Good for the Cannermen.

THE statement furnished by Mr. E. A. Noyes, in reference to through freight to and from Astoria over the N. P. R. R., has a most important bearing on the profits and prosperity of the salmon business of the Columbia river. It means a relief from the present tariff that practically places an embargo on Columbia river fish in eastern markets, and opens up a new field for the business. At present, it costs twenty cents a case to get Columbia river salmon to San Francisco. That twenty cents exactly represents the advantage that the Sacramento cannery possesses in point of transportation cost. Once remove the increased cost necessarily imposed upon Columbia river salmon in the east, and the ability to lay it down in the great cities of the east coupled with the superior quality of the article, will give a tremendous impetus to the demand for our salmon. When our cannerymen can ship their salmon from Astoria to Chicago at the same rate that it would cost to ship it from San Francisco to the same market, the present percentage that the Sacramento shipper possesses will disappear. The season of '83 will see the last of Columbia river salmon shipments east via San Francisco. The company in making the announcement upon which we comment, exhibit a desire to give Astoria "a fair show," which is all she asks.

It was suggested to us some time ago that the completion of the N. P. R. R. would hurt Astoria's trade as far as the salmon business is concerned, inasmuch as the Columbia salmon would be shipped in refrigerator cars, and sent east in a "fresh" condition. The idea is not alarming. Doubtless on the completion of the road, salmon will be shipped east in refrigerator cars—as a curiosity, probably as a luxury—but no appreciable amount of fresh salmon will ever be shipped from here.

It is his speech at the Dalles last April, Mr. Villard said that the railroad company would soon make a definite decision regarding the construction of the road down the Columbia river, and the line across the Cascade range; that if the construction of these lines was not decided upon within a reasonable time, it would be to the interest of the company to put an end, at the earliest possible moment, of the holding under lock and key, so to speak, which has now been continued for twelve years, to the titles to vast areas of land in Washington Territory and Oregon. "The railroad company recognizes that its prosperity will depend more upon the development of traffic by the settlement of these lands than upon their contingent ownership. Whatever can be done by the company consistently with its trust obligations to the holders of its first mortgage bonds and with a fair treatment of bona fide settlers, to open these lands to general settlement, will be done without unreasonable delay."

A good many people down this way want to know about this matter. Probably when congress meets, Mr. Villard can speak more definitely. It is more than probable that the people can.

NATURALIZED citizens have almost complete control of the press of New York city. Carl Schurz and E. L. Godkin, of the Evening Post; Joseph Pulitzer, of the Morning Journal; George Jones of the Times, and Oswald Ottendorfer, of the Staats Zeitung, are foreign born, and it might be added, all the rest are of foreign descent.

Mr. FAENELL is reported to have said recently, when asked how he was affected by the papal excommunication: "I don't know what it will do for me in the next world, but it has made my fortune in this." His testimonial fund is rapidly nearing the intended sum of \$125,000, while before the Pope's circular was issued, there was little prospect of it ever reaching \$50,000.

Old Junk.
SECRETARY CHANDLER announces that he will sell at public auction thirty old and useless ships belonging to the Robesonian navy. One of the vessels which Chandler proposes to turn over to the junk dealer is the *Alaska*. This is a wooden screw steamer of 2,400 tons, built in 1868. The *Alaska* is at present on this coast. This ship, now condemned to be sold or given away because she is "unfit for naval service," has cost the country \$1,377,471, exclusive of ordnance. Secretary Robeson expended \$548,000 in tinkering her hull and machinery. Thirteen months ago Secretary Chandler reported to congress that the *Alaska*, except in the matter of guns, was "efficient to engage in battle with an enemy of the same general classification." The bureau of construction and repair classed her as efficient, and not requiring the expenditure of a cent. The bureau of steam engineering reported her as in first-class condition. The bureau of equipment and recruiting made a similar report concerning her condition. All that was needed for the *Alaska* was new ordnance.

If the ship was efficient in May, 1882, the N. Y. Star asks how does it happen that in June, 1883, she is unfit for further naval service?

The meanest dead-heading yet reported is in Portland, Maine, where the board of mayor and aldermen have voted themselves admission to all places of amusement free, and have decided to wear a badge "of some appropriate design," so that their identity may be known to the doorkeeper.

CAPTAIN EADS "proclaims to the world" that vessels drawing thirty feet of water can pass from the Gulf to New Orleans without trouble, and therefore the Crescent City claims to have a better harbor than New York.

THE returns issued by the Canadian Department of Agriculture show that 33,161 immigrants entered Canada during May, making 71,293 for the first five months of 1883, against 49,462 in the same period last year.

THE tax rate for city purposes in St. Louis is strictly limited to one per cent; and the only method of increasing the city's revenue is that of raising the tax valuation.

THE Canadian Pacific railway is now finished from Port Arthur, on Lake Superior, to a point 600 miles west of Winnipeg, a distance of 1,095 miles.

LIKE the Suez Canal the East River bridge has more traffic than it can accommodate, and there are already calls for a duplicate of the structure.

NEWS comes of overwhelming floods in the Mississippi in the vicinity of St. Louis. The usual loss and resultant destitution is reported.
