Great Britain, stimulated by the example of the United States, is making some effort to reduce the principal of her debt, having reduced it by £7,000,000 or \$35,000,000 in the past year.

As long as the Irish agitators in the United States keep within the laws they cannot be interfered with. When they violate it they will be dealt with like any other criminals.

Cotton seed oil is becoming a powerful rival to oleomargarine. Twenty years ago the seed of cotton, when ginned from the fibre, was considered a nuisance, and tons of it were cast into the Mississippi every year. Suddenly it was discovered that the oil yielded by it on compression was palatable, and the experiment of sending it in bulk to Italy, to be there used as an adulteration of olive oil, was made. This met with favor, and for many years but little Italian olive oil has come to this country not largely adulterated with cotton-seed oil.

The Philadelphia Times, agent the dynamite scare in various European countries at the present moment, says: "Dynamite is solidified nitroglycerine, and the process of manufacture is very simple, the component parts being common glycerine, nitric acid and silica. As the ingredients taken separately are useful in ordinary manufactures and two of them at least perfectly harmless, it is difficult to see how it is possible to prevent their sale. As they are articles of common traffic, any person with a very slight knowledge of their chemical qualities and a little skill in mixing them can manufacture the explosive in small quantities in any ordinary private room. It will thus be seen how difficult it will be to suppress the manufacture of the article in sufficient quantities to be very destructive in the hands of organized bands of Nihilists or Socialists."

Mr. Lowell is right, says the Philadelphia Press, in saying that assassination is not war and dynamite not the raw material of policy, but he is not the right man to say it. Mr. Lowell represents the government of the United States, its laws and its official acts, and however admirable his motives, he has no right to travel outside of his official duty to express public

opinion upon acts which are inextricably involved with his diplomatic duties. But the dispatches which day by day fill our columns with criminal conspiracy and ignoble fears must, after all, rouse in every American pity for both oppressor and oppressed. It is sad that any cause should stir men to this excess; it is sadder that a mistaken policy, a blinded national conscience, should deny Ireland home rule. A single act granting this, which must some day pass, would still all these plots and leave both lands at peace. England can spot all its statute books with coercion laws and dynamite acts, but parliament will not by these things prevent crime or crush conspiracy. Justice will remove these things as the mists vanish before the sun, and justice means to-day the simple, easy remedy of home rule for Ireland.

It was believed, says the Buffalo Courier (Democratic), that the New York state election of last fall had taken President Arthur out of the list of candidates for the Republican presidential nominations. That this was a mistake is already obvious. Mr. Arthur by sheer luck rose within three years from the uncomfortable situation of a displaced and disgraced custom house officer to the most powerful position in the government. He is not an old man and will make a struggle for further political existence and power—a struggle in which he has nothing to lose and everything to gain. His friends will claim that in the coming national contest the resources of the Republican party will be taxed to the utmost and that it will not do to have the federal administration indifferent or lukewarm in the struggle. They will claim that the country cannot be carried without the state of New York, and that if any Republican can carry New York, Arthur, the most experienced Republican manager in this state, is the man. At present there is no strong competitor for the Republican nomination in the field. This fact will make Mr. Arthur's chances better than they would otherwise be. The president will find it a comparatively easy matter to secure delegates from the southern states and the territories, and it would be surprising if he would not do as well in New York as Conkling did in 1876. If Blaine is out of the way he may secure delegations in some of the western states without much difficulty.

A NEW YORK special says: Jay Gould has declared his intention to retire from his active business life on the completion of his steam yacht Atalanta, built for his projected tour around the world. His son, George G. Gould, a young man of 23 years, is to take his place as a speculator, and Gould himself will lead a private life. Gould's fortune is carefully estimated in round numbers at \$100,000,000, of which \$20,000,000 is in stock of the Western Union and \$20,000,000 in stock of the Missouri Pacific. In real estate he has never put much money, considering the size of his fortune. His investments in this kind of property altogether amount to about \$5,000,000. The remainder of his wealth is in securities, mainly in the shape of bonds of different railroad companies.

INFORMATION is vouchsafed that the Russian government at the approaching coronation of the czar will entertain each newspaper correspondent in magnificent style and give him \$3,000 as a souvenir of the occasion.

FRANCIS S. SMITH, one of the proprietors of the N. Y. Weekly is dead. He left \$1,500,000. He also left a good many thousand youngsters who have been spoiled by the printed trash in his paper.
