A Boy with a Head Sixteen Inches Across.

At the town of Canby, in Clackamas county, is to be seen one of the most singular freaks of nature ever heard of in the genus homo line in this state. It is twelve years old and is of such a peculiar make-up that it attracted the notice of a *Vindicator* representative who was there last week.

The family that own the prodigy is named Welmergot and consists of two persons—father, mother and two children, of which the curiosity is one. It is a boy aged twelve years, and outside of the general features that make him resemble a human being the like-ness ceases and his looks make one stop and study him as if he were something more than natural flesh and blood. He was seen sitting in a chair and was thus described:

About four feet high, with a pair of shoulders broader than any man's in the state and a pair of legs in proportion, at the extremities of which were a pair of No. 6 shoes. His hands and arms are more than ordinarily large for one of his age, in fact as large as any full grown man's. The greatest part of the curiosity is the size of his head which measures across from side to side and from front to back, the extraordinary dimensions of sixteen inches. The size of his head may be inferred from the fact that it is as large in circumference as the outside of these large white hats so frequently seen in the country. His skin is fair and soft, and especially his face is clear and of a pinkish hue. His features are all abnormally large and in proportion to the size of his head. His eyes are light blue and large and round and restless, constantly roving around the circumscribed limits of the room where he sits nearly all day long. They were described as resembling the dial of an alarm clock. He can read a little and as he sits he peruses the papers given him, but he soon tires out. He can sing a little, and enjoys being talked to and is very rational and intelligent. Altogether he is the greatest curiosity that has been found for some time.

The inauguration of the bust of Garfield will take place Aug. 24, under the auspices of the grand lodge of Masons of California. NOTICE is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Astoria propose to order the construction of a sewer twenty inches wide and eight inches deep in front of Lots 1, 2, 3, and 4, Block No. 68, along the south side of Court Street, in the City of Astoria, Clatsop County, Oregon, as laid out and recorded by John McInnis and extended by Cyrus Olney to connect with existing street sewer; the sewer to be used in the construction of said sewer shall be found not less than two inches in thickness, and unless a recommendation is signed by the owners of the two-thirds of the property fronting on said portion of said street be filed with the Auditor and Clerk within ten days from the final publication of this notice, viz. June 24th, 1906, the Common Council will order and improvement to be made.
