Leinenweber & Co.'s cannery at Hobsonville begins operations tomorrow.

Gov. Newell and daughter are in the city and will go to Ocean Park to-day.

There will be an adjourned meeting of the city council to-morrow evening.

The Jeanie Landis arrived at Liverpool on the 29th ult., 142 days from Astoria.

The Idaho took on some cannery supplies for Chileat yesterday and left out with a party of Alaska excursionists.

Henry Ward Beecher will come westward via the N. P. R. R., and will probably lecture here about the 24th.

The British ship Rossby, of Greenock, 1321, Fleming master, 80 days from Port Chalmers, arrived in yesterday afternoon.

The latest addition to I. W. Case's bank is a handsome clock in a walnut case, bearing the legend "G. Hansen, Jeweler, Astoria."

The fines in the police court for the month of July aggregated \$1,178; that is, the coin on hand at the close of the monthly "clean-up" is as above.

The sprinkling of the halls of justice with sawdust indicates the approach of the August term of the circuit court, which begins next Monday.

The Standard doesn't believe there has been an honest horse race run in this state for the last ten years. That is rough on the human race.

The entrance to the new O. R. & N. dock will be opposite lot 5, block 133, Shively's Astoria, between West 6th and West 7th streets, 410 feet east of the former entrance.

Tony McCue, the business manager of J. F. and Helene Byrnes is in the city. They will appear in "Comedy Twisters" at Occidental Hall next Monday and Tuesday evenings.

The A. B. Field left for Tillamook yesterday morning. On her return she will have complied with all legal requirements, and will leave again for Tillamook on Saturday, the 4th inst.

Yesterday was a dull, smoky sort of a day, neither fish nor flesh; a splendid day to catch trout, and evidently a good day for collectors of bills judging from the way the dollars rattled.

The recent arrivals in the river are unpleasantly detained. Their cargoes are for Portland, but the low water necessitates lightering and they must first obtain governmental permission to unload at Astoria.

Attention is directed to the adv. of Grace church Parish School. The select character of this school commends it to the attention of parents who desire their children to be given advantages which are usually sought at educational institutions situated elsewhere.

The Oregon went to sea yesterday with 5,000 cases salmon, and a large lot of fishing boats and gear. Our California friends are the ones who are agitated about fall fishing this year. The cannerymen there say they are going to fish on the Sacramento in spite of California statutes.

In a row in Paul Fuhr's gambling room on First and Alder streets, Portland at midnight last Tuesday, Wm. Acocok shot and killed Jas. Morley. Acocok was look-out in a faro game at the time and after some talk between the two shot Morley in the head; he then walked to jail and gave himself up.

Cass street at the north intersection of Squemoqua is in a nice fix. Capt. Flavel has relaid the street with planks and has done all that he can do, and as it now stands, the street is a constant danger after dark. The blood stains on the plank show where some poor fellow was tripped yesterday morning. The barricade is just high enough to catch one on the shins and upset him.

D. P. Thompson has a force of men at work on the other side of Tongue Point, digging trenches and laying pipe. He has fished out 1,285 pieces of pipe in a fair-to-middling condition from the burned O. R. & N. dock, and with the assistance of a little tar is putting them in trim. The St. Lucie, which is liable to drop in from New York any day now, has 246 tons of water pipe on top of her other cargo and will discharge the lot at Astoria.

Astoria's Growth

Reports from Wells, Fargo's express office, from the postoffice and other sources, shows that Astoria's business is increasing at a rapid rate. Perhaps nothing illustrates the growth of the place as a port better than the following: The receipts at the Custom House for the twelve months ending June 30, 1883, amounted to \$109,604.97; the receipts for the preceding twelve months aggregated \$92,829.78. The Astoria Custom House turns in a net revenue to Uncle Sam of over \$100,000, and it is but simple justice to the collector and his clerical force to say that his affairs are so conducted as to leave no room for complaint.

Railroad Earnings The approximate gross earnings of the Northern Pacific Railroad company for the month of June were \$788,700; road miles, 1,701; corresponding month of last year, \$704,616.60, road miles 1,208; increase, \$83,084.40, road miles 493. Twelve months last year, \$5,430,305.56; increase, \$2,482,119.73. The earnings of the O. R. & N. Co., for the first eleven months of the fiscal year were as follows: July 1 to April 30, \$4,215,310; net \$2,059,806; May, \$427,690; total, \$4,642,910; net earnings, \$2,273,663. Earnings for May, 1882, \$412,213; net, \$201,765.

Wait Till the Rain Comes. The figures we presented in Tuesday's issue illustrate the importance of the salmon industry to Astoria, and the gradual concentration of the business at this place. Last season there were nineteen canneries, packing 341,400 cases, paying \$614,520 to fishermen; this season there were twenty-four canneries, catching 410,090 cases, and paying to fishermen \$1,096,200. These figures apply exclusively to Astoria. A large proportion of the amount expended by the other fourteen canneries on the river found its way to Astoria and accelerated business in various ways.

The assistant chief engineer of the Central Pacific Surveying Department, with chief engineer Morris, of the Oregon railroad, has selected the point of junction for the road two miles south of the Oregon boundary in Siskiyou county.

A noticeable feature in the present salmon season is the large size of the fish, not alone during the great run of July, but through the season. An upriver canneryman on comparing his fish tallies last Tuesday found that while he had packed 6,500 more cases this season than last, he had only caught 300 more fish.

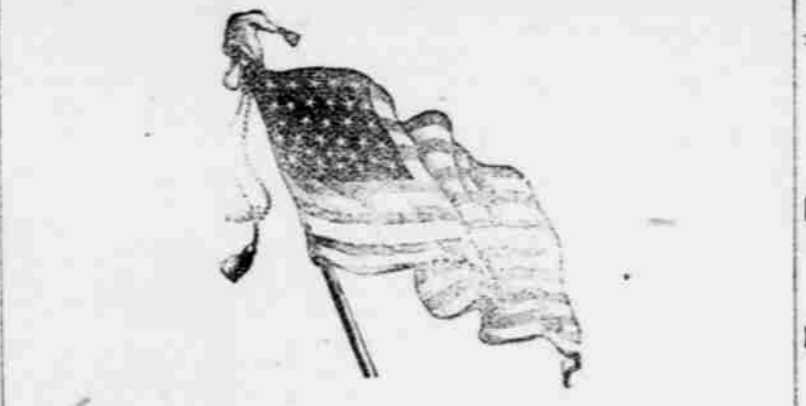
