercy, and had given her warning. If she did not take the warning her doom would be on her own head.

The Great Eastern a Failure.

The Great Eastern is a great failure on the hands of shareholders. At a general meeting of the directors and proprietors, held yesterday, it was stated that the efforts to sell or charter the ship had been unceasing, and the directors regretted although they were frequently receiving applications in regard to the steamer, nothing had resulted. The income for the year was made up as follows: Transfer fees £1; interest, £140; visitor's fees to ship, £13. Expenditure for the year in connection with the ship had been £4,402 1s. 1d. The financial exhibit of the Leviathan would be ludicrous if there were not to some of the confident speculators ruin at the base.—London Letter.

A Sheffield firm has taken a foreign contract for steel rails at £5 a ton delivered on board. Reckoning the duty under the new tariff, this would bring the price up to \$41.30 a ton and freight, delivered in this country. In other words, the price of rails in this country must advance \$2 a ton before there is any chance of profitable importations, even if ocean carriage were free.

Twenty-five Italian immigrants were sent to Bristol Pa., to work for one dollar a day on the railroad. Forty-one Italian residents who worked for one dollar and a quarter a day met the immigrants and worsted them in conflict. The twenty-five returned to New York and the forty-one resumed work, remarking: "One dolla a quarter a day plenty little; we lick any man a work for a one dolla a day."

A delegation recently waited on the Canadian government at Ottawa regarding the restriction of Chinese immigration into British Columbia. Sir John Macdonald replied that no measures will be taken to restrict such immigration until the completion of the Canadian Pacific railway.

Joshua Brown McShane, the oldest living Odd Fellow in California, died at Quincy, Plumas county, on the 27th of March. McShane was initiated in 1838, in Wisconsin, by Thomas Wilkey, the father of the Order in the United States.

The past winter has been one of the best for lumbering ever known in Maine. Some 110,000,000 feet of logs have been cut on the Kennebec, and will be floated down this summer. J. Manchester Haynes, of Augusta, who has twelve camps, has cut 12,000,000 feet.

The Indians who crossed from Minnesota into Canada are being decimated by smallpox. Three hundred are reported dead. The remainder are on the way to Portage la Prairie.
