The Cholera in Russia.

Death of Cetewayo.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 25.—One or two isolated cases of cholera have been reported in Russia during the last few days. A Narkoff paper reports several cases of what is called cholera. Great efforts are being made to purify St. Petersburg. The clergy held a special service of intercession today for the preservation of Russia from disease. A state of siege will be imposed on the city of Nijni Novgorod during the coming great fair.

The Southern Exposition.

NEW YORK, July 25.—President Arthur arrived in this city yesterday en route to Louisville and will open the great southern exposition on August 1st. He will be attended or met by the secretary of the treasury, secretary of war, post-master general and General Sheridan. The occasion is one which warrants this recognition of its importance by these officials. The exposition is intended to afford a practical opportunity to visitors from all parts of the Union to examine the resources of the present development and the capabilities of the southern states. It has been carefully planned and in a manner which reflects credit on the gentlemen who had it in charge. The grounds are large and the buildings not only extensive, but conveniently arranged, and the scheme of exhibits appear to be very well adapted to accomplish its purpose.

The Mining Exposition.

DENVER, July 25.—The mining industrial exposition is attracting thousands of persons. The greatest crowd ever in the grounds was present today. All departments are rapidly filling up. Every feature of the exhibition is a decided improvement over that of last year.

Death of Cetewayo, the Zulu King.

DURBAN, July 25.—The late report of the death of Cetewayo is confirmed. Cetewayo, the Zulu king, has cut so large a figure in the annals of the last six years that his death is noteworthy. He never showed to much advantage as in captivity, but the confinement broke his spirit and ruined his influence over his people, so that his death is probably a relief to those who are engaged in making a compromise with the native tribes of south Africa. It was while engaged in subduing some of the rebellious Zulu tribes that Cetewayo contracted the illness which ended in his death. Cetewayo left a son and heir, an intelligent lad of 16, who will probably be invested with the honors of the throne of Zululand.

The Sun Dance.

CHICAGO, July 25.—A dispatch from Rosebud Indian Agency, D. T., says: The annual sun dance of the Sioux Indians occurred yesterday afternoon at the camp near the agency. About 1,000 Indians were present from all parts of the reservation and a number of white visitors. The ceremony of cutting a pole for the center of the dancing circle was performed Saturday afternoon. Merpie, niece of Standing Bear, was the ax. The charge on the prostrate tree was made by over 1,000 young bucks on ponies. Sunday, a brush inclosure was built and that evening fifteen Indians entered and commenced their long dance, having been fasting four days. In the afternoon the voluntary torture commenced, three men offering themselves. The medicine man performed the operation. He made two vertical incisions in each breast with a sharp knife, and passing a stick under, lifted the flesh and fastened it to the end of a rope depending from a pole. The dancers then worked until they freed themselves by violently breaking the flesh. Followed a woman broke loose in five min-

utes and lives-in-the-air after ten minutes' exertion, but Poor-Dog remained tied up for half an hour before he could tear out the thongs from both breasts. They then all rejoined the dance. Several of the bucks had small pieces of flesh cut from their arms, their squaws offering their arms for part of the loss. The whole was a dreadful exhibition of physical endurance and savage barbarity. At 5 o'clock the dance closed, the participants having jumped up and down, blowing their whistles, for fifty hours without food or water, part of the time in the burning sun. Some were completely exhausted at the close of the dance, their eyes being closed and their bodies in spasms. This probably is the last time these cruelties will be permitted, as a strong effort is being made by the government to stop the sun dance. Orders came to Agents McGillicuddy and Wright this year to prevent its occurrence, but it was impossible to do so.

Morgan's Men.

LEXINGTON, (Ky.) July 25.—The reunion of Morgan's men continued today. In the afternoon 1,500 men marched by the grave of their leader, John H. Morgan, uncovering their heads as they passed. The grave was decorated with flowers. The graves of other Confederate dead soldiers were visited and strewn with flowers. An address by Major Stanley, the orator of the day, was delivered at the grave; subject, "The Life of John H. Morgan."

Yellow Jack.

WASHINGTON, July 25.—The steamship *Indiana*, with yellow fever on board, has arrived at Newport News and has been ordered below the quarantine station. All foreign vessels entering the cape are to be stopped if any sickness is on board.

BATON ROUGE, July 25.—Governor McEnery today issued a proclamation directing all vessels now at the quarantine station in the Mississippi river, infected with yellow fever, to be removed immediately to the quarantine station at Ship Island. All vessels from South America and Cuba are prohibited from entering the Mississippi river.

The Cholera in Egypt.

CAIRO, July 25.—The scene here last night was a melancholy one. It is impossible to walk 100 yards without meeting a coffin or ambulance. The evictions of the inhabitants at Balak and the burning of their dwellings continues. The evicted people are sent to Barrage, where a repetition of the Tantar horrors is probable. Baker Pasha forcibly compelled a recalcitrant doctor to go to Tantar.

The Khedive visited all the cholera hospitals today. In the last twenty-four hours there have been 367 deaths from cholera here and seven at Chibier.

THE CANADIAN PACIFIC.
NEW YORK, July 25.—The Canadian Pacific railway is running telegraph wires to Port Moody, B. C., and intends to extend the system by cables to Japan. The rapidity of the construction of the main line of the Canadian Pacific railroad in the first week in July is without parallel in this or any other country. On Saturday, July 7th, rails were laid upon six miles of the road, and in one week not less than 25 68-100 miles, exclusive of sidings, were completed, an average of about four and one-third miles per day, the highest ever obtained.

Railroad Accident.

ST. LOUIS, July 25.—A special to the *Post-Dispatch* from St. Joe, says a frightful accident occurred last night on the Wabash Railway, near Lawson. A freight train with one passenger car attached ran off the rails. Seven passengers were in the coach, and one, a patent-right man from Lathrop, was killed. Miss Woods of Richmond had an arm broken in two places and a shoulder-blade broken. Another lady, who lives in Lawson and was in a delicate con-

dition, was seriously injured. Neither of these can recover. Of the other four passengers, one, a Kansas City drummer, was seriously injured.

Eight Persons Drowned.

RICHMOND (Va.), July 25.—Night before last a boat containing eight men and two young girls, all colored, that was crossing James river at Fairmount to attend a prayer meeting at Sandy point, upset and eight of the party were drowned.

Women Break up a Prize Fight.

WILKESBARRE (Pa.), July 25.—A desperate prize fight for \$500 was fought near Nanticoke last evening. The principals were Paddy O'Brien, a saloon-keeper, and Mike Brezee. The men had fought eleven rounds according to the rules of the Marquis of Queensberry, when a crowd of women broke into the ring, and, brandishing knives and pistols, put a stop to the fight.

A Sensational Report.

HAVANA, July 24.—The report has been circulated that the captain of the steamer *Niagara* fired and beached his ship to get rid of a contraband cargo. The report is that the captain was carrying war materials to the Haytian rebels and ran his boat ashore, that he might transfer that part of his cargo to another vessel.

Webb's Last Swim.

BUFFALO, July 24.—Captain Webb, the noted English swimmer, perished in an attempt to swim across the whirlpool rapids in the Niagara river, this afternoon. He was rowed in a skiff to a point in the river opposite the old Maid of the Mist landing by John McClay, ferryman at the falls, and leaped from the boat at 4:02 o'clock. The daring swimmer passed the big rapids all right, keeping in the middle of the stream. When he struck the whirlpool he was rushed to the American side, where the waves, it is estimated, are from thirty to forty feet high. The last seen of him he was throwing up one arm. His intention had been to pass the whirlpool on the Canadian side. His shoot of the rapids was extremely thrilling. The refusal of the railroad hotels to have anything to do with what they termed "his going to his death" rendered the affair, financially, a failure. The river has been searched for two miles below the whirlpool, but no trace of Webb has been found. It is generally believed that he was engulfed in the whirlpool. Webb leaves a wife and two children in England. Webb was followed by people in carriages, but they could not get ahead of him. Fred Kyle, manager for Captain Webb, has arrived from the falls and gives up all hope of his safety.
