**The Approaching Storm.**  
 CHICAGO, April 30.—The Tribune publishes a letter from Rev. Robert Laird Collier, dated London, in which the writer says: England is panic-stricken. Dynamite, dynamite everywhere. The queen dares not move from Windsor castle, which is doubly guarded, and the public, for the first time in years, is debarred entrance upon the royal presence. Sober-minded people look on the fenian plan to carry on widespread assassinations with detestation and horror. The full power and penalty of the law must be used and enforced. The dominant conviction is that we are just at the beginning of a European political and social revolution. The old regime is drawing to a close. It is given out that never again will a crown be permitted to be placed on a head in Europe. Storms of electricity have introduced man to man, all over Europe. Men are in solemn conclave in London, in its streets, its clubs, its galleries, and among all sections of society, men are propounding questions in society that no philosopher can answer, except by predicting a general revolution. The wrongs of Ireland are venerable and many, and England has been strong and confident. Englishmen own Ireland. A few thousand land owners have, up to now, exacted every farthing of rent in good years and bad years, and have spent their money in England. Ireland has been villainously governed and society ill-used. So to the end would Ireland have been governed and ill-used had she not made her voice heard in the land. But really the Irish question, as monstrous as dynamite is coming to be, is but a small factor in this general European revolution. The czar of Russia, is absolute ruler of 85,000,000 souls. He keeps in his winter palace 75,000 servants. He and the imperial family of Russia absorb an amount of wealth almost beyond calculation—beyond the knowledge of any one. Russia is far away, but perhaps not so far but that we shall hear reports of more dynamite explosions there before the imperial crown is placed on another head. The extent of precautions being taken in Russia is almost unbelievable. Even now the whole line of travel from the palace where the czar now is, to the Kremlin, where he is to be anointed and crowned, at Moscow, is guarded by military and civil soldiery. But let us look nearer home. The queen's yearly grant of over £300,000 does not at all represent what Majesty costs this nation. Her palaces, her parks, her yachts and almost her households, are kept up at the public expense. In the budget of this year it is reported there is actually a charge for a rat-catcher, for catching rats in the royal palace. The nine children of the queen have enormous allowances, and yet not one of them ever crosses the channel except at the expense of the people. Just now parliament is asked to rate £25,000 to send the Duke of Edinburgh to Russia, to see the czar crowned. Wolsely and Seymour are created peers, and parliament votes each £50,000 as a present, or rather with which to found a family. Royalty and aristocrats are expensive ornaments, and for the first time in the modern history of Europe the people are asking if this wicked show is much longer to be kept up.

**The Human Tide.**  
 NEW YORK, April 30.—Eight European steamships landed 6,243 immigrants at Castle Garden yesterday. The steamer City of Paris, from Liverpool, landed 147; the Egypt, Liverpool, 1254; the Balera, Glasgow, 942; the Britannic, Liverpool, 913; the Rhein, Bremen, 773; the State of Nevada, Glasgow, 583; the Switzerland, Antwerp, 531; and the Sevon, Bristol, 90.

**Walls Walls Encouraged.**  
 WALLA WALLA, April 30.—

Villard's visit to eastern Oregon has encouraged settlers wonderfully. He said he would accept a bonus of \$80,000 not for railroad purposes, but for the purpose of improving roads leading to depots. The town-site proprietor at Centerville has offered all the land needed for a depot. The road will run within a mile of Weston. Blue Mountain station will be permanent. He told the people they had a garden spot, and there was no other section of the United States with better prospects. He liked the people for their vim and energy. He was asked about railroad lands, and said he wanted a settler on every quarter section. Those who took more would have to pay more *pro rata*, as he did not want land speculators. He could take away all the grain they could raise.

**It Was Rough.**  
 WASHINGTON, April 30.—When the star route trial opened to-day Ingersoll announced that he was willing to submit the case to the jury for Dorsey, provided the government council would agree to have no further argument. The court then wished to hear from the government, and Merrick answered that the government had not yet completed the opening of the case. "That is rough," said Judge Wylie, and Bliss began his address to the jury.

**Had Him Fast.**  
 When Colonel Ingersoll visited St. Paul's the guide (pointing out the statue) said, with dignified solemnity: "That sir, is the monument of the Duke."

"What Duke?" asked Colonel Bob. "All the Dukes are intimate friends of mine."  
 "The Iron Duke," replied the guide, "the great Duke of Wellington, sir, his body is enclosed in two metallic coffins, a rosewood casket and a stone sarcophagus."

At this Bob struck the guide on the breast with such arlor that he knocked him six feet away and exclaimed:  
 "Old man you have got him. If he ever gets out cable at my expense to R. G. Ingersoll, Peoria, Illinois."

The trial of the Colorado monster who killed and ate his five companions while they were snowed in the mountains, is one of the most remarkable on record. The prisoner showed not the slightest hesitation in telling the story of his inhuman crime. He seemed to think that the claim of self-preservation covered his offense against human instincts. But what revealed the man's character more clearly than the cool recital of these horrors was the fact that he robbed the men whom he devoured, and on their money he had engaged in business in the territories. The jury promptly rendered a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree. Now the murderer's council propose to secure a new trial on the ground that the place where the cannibalism occurred was on an Indian reservation, and therefore the case should be tried before a United States court. We fancy that delay will not help the criminal, as time cannot blot out one of the most hideous crimes in the annals of the west.—S. F. Chronicle.

A company from Boston, representing large capital, left San Francisco for Coos bay via Portland last week, to examine coal property there, with a view of purchasing several thousand acres of the construction of a railroad from Coos bay, to connect with the Oregon and California road at Roseburg. Another part of the plan is to establish a line of steam colliers from Coos bay to San Francisco. It is believed that the company means business, and that the plans outlined above will soon be carried into effect.

### A Useful Timepiece.

It has been reserved for an Italian clock-maker in Columbia street, Brooklyn, to produce the most utilitarian alarm clock yet invented. It is a timepiece which, besides striking the hour and letting its master know it, lights the fire and boils the coffee, thus settling the most vexed question of internal harmony in the household. The mechanism is very simple and is not patented. It consists of a metal arm held by a spring against the side of a common wooden alarm clock that has an attachment a spirit lamp and a small coffee-pot. At the point of the metal arm a match is fastened by a catch in such a manner that when the spring is set free by the ringing of the alarm bell and the arm swings out, it grates against a sheet of sand-paper and is set off. It stops directly over the spirit lamp and lights it, the spring being so tempered that the speed of the swinging arm is not great enough to extinguish the burning match. The sleeper, aroused by the alarm bell, gets up to find his coffee boiling and ready for him when he is dressed. The mechanism is devised for the especial benefit of car conductors and other early risers who have little time to spare.—N. Y. Journal.
