The A. B. Field leaves for Tillamook next Saturday.

The salmon are running considerably better this week.

The R. R. Thompson arrived down at 3:25 yesterday afternoon.

Walla Walla is going to have a grand celebration on the fourth of July. So is Astoria—maybe.

The uncontradicted assertion is made that "the gamblers are running Seattle." A good sized contract.

The ladies of the M. E. church will give an exhibition of the Lady Washington Fan Brigade next week.

The Gen. Miles on her last trip to Gray's harbor took over twenty-five passengers and a portable saw mill which M. G. Goodell will put up at Elma.

The Clara Parker arrived down yesterday evening with 200 sheep and 50 head of cattle from the Dalles and Willamette Valley, which were taken on at Albina.

The New Haven, Conn., papers claim that their city is the healthiest resort in the world. Astoria disputes the claim and can furnish proof that the honor should be awarded to this city.

The railroad boom has reached Coos Bay; the papers there believe it is coming, and they have good reason to think so. A continuous line of coast road from Alameda to Astoria is on the programme.

Portland will elect four councilmen next month, and the Standard says that there is an effort on the part of the party managers "to put up tickets in special interests, and for personal ends." Can such things be possible!

Chehalis county, W. T., is getting a good share of this spring's immigration. Considerable is being done in the matter of taking up land and purchasing timber claims. The *Vidette* has over sixty land office notices.

A white sturgeon which weighed sixty-one pounds after being dressed was on the stand in front of John Rogers' yesterday morning. The white sturgeon is pronounced good eating, but it doth not equal the toothsome salmon.

The American str. *Geo. S. Homer*, 116 days from New York, arrived yesterday afternoon. She left up almost immediately. As she rounded the point on her way up the river the vessel presented a beautiful appearance, all sail set and gleaming in the rays of the afternoon sun.

The Oregon arrived yesterday afternoon. The *State* sails to-day. The *Utah* sailed from S. F., yesterday with a heavy freight list including four locomotives and tenders and a large quantity of heavy machinery. She also carries eight large grain separators, threshing machines and a shipment of hay.

The latest of the extraordinary series of disasters to steamers and shipping on the northwest coast occurred last Monday on the Skagit river, the sternwheel steamer *Fanny Lake* being burned to the water's edge. The boat was owned in Seattle. No lives were lost, and the personal effects of the passengers were saved.

At St. Vincent's, Capt. Stephen Davis, a well known sea captain, has been confined to St. Vincent's hospital for several weeks with an affliction of one of his limbs, necessitating an amputation below the knee several days ago. Although he has received the best attention from the good sisters and physicians in attendance, on account of his extreme age (72 years) his recovery is considered rather doubtful. —Standard.

Capt. Davis is well known to hundreds here and in Pacific county who would be glad to hear of the old man's recovery.

Council Proceedings.

At the last regular meeting of the city council a petition asking that H. A. Snow be appointed harbor master, was referred to appropriate committee. A petition of Arch street property owners asking for a temporary suspension of improvement on that street was referred to street committee. A remonstrance from J. Kamm against the acceptance of a portion of Astor street improvement was laid on the table. A recommendation from street committee that proper steps be taken and an ordinance drafted declaring a deficit in assessments against certain lots on Astor street was adopted. A report from street committee to whom was referred a draft of an ordinance appropriating money out of the general fund to pay contractors for improving Astor street crossing, was adopted. An ordinance making an appropriation out of the Astor street fund for the purpose of paying contractors was laid on the table. An ordinance making an appropriation out of the Cedar street fund for the purpose of paying surplus assessments was read first and second times and referred to street committee, as was a similar ordinance in reference to Hemlock street. The ordinance in reference to Astor street was then passed under suspension of the rules. The claims of Jackson & Parks for \$10, and of W. B. Henderson for \$3,245.22 were ordered paid. A resolution offered by Councilman Trenchard that the mayor, common council and city seton go as a committee of inspection of the new city cemetery with a view to laying out and improving the same, was unanimously adopted. On motion council adjourned to meet on the 25th inst, at 7:30 p. m.

Shad in the Columbia.

"Planked shad with their tails shaking," the Philadelphia synonym for fine eating in the fish line, may, ere many seasons be heard in Astoria restaurants if that luscious fish keeps increasing in proportionate degree. In 1878 the government put some shad ova in the McCloud river, California, and the following season a few little fellows were caught in the Sacramento; that year one or two were caught in the Columbia, and being the first shad ever seen here attracted great attention. The next year a few more were caught; last season they were not uncommon, and this year, they have, comparatively speaking, become quite plentiful. Fish connoisseurs proclaim them to be the original dyed-in-the-wool, yard wide shad, the same fish, that beginning on the Florida coast in February tickle the palates of eastern epicures all the way to Maine, where they arrive in the latter part of May. With a little aid to nature this finely flavored fish would soon become one of the stable products of our northwest fisheries.

Log of the Homer.

Barque *George S. Homer* left New York Jan. 27th; 4 p. m. crossed the bar. Feb. 8th took the N E trades in lat 30° 10' N, long 36° 38' W, had good trades which left us in lat 5° N. Feb. 17th crossed the equator in lat 27° 02' W, 22½ days out. Feb. 20th took S E trades, which we had light and baffling all through; lost them in lat 17° 10' N. March 19th passed through Straits Le Maire. March 20th passed up Nassau bay and out into the Pacific by False Cape Horn, 52 days out from N. Y. March 27th crossed lat 50° S in Pacific, in long 89° 31' W. April 12th took S E trades in lat 19° 40' S, long 87° 06' W and lost them in 1° 58' S, had them light and baffling. April 27th crossed the equator in lat 111° 51' W, 89 days out. May 3d took N E trades in lat 10° 39' N, long 116° 55' W. May 9th took N E trades in lat 23° 37' N, long 129° 38' W, had three days good run, then light and baffling trades. May 23d 7 a. m. took pilot off the bar.
