There was no lack of fish at the canneries yesterday; everyone visited seemed to have about as many as they could conveniently dispose of.

The Oregon arrived yesterday, Pilot Howes on deck. Capt. A. D. Wass will take the Queen of the Pacific across the bar outward bound today.

The jolly tars aboard the Titan amused themselves flying kites yesterday afternoon. A kite floating above the main-mast of a vessel in the stream is a novel sight.

By a recent decision of J. P. Linton, "Supreme Chancellor of the world," the Washington Territory lodge K. of P. are placed under the jurisdiction of the Grand lodge of Oregon.

The annual session of the Grand lodge of K. of P. of this state, convenes at The Dalles today. Messrs. Boshart, Curtis, Campbell, Fulton and Douglas represent this section of the state.

Out of one thousand five hundred salmon eggs, in the ordinary course of nature only one produces a mature salmon. If all the eggs laid were to produce salmon, in a half a century the ocean would be a moving mass of salmon.

A portion of H. G. Hurlburt's surveying party came in on Sunday and went to Portland. They report the party on the Fishhawk and "pushing along." One of them had a fair specimen of iron ore. They report an easy grade of one foot to the hundred.

The American ship Titan, 1,229, of Boston, Norris master, arrived in yesterday, 153 days from New York with general cargo. The Titan was last here seven years ago, and loaded salmon for Liverpool. She was then commanded by Capt. Berry, since deceased, a brother of Capt. A. W. Berry of this city. She goes up stream today.

The advent of Penobscot salmon is worthy of notice. Four fine fish were taken in the river on the 1st of May, the smallest fish weighing 16 pounds and the largest 23 pounds. A salmon was also taken off North Truro, Mass., on May 2. Last year about 900 pounds were caught in the same locality. This fact shows that salmon stay in the salt water not far from the rivers.

The first quarterly concert of the Astoria Musical Society will be given at Occidental Hall this evening, the performance beginning at eight o'clock precisely. Found Drowned.

At an early hour last Sunday morning the body of John Martin was seen in the water near Jas. Magee's house above Jno. Devlin's cannery. The body was brought ashore, and yesterday the coroner held an inquest, with the following result:

CORONER'S INQUEST. In the matter of the inquest upon the body of John Martin, deceased, we the undersigned jurors summoned to appear before B. B. Franklin, coroner of the precinct of Astoria, county and state aforesaid, at the undertaking rooms in the City of Astoria, Oreg., on the 4th day of June, 1918, to inquire into the cause of the death of the said John Martin, having been duly sworn according to law, and having made such inquisition after inspecting the body and hearing the testimony adduced, upon our oaths each and all do say, that we find the deceased was named John Martin; was a native of ———— aged about 35 years, that he came to his death on the 2nd day of June, 1883, by accidental drowning in the Columbia river near J. A. Devlin's cannery in this city, while in a state of intoxication. And we further find deceased had on his person the sum of \$18.80. All of which we duly certify to by this inquisition in writing. By us signed this 4th day of June, 1918.

Death of Capt. Graham.

Capt. Samuel Graham, who for about a year past has been engaged in boat building in upper Astoria, departed this life yesterday morning after six weeks' illness. Last spring he was taken with the measles which resulted in a severe bronchial affection which terminated fatally. Capt. Graham was a native of Ohio. For many years he navigated the waters of Lake Michigan. He leaves a wife and several children to whom he was most devotedly attached and who now mourn the loss of a kind husband and an affectionate father. The deceased was a member in good standing of Ocean Lodge No. 209, F. & A. M., Pentwater, under the jurisdiction of the Grand lodge of Michigan, and as will be seen by a notice in another column his brethren of Temple Lodge No. 7, will inter his remains today with the impressive Masonic rites and ceremonies peculiar to the order.

At the last meeting of Pacific Lodge No. 18, K. of P., the following officers were elected: A. W. Stone, P. C.; T. R. Rye, C. C.; F. Newell, V. C.; Dr. Shaw, P.

At the regular monthly meeting of Astoria Engine Co. No. 1, held last evening, G. P. Wheeler and B. F. Stevens were elected delegates to the firemen's convention to be held at Salem June 15, 1918; the company also voted \$100 to pay the expenses of the team.

Arndt & Ferchen have put in a new engine at the Point Adams Packing company, which is pronounced a model of strength and durability by all who have seen it. It is a Westinghouse engine, 6 x 6, 12 horse power, and is so constructed that it requires neither adjustment, lining, keying up, packing, oiling or wiping. Arndt & Ferchen are agents for Astoria.

The Astoria Iron Works are still turning out can-filers. They are in good repute among cannery-men, who figure that a can-filer costing \$800, will do as much work in a season as \$1,350 worth of Chinese labor, and then be in good working order for the next season's work, that is, one of the machines will pay for itself and earn over \$500 for its owner the first season.

W. S. Block, for six years hospital steward at Fort Canby, has been assigned to eastern duty, and will leave with his family for New York to-day's steamer. His western reports to THE ASTORIAN during that time have been duly appreciated. Should he issue weather reports on the Atlantic slope the difference between "minimum" and "maximum" will be more marked than at the equable mouth of the Columbia.

He came down from Clifton last Saturday, and in the afternoon dropped into a barber shop and found all the chairs occupied except that of the "boss" of the establishment. Taking it, he received at the hands of the boss scraper an execrable shave. As he left the chair, the boss said, in a tone of apology: "I'm a barber short this week." Salmon Notes.

On the Fraser river high water is prevailing to such an extent as to render fishing very precarious business. Notwithstanding this fact the Spring run is affording a fair reward to those engaging in the catch. One boat recently took 52 fish as a result of one day and two nights' work. The sockeyes are beginning to appear. On the Sacramento river we regret to say the outlook is not so promising. The run of the present week is said to be the lightest of the season. No estimate can be made on the pack thus far. One of the largest packers on the river states that his pack is lighter than the corresponding period of last season by 30 per cent. Fishermen are leaving for the Columbia river, and A. Lusk & Co. of this city discontinued salmon packing on the 1st inst. disgusted. The price of fish remains unchanged at 70c, notwithstanding the efforts made to bring about a reduction. Packers say it will probably remain unchanged for the season; also, that a firm must pack very largely and economically to live out the season, judging what is to come by what is past. One of the largest packers on both the Columbia and Sacramento rivers has advanced his asking price on fish f. o. b. Columbia river for Eastern shipment from \$1.35 to \$1.40 per dozen cans, and on the Sacramento to \$1.32 per dozen cans.—California Grocer and Canner.

In salmon a fair, though not active, trade is doing (principally in British Columbia kinds) at steady rates—22c. 6d. to 23c. per case. Lower qualities are offering at 20c. to 21c., but it is a poor wasty stuff at these figures, and must be rather unprofitable to handle. Columbia-river salmon is still held by importers for 25c. to 26c., as little remains on hand, but not many transactions are passing thereat.—London Grocer.

In canned goods there is very little change to report since last week, and the only sales of moment have been a few parcels of Columbia river salmon, to arrive by the Lake Ontario, at fair prices. The prevailing opinion, however, is that there will be an improved demand very shortly for good well-known brands of the description mentioned, as it is stated that some of the brands of Fraser river fish are not turning out so well as anticipated. From another source the report is that there is a steady demand from the country, although the cold weather has usually a tendency to decrease consumption. There is an ample variety of brands, and buyers have the advantage of the competition which large stocks engender. As has been before pointed out, the arrivals of the season's catch come early and very close together, so that there has been little or no replenishment of stocks from late arrivals—as has been the case in previous seasons. Columbia river salmon is at present quoted at 24c. to 26c., and Fraser river 23c. to 24c. per case.—Liverpool Correspondence American Grocer.

School Election.

At the last meeting of the board of directors of school district No. 1, Mrs. F. E. Martin was elected to fill the position of principal for the ensuing school year. Mrs. Martin will be kindly remembered by many who know her as Miss Brown, prior to her marriage to Dr. Martin in this city last September, shortly after which event Dr. Martin and wife left for Reno, Nevada, where they have since resided.

Miss Carrie Fields was elected to the position of assistant principal—a deserved promotion. There are three more teachers to elect, the directors of the school district being of the opinion that the needs of the district demands an additional teacher for the coming season.

Is this a specimen of your climate?" We assured him it was a fair sample of what we had been having ever since March 1st and which we expected to enjoy until next October or November. He was loud in his praise of our beautiful climate, balmy air, etc., and yet not extravagantly so. The fact is that we have the finest climate in the United States right here in Astoria, and it is only when an Astorian goes away that he realizes the incomparable advantages that he enjoys at home. It never gets too hot or too cold, we are just far enough from the ocean for the sometimes harsh asperity of the breeze to be modified so that the delightful sea air feels like velvet to the cheek; good digestion does always wait on appetite, and health on both, and the wonderful salubrity of this favored spot is best attested by the low death rate. There are localities that are drier; we spent three pleasant years in a sunny nook of the golden state where a cloud was a phenomenon, and a shower was good for an item any day in the year, but like the fabled city of the gods it grew monotonous, and the people stole away to where they could feel the great drops come rejoicingly down and see the fields and forests dressed in living green.

We are quite sure that every man, woman and child that crossed the Columbia bar yesterday morning on the Oregon and looked upon a scene of beauty that is worth crossing the continent to behold, shall take with them through life a most pleasing memory of that glorious scene; it will hang as a pleasant picture in the walls of memory's picture gallery. That wide expanse of shining water, with shadows moving shoreward in its emerald depths; the giant hills fire-crowned and radiant in the golden glory of a May sunrise; the wreaths of silvery mist; the myriads of white-winged boats; the far-off blue of the distant mountains, the busy city on the southern bank of the great river, that moves in silent majesty to the sea; the docks and the shipping, all these must have formed a panorama of interest to the hundreds of human beings who came in yesterday morning to the most favored portion of nature's great domain—the great northwest.

"Manifest Destiny."

The growth of Astoria has been marvelous when you consider that the owners of land thereabouts are not anxious to sell, and that in consequence thereof there has been no "boom" in real estate. On the contrary, the growth of Astoria has been on the slow-and-steady order, as her citizens represent the most conservative element of Oregon's population. Her fisheries are not in any immediate danger, for just about the time the salmon begin to give out, her shad fisheries will begin to assume important dimensions. And when they are gone she can fall back upon the timber forests of the Columbia for foreign export of lumber. So that there is no calculating upon the decline of values in Astoria. Her position is that of a toll-gate upon the lowliest river in the known world, and all her tributaries are recognized sources of cardinal wealth. She has a wonderful water-front and a climate that is synergistic with health itself. She has not much longer to wait for the prosperity which is her manifest destiny.—Tom Merry, in Sunday Oregonian.
