Not Troubled.

In a recent New York interview Henry Villard said that he was not troubled about the fall in Northern Pacific stocks; that they were held for the control of the road and the fluctuations would make no difference. He considers the investment good and predicts the road would earn fifteen millions next year.

"How do you propose to fund the Northern Pacific floating debt?" a reporter asked.

"Northern Pacific has no floating debt," Mr. Villard answered, with much earnestness. "It has been paid by the Oregon and Transcontinental company, we could not issue second mortgage bonds without getting the consent of our stockholders. We do not contemplate anything of that kind, we have discussed it. There is no need of any new issue of bonds, because there is no floating debt, for the Oregon and Transcontinental Company holds satisfactory obligations of the Northern Pacific railroad, as in business a merchant may borrow money on his note. I consider every obligation of the Northern Pacific just as good as gold."

One hears occasionally, says the World, through the English society papers, of the presumption, arrogance, vulgarity, and impudence of American tourists in England, but we doubt that the English papers can furnish an American example combining all these qualities that will at all compare with her distinguished son, the young Earl of Onslow. He solicited and obtained an invitation to join the Villard excursion party. Then he demanded an entire car for himself, and turned up his nose at the other guests.

Then he refused to allow any of the guests to pass through his car. Considering that every one of the guests cost the railroad five hundred dollars, and the Earl of Onslow has four persons with him, it will look to most Americans as if this son of nobility were little better than a free-lunch fiend and a professional dead-head.

One of the cleverest brochures we have lately read was received on yesterday's steamer. It is a book of 95 pages entitled "84, a political revelation," and in incisive English gives a history of political movements in the United States, from the summer of 1833 to the summer of 1884, when in the National Republican Convention at Philadelphia Blaine was nominated for the presidency, and in the National Democratic Convention at Louisville, Ky., Ben Butler received the Democratic nomination for that exalted position. It is seldom we mention the books received at this office, but anyone who will send to Donnelly & Co., 223 Carter street, Philadelphia, for a copy of the work, will be interested, amused, and, possibly, instructed.

The New York Examiner says: "A Methodist preacher of long experience (a doctor of divinity, too) lately remarked in a southern paper: 'I have known hundreds of men and women, who made no pretensions to holiness, who had experienced no 'second blessing,' who sought no 'higher life,' who, in fact, were just as pure, true and holy in life and conversation as the best so-called 'holiness people' I ever saw, and not half so troublesome in the church.' There is nobody who can stir up so many church rows, and keep them boiling so long, as your brother or sister who has received the 'second blessing,' and is living the 'higher life.'"

The vast population, traffic and turmoil of the world's metropolises are strikingly suggested by the simple statement that 2,200 trains leave the railroad stations of London every twenty-four hours.

THE run of salmon on the north-west coast has ceased. The Rivers Inlet Company packed the past season 9,500 cases, the Victoria Packing Company salted 2,000 barrels, the Aberdeen and Inverness Canning Companies have each 6,500 cases, the British American 400, White & Cuthberts, at Balmoral, 500, Weltleakatia 6,000, Warren & Co., of Nass Harbor, 9,000 cases and 2,000 barrels salted, Crossdale & Co., 1,100 cases at Bella Coola, McDowell & Co., 300 barrels. The steamer brought down 6,000 cases from Skeena and 100 barrels from Alert Bay.

OREGON Short Line engineers report the line from Burnt River to Lewiston practicable. A noticeable feature of their report is that though they represent that there will be some cuts, rock work, and in one case a 1,500 foot tunnel, yet they place the cost of the road, ready to operate, at \$35,000 per mile. It is evident that if such a road can be built for \$35,000 a mile, the alleged estimates of Villard's engineers are grossly exaggerated.

An exploring expedition, equipped with four canoes and a score or more of men, is to be sent into the Florida everglades by the New Orleans Times-Democrat. The everglades have never been thoroughly explored. Hundreds of Seminoles are supposed to be living in their recesses, and to hold negro slaves.

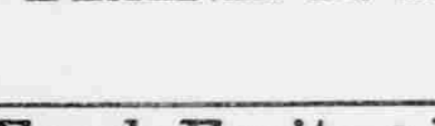
