ASTORIA, OREGON: SATURDAY, AUGUST 4, 1888. A Dark Chapter in History.

On May 6th, 1882, civilization was shocked by the news that Lord Frederick Cavendish, the secretary for Ireland, and under secretary Burke, were brutally murdered in Phoenix Park, Dublin. The detective machinery of the English government was put in motion, and after one of the most complicated efforts in the annals of criminal detection the murderers were apprehended, tried, and executed—all but one, —Jas. Carey, who saved his life by informing. But he only postponed his fate. A storm of execration assailed him, his life was threatened, and he appealed to the government for protection. He was the principal villain, but the English government having tacitly agreed to take care of him, tried his best to do so. Announcement was made that he was to be sent to London, that his fare had been paid to Canada, that he would join his family in New York, etc., but in the meantime, with the utmost secrecy he had been conveyed on board a vessel bound for "the other side of the world," far-off Africa. But pursuit was keen. Though the most special and extensive measures had been taken to preserve his life, yet revenge fathomed all disguise. Carey was a passenger on the Kingfaun's Castle for Capetown, and on his arrival there was transferred to the Melrose, to go to Port Natal. While at Port Elizabeth last Sunday morning, a man named O'Donnell shot and instantly killed Carey. O'Donnell says his determination to kill him was formed after the Melrose left Cape town. Then Carey, by his conduct indicated his identity and acted in such a manner as to create in the prisoner an irresistible impulse to kill him. O'Donnell points to the fact that Mrs. O'Donnell accompanied him as a proof that his journey was not one of conspiracy. The police claim to have proof that O'Donnell drew the executioner's lot in Dublin. That he was posted in London by the invincibles under orders to follow Mrs. Carey wherever she went, until somewhere, with her children, she should meet the man who, by her and their conduct would be indicated beyond all doubt as Carey, and to kill that man the moment his identity was made out.

O'Donnell was placed in irons by the ship's officers immediately after the shooting. There is some doubt of the place of final trial. The opinion is that as an offense on the high sea, the prisoner will be brought to England and tried by an admiralty commission—that is, by ordinary judges, with, perhaps, the first lord of the admiralty sitting on the bench. He was accompanied from Ireland by his wife, who appeared to be on intimate terms with Carey continually during the voyage. Third-class berths on the steamer Kingfaun's Castle were secured June 30th at the Dublin office of Donald Currie & Co., for Port Elizabeth, for a Mr. Power and his wife and seven children, which it is well known was the exact number of James Carey's family. July 21 O'Donnell secured passage for himself and wife on the same steamer. Donald Currie & Co. were not aware of the identity of Power.

The Times pronounces the death of Carey a public misfortune and says he has been an instrument of justice. His murder is calculated to encourage the daring and lawless to commit acts of violence.

The Walla Walla Union in a well written article shows that it costs 32 cents a bushel to get wheat from there to Portland. With a system of transportation in accordance with the natural law of freights, the wheat could be put at Astoria for less cost, and loaded at Astoria in vessels at a lower charter rate than can be obtained when the vessel must go to Portland.

"WHERE Ischia smiles with purple isles" etc., is now a scene of horror. A second earthquake last Wednesday completed the work of devastation. The Italian king has directed a contribution of money and food to the suffering survivors.

Salmon in August.

ED. ASTORIAN: What would be said of our market men if they were to slaughter animals in the pangs of parturition and offer their flesh for sale in the shops. Yet "A. H." in the Oregonian, suggests extending the salmon catch to the fifteenth of August.

July 31st is as long as health and decency will allow the packing of salmon. After that the fish are soft and flabby in meat and pale in color, unfit to pack and will not make a pure article. The reputation of Columbia river salmon should not be injured by putting into market any such stuff. For another reason August fish should not be taken. They being ready for spawning, no doubt stop in the lower river, perhaps on the shoals and sands of the lower Columbia. They should not then be taken, scattered or disturbed. Common consideration of the future would demand such action. April fishing should be strictly forbidden. There is nothing in the fishing of that month but the destruction of gear and a few early fish and loss of human life.

Spring fish are strong and furnished for a long run—to the headwaters of the streams. They should be allowed to reach there. With them in the upper streams and the August fish in the lower rivers some little offset would be offered to the immense slaughter of two million of grown salmon during the 90 days of May, June and July.

The Legislature of Washington Territory meets this fall. It should pass a law prohibiting April fishing, Oregon's Legislature meets next year when it should pass a similar one. Each should also appoint a fish commissioner, whose duty it would be to see that the laws concerning the fish interests were enforced, and to collect facts and report to the government department upon the interests of the salmon fisheries.

PERLUITS.

The Last Spike.

A LARGE party will leave New York on the 29th, as guests of Henry Villard, to witness the opening of the road a few miles west of the Mullan tunnel. The party will stop a day each in St. Paul and Minneapolis, reaching Helena, Montana, September 7th. The party will go to the junction of the tracks in the morning, and William M. Everts will make an address, and Villard will drive the last spike that will unite the two divisions of the road. It is expected that President Arthur will be present, having by that time finished his tour of the Yellowstone park. All the ex-presidents of the road will be present except Josiah Penham, who designed the road and died in 1868 before a shovelful of dirt had been dug for its construction. The other ex-presidents are ex-Governor J. Gregory Smith of Vermont, General George W. Cass of New York, C. H. Wright of Philadelphia, and Fred Billings of New York. A number of prominent English and German guests, public men and journalists will arrive on August 29th to join the party. After the ceremonies some of the party will return east and the remainder will go over the whole of the road to Portland, Puget Sound and through the Willamette valley, returning to New York on September 28th. The German government will send some one of its highest officials connected with railways to attend the opening ceremonies of the completion. It is expected that President Van Leventhal will attend. If not he will be represented by one of the vice-presidents. The principal German newspapers will have special correspondents. Some of the delegations will sail on the steamer Elbe on the 15th. It is authoritatively stated that the entire expenses of German guests, from the time of their departure to their return, are to be defrayed by the Northern Pacific.

A LONDON dispatch says that as Carey was shot at 4 o'clock on Sunday afternoon, and the steamer Melrose, on which the shooting occurred, arrived at Port Elizabeth at 2 o'clock on Monday afternoon, the facts seem to show that O'Donnell was outside the Colonial jurisdiction when he committed the crime, and must, therefore, be tried in England.

At Providence, R. I., the national civil service reform association met last Wednesday. In his annual address, Geo. William Curtis, the president, in allusion to President Arthur, said that the president's steady refusal to satisfy the faction of his party which demands that public patronage shall be prostituted to factional interest is most honorable to the chief magistrate, and whatever exception may be justly taken to the many acts of the administration in regard to the appointments and removals, it will not be denied by fair men of every party that the president, whose accession by means of a most tragical event was generally regarded as a misfortune and calamity, has not only allayed all apprehension of a gross misuse of the patronage of the government, but by his patient and temperate administration he has gained the general approval of the country.

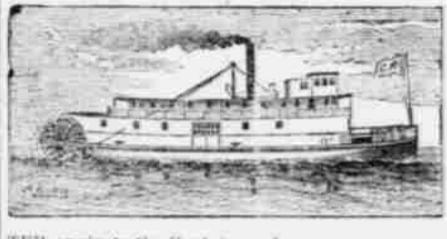
