We often see men with a chronic habit of procrastination. They are always about to do something in a few days or in a few weeks; never on a specified time. Their ideas of punctuality are always below par. They are always overestimating dangers and difficulties. Caution which is a good element of character in a business man or any other man is run to the other extreme. When such persons have to say they will do a thing in a few days or a few weeks, it is more than probable they will never do it. The characteristics of corporations and railroad companies are much the same as of individuals. We find those sometimes who are noted for their punctuality, and that have a pride in keeping their promises. Others again, have a habit of procrastination that is as marked as in individuals. To the latter class we fear we will have to place the Oregon Central Railroad people. When the grant was made for a railroad to Astoria it was to have been built in six years. And there was no sufficient reason why it was not built in that time. Now six years have elapsed and seven more in addition to them and very little is done towards building the road. It is always the same old story of a few days or a few weeks until another summer is nearly gone. The rains of winter will soon be upon us and no work done.

BOB INGERSOLL has declared himself as to the political situation. He says: "The Republicans are making all the mistakes they can and the only question now is, can the Democrats make more? The tariff will be one of the great questions, and will be the only one except success. The Democrats are on both sides of the question. They hate to give up the word 'only.' Only for that word they might have succeeded in 1880. If they can only let 'only' alone and say they want 'a tariff for revenue,' they will do better. The fact is the people are not in favor of free trade, neither do they want a tariff high enough to crush a class, but they want a tariff to raise revenue and to protect our interests. I am for protection because it diversifies industries, develops brain, and allows us to utilize all the brain and muscle we have."

The Northern Pacific Express company, with a capital of \$10,000,000, filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of the state of Minnesota on the 13th. This express company was formerly run by the Northern Pacific Road. It is announced that H. H. Haupt, now general manager of the eastern division, will be general manager of the whole Northern Pacific road upon its completion.

GENERAL BUTLER is reported to have had a bureau in operation for some time in Washington working up his presidential chances. The chief effort has been directed toward discovering the attitude the south holds to him, and prospect he has of carrying that section solidly if he should succeed in getting the Democratic presidential nomination.

A HURRICANE swept through the Mississippi valley last Saturday, accompanied by lightning and hail. In Lee county, Iowa, a railroad train was blown from the track, and throughout that state houses were blown down and great damage done to standing grain. Kansas, Missouri and Illinois report losses of life and property occasioned by the storm.

JAN. BLAINE of Maine, writing on the liquor law of his state, says: "Intemperance has steadily decreased in the state since the enactment of the prohibitory law, until now it can be said with truth there is no people of the Anglo-Saxon world among whom so small an amount of intoxicating liquor is consumed as among the 650,000 inhabitants of Maine."

The Democratic managers in Iowa are reported to have a larger campaign fund on hand than the Republicans ever had in the hottest campaign. The prohibition issue gives them the money of the liquor interest in large quantities.

The Mormon Problem.

COLONEL GEORGE L. GODFREY, a member of the Utah commission, in a recent interview outlined what, in his opinion, will be the ultimate effect of the Edmunds bill in accomplishing the purpose for which it was intended. "There are 160,000 people in Utah today," said Colonel Godfrey. "Of these 140,000 are Mormons and only 15,000 Mormons are polygamists. The operation of the Edmunds bill is confined solely to those who practice polygamy. A professor of the Mormon religion with only one wife does not come within the scope of the law. The work of the commission has been confined to disfranchising polygamists. The law provides that every citizen shall be registered before he shall have the right to vote, and if his name don't appear on the register he has no appeal. As female suffrage is one of the Mormon institutions, a large number of women—more women indeed than men—have been omitted from the registry lists along with their lords and masters. So far as possible the commissioners have endeavored to keep the name of every polygamist from appearing on the lists. The Mormons are disposed to interpose every obstacle to the enforcement of the law, which, to them, is extremely odious. They have made up ten test cases which will be submitted to the courts as soon as possible, and the night before I started for the east, writs were served on the Commissioners. While there is no doubt that the courts will affirm the constitutionality of the law, the Mormons will leave no stone unturned to impede its operation."

In seventy-four counties in Iowa a man has to be a temperance man to stand any show for a nomination or election to any office. In twenty-five counties in Iowa a man has to be a whisky man to stand any good show of nomination or election to any office. This rule applies to both parties.
