The Tom O' Shanter finished discharging at Portland yesterday. She will load part of her return cargo at St. Helena, and finish at Knappa.

Among the features of the coming concert will be two piano solos, one by Miss May Cook, daughter of Prof. E. Cook, of Portland, and one by Miss Nora Wilson.

Sheriff Taylor, of Pacific Co., W. T., says there is \$300 to \$400, lost to the county every year by the 2 ating population paying their poll tax in Oregon instead of there.

The Janet Gold Mining property was sold at Montesano, last Saturday, the personal property bringing \$900, and the real estate \$1,500, this amount being much less than its real value.

There is some talk of organizing a military company. The second city in the state, with plenty of material, we ought to be able to equip a company that would be a credit to Astoria.

The Gen. Miles will leave Gray's dock for Gray's harbor at 6 o'clock next Tuesday morning. The Miles is a staunch boat and is building up a fine trade with our northern neighbors.

Captain Flavel's three-year-old colt "Chance," by Romero, is being trained by Smiley at the White House track. He is a very promising horse and made a mile easily yesterday in 3:09.—Oregonian, 2.

The number of wagons, carriages, trucks, dog-carts, etc., in Astoria is greater this year than ever before. Quite a contrast from the days when there was only one conveyance here, and that a wheelbarrow.

Mrs. Sarah M. Knapp, whose death at Knappa, yesterday, will be learned with regret, was one of the pioneers of the state, and was widely known and respected. Deceased was in the eighty-sixth year of her age.

With the regularity of a ferryboat these great steamers come and go, carrying thousands of passengers and millions of pounds of freight, without danger or detention.

The State of California arrived in San Francisco Thursday night at 10:30. She left Portland at 12:55 A. M. Wednesday, arrived at Astoria 6:45 and crossed out at 8. The time from dock to dock is 45 hours and 25 minutes, which beats her heretofore fastest trip (May 8-10, 1882,) 35 minutes. Running time was 44 hours and 10 minutes. The Queen of the Pacific, however, has the best running time between Portland and San Francisco, having made her last trip down in 43 hours and 10 minutes running, though she waited five hours at Astoria.—Oregonian, 2.

Ocean Grove Camp Meeting.

The above camp meeting will begin July 19th, and continue ten days. The association has secured about fifty acres more land, making in all 200 acres, ten of which are on Shoalwater bay and balance on the sea coast. A road will be cut at once from the coast to the bay, the distance being about a mile, thus enabling persons to spend their time at the coast or bay as they choose. The executive committee has ordered \$800 to be expended at once in clearing and improving the grounds. It is their intention to make Ocean Park the most desirable and delightful summer resort on the north Pacific coast. The surveyors are on the ground and as soon as their work is completed plans will be made and lots offered for sale. The first 50 lots will be sold at \$40 each, one-half paid on application the other half when the lease is given. Rev. W. B. Osborn is superintendent.

Their building, when completed, will cover a space one hundred by one hundred feet. They expect to have their canneries ready by the first of June, and it is their intention to run fifteen gill nets during the fishing season. They will also buy salmon if what they consider a reasonable figure will do it. They will be prepared by the fall to can fruit and vegetables.—Cos Bay News.

The petition for an injunction to restrain the Northern Pacific Terminal company from proceeding with the building of the railroad bridge across the Willamette river has been filed. George H. Williams signed the petition, and the papers were served on the company yesterday. It is understood that the prime movers in the matter are the managers of the Central Pacific railroad company. The matter has been working up on the quiet for some time past, and the probabilities are that there is a big lawsuit on hand.—Standard, 2.

Forger Arrested.

About the first of April says the Post-Intelligencer, a young man arrived in Seattle and registered at the hotel as L. C. Montgomery. He wore fine clothes and rich jewelry, seemed to have plenty of money, and has since connected himself with a gentleman in this city in the real estate business, and also had taken an interest in a grocery store in North Seattle, and was preparing to connect himself with several other business ventures here.

About a week ago a large fine looking man with a full beard appeared in this city and after being here a few days went to Olympia, and arrived here again yesterday. Shortly after his arrival Chief Woolery went down to North Seattle and arrested Montgomery. A reporter called on the large man for an explanation, and in substance received the following information:

"My name is Captain Aull and I am a detective, for Wells, Fargo & Co., with headquarters at San Francisco. This man Montgomery, whom your Chief of Police has just arrested, is a forger, and his proper name is W. M. Roberts. The particular offense for which he is arrested is a forgery on the First National Bank of Pueblo, Colorado, by which he obtained \$7,000 and skipped. He first forged a power of attorney and sold another man's land, and before he got possession of the purchase money, he committed five or six forgeries. The last one in this connection was on March 12th at Pueblo, Colorado. When I arrived here your very worthy chief of police rendered me valuable assistance and we soon succeeded in finding our man. I then went to Olympia, with a requisition from the governor of Colorado for Wm. Roberts alias L. C. Montgomery, which was promptly granted by Governor Newell, and on my return Chief Woolery arrested our man and locked him up. We think a considerable portion of the money is on deposit in Seattle, and we have garnished all the banks here. He is a lawyer and covered up his tracks very nicely."

Capt. Aull and his prisoner went below on the Columbia yesterday.

Life Preservers.
Capt. Wm. P. Gray, who has charge of the transfer boat Billings, at Astoria, has invented a device, the usefulness of which is apparent. It is a ladder for life preservers on board a passenger steamer, and is destined to obviate the rush and confusion that invariably takes place with the method now in vogue, should an accident unfortunately occur. The invention consists in frames or gates hinged to the ceiling beams of a vessel, on which frames the life preservers rest. There is a combination of gates, frames and bars, provided with can projections for unlocking the gates which then swing downward and drop the life-preservers on the deck. By a clever device of the inventor, one man can thus provide a hundred life preservers easy of access by the pulling of a cord, and thus be the means of saving life. Capt. Gray has secured his invention by letters patent. The improvement would be a step in advance were it on every boat that carries passengers.
