The annual meeting of the West Shore Packing Company will be held on the 23rd inst.

The Swedish bark Varpo, Sandborg master, arrived in from San Buenaventura, Calif., yesterday.

Shipping was quiet yesterday. The Varpo, Willamette and Columbia arrived in. The Greenery came down.

At half-past ten this morning E. C. Holden will begin to sell the stock of the late firm of A. M. Johnson & Co.

Owing to the unavoidable delay in getting the new schoolhouse under way, the directors of district No. One have decided to begin school next Monday at Liberty Hall, temporary accommodation being provided there until such time as the new rooms are in readiness. It is thought that by November 15th, they can be occupied, when the little folks will be instructed in one of the prettiest school-houses in the Northwest.

Council Proceedings.

An adjourned meeting of the city council was held last Wednesday evening, at which time was presented a petition of Washington street property owners, asking for the improvement of that street. A remonstrance of West sixth street property owners against improving that street was read and the auditor and clerk instructed to stop publication of notice. A communication from Mrs. A. Brown was referred to health committee. A petition from R. L. Jefferies in regard to ordinance 531 was laid on the table. The street committee to whom was referred the petition of Concomly street property owners for street lamps, reported favorably. The city treasurer's report for quarter ending Sept. 30, 1883 was read and the committee on ways and means. The reports of street superintendent, sexton and city attorney for September were referred. An ordinance declaring the probable cost of improving West eighth street was passed under suspension of the rules, as was also an ordinance extending the time for repairing Water street, likewise three ordinances making provision to pay the claims of W. B. Headington, H. C. Harrison and Wm. Kniepmeier. Ordinances declaring the probable cost of improving Cushing's Court and West seventh streets were read first and second times and referred to street committee. An ordinance closing saloons and sundry other places of business from midnight to five a. m., the following day was read third time and passed. Ordinances forfeiting the licenses of Geo. Hill and H. Wiseman & Co., were read third time and passed. An ordinance providing for the construction of a bulkhead was read third time and passed. The following claims against the city were ordered paid by warrant: C. H. Himes, \$28; B. F. Stevens & Co., \$8 40; N. D. Raymond, \$21; G. McGowan, \$1 50; Jas. Gill, \$9; P. O. Seaborg, \$6; A. Oll, \$6; P. Norris, \$10; C. Alexander, \$21; G. Lindal, \$21; T. Eccles, \$6; H. C. Harrison, \$960; Wm. Kniepmeier, \$47 50. The following resolution offered by councilman Trenchard was adopted: Resolved: That the committee on streets and public ways together with the city attorney, be and they are hereby authorized to confer with the property owners along the shore line of the N. W. corner of the city of Astoria as laid out by Cyrus Olney for the purpose of making a permanent street sixty feet wide from Spruce street in a westerly direction to the city limits.

On motion the council adjourned. The present aspect of freights on this coast is an anomalous one. There are forty idle vessels in San Francisco, with several hundred thousand tons of wheat awaiting shipment, ship owners refusing to charter at prevailing rates. There are thirty vessels in the Columbia river now, many of which are as yet disengaged under precisely the same conditions as exist in California. Of the thirty vessels here, fifteen of them are American, an unusually large percentage carrying our own flag.

The San Francisco Call's correspondent in the California village of Rio Vista, on the Sacramento, where 90,000 salmon are canned every year, writes that a unique spawning ground has been discovered near that place. He continues: "It had always been held impossible for the eggs to incubate there, as there were no clean gravel and sand beds, and no fresh, cold, pure running water. But although the water near the surface is muddy, a part of the slough bottom is sand and gravel, with a water depth of from twenty-five to forty feet; and although the current of the slough seems wholly tidal and no affluents of running water reach it on the surface from any source, yet pure cold water pours through from a subterranean source, and the salmon resort to this little piscatorial paradise in numbers that fill the available swimming room. No practiced fisherman would have thought of looking for salmon there, and indeed it was a 'greeny' who first discovered them."

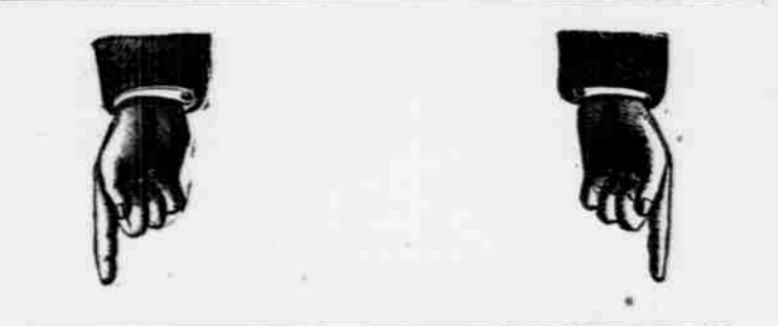
