THE United States treasury now holds more money in its vaults than ever before since it was established.

THE Standard says the Republican party must go next year. Our clever contemporary certainly enjoys a good joke.

AMONG other Washington statesmen, Blaine is reported to have lost heavily on the October deal in Oregon Transcontinental.

CANADA'S national debt is, in proportion to the population, higher than that of any other country, and it is rapidly growing.

A BERLIN official who has spent eighteen months in Alaska, says the natives are getting ready for an outbreak. Stranger things might happen.

RUSSIAN dispatches assert that nihilistic influence is weakening and that they lack the means and influence they had possessed in former years.

THE drooping freight market at San Francisco shows signs of still further depreciation. Two wooden vessels were chartered last Monday for 33s for U. K.

THE pension list steadily increases. During the fiscal year ending with June last, 38,958 pensions were added, being an excess of 10,345 over the preceding year.

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., is the latest unfortunate town to be visited by a cyclone, one of those frequent wreckers of destruction having spread havoc and death in that vicinity last Monday.

THE whites and negroes are clashing in Fredericksburg and Danville, Va., in a manner that it is feared will result in a riot. Possibly the result of yesterday's election may assuage the difficulty.

IN Ohio it is reported that Pendleton and Thurman have effected an arrangement under which Pendleton is to return to the senate and do all he can to procure Thurman's nomination for President.

CHIHUAHUA dispatches have Juh the Apache chief killed again. This time he was being pursued by Mexican cavalry, and finding escape hopeless, he committed suicide by spurring his horse into a gulch.

THE legal authorities of Greenwich, Conn., are in a state of mind over Jerry Whalen's liquor saloon, as they cannot close it on Sunday, because the New York state line runs through the house, and he sells on the New York side.

IT costs \$15,000,000 a year, in round figures, to maintain our naval establishments, there being about 16,000 persons on the payrolls, of whom more than 2,000 are officers, 9,000 enlisted men and boys, and the remainder civilians employed as mechanics, clerks, etc.

AT a recent school election in Olympia, the question being should a special school tax be assessed or not, the women learning that there was in danger of the tax being defeated, turned out in force and carried the vote in the affirmative "by a large majority."

IT is said that there are only four nations in the world to-day that are paying their way. England generally manages to make both ends meet and show a trifling surplus of \$2,000,000 or \$3,000,000 to be applied to the reduction of its enormous national debt; the United States, in spite of congressional extravagance, puts by nearly fifty times as much; and Holland and Belgium keep about even. With these exceptions every nation in the civilized world shows an annual deficit of more or less millions.

THE English cabinet has decided that it is time for England to take part in the coming Franco-Chinese fight, and it is reported that orders have been issued to British naval commanders to resist any attempt on the part of the French to blockade Chinese ports.

ANOTHER European war is pretty nearly "due," judging from the intervals which elapsed between the wars of the last thirty years, and which have recurred on an average of about five years, the period which has now nearly expired since the close of the Russo-Turkish campaign.

DURING the past few weeks nearly 4,000 troops have returned to France from Tunis, and it is expected that before the middle of November between 5,000 and 6,000 more will have returned. France is apparently finding the preservation of peace in the regency less difficult than was anticipated.

THE extent of the cattle plague in Russia, which still continues its ravages with unabated fury, may be imagined from statistics gathered on the subject by the minister of the interior. According to these no less than 1,010,962 head of cattle perished during the last four years in European Russia alone.

BALTIMORE, having more than \$20,000,000 in oyster packing, and over 30,000 persons engaged in the business, is taking measures to prevent the destruction of the oyster beds in the Chesapeake bay. It is proposed that the period of rest for oysters shall be lengthened, and extend from April 1st until October 1st.

THE editor of the Mountain Democrat presents a sad picture of demoralization among the wealthy and prominent men of San Francisco. He writes: "I am credibly assured that every night there are more of the 'away up' fellows—judges, lawyers, doctors, bankers, merchants, and the like—taken home in hacks and cabs, too drunk to navigate, from the clubs and tony resorts, than there are drunks taken from the slums to the lock-ups."

ACCORDING to a Washington correspondent, some of the ex-members of congress who are tolerably good lawyers, are making large fortunes at Washington in the practice of law. They have special advantages of knowing a large number of members of congress. It is said that Bob Ingersoll makes now about \$80,000 a year mostly by his Washington practice, and that he made \$40,000 in his defense of the Star-Route plunderers. In short, Ingersoll is now making so much money in Washington that he cannot afford to dwell on the "mistakes of Moses," in his rounds as an itinerant lecturer. Ex-Secretary Boutwell, who was not originally educated as a lawyer, but was a country storekeeper, having had considerable knowledge of department business, became a member of the cabinet at a later day, and has now opened a law office in Washington. Roscoe Conkling has been doing considerable business in that city of late, and it is said that his practice now exceeds \$50,000 a year. He will probably settle down in Washington until his chances for the Presidency are wholly extinguished, or when he comes to understand that there is no longer any chance for him as a political leader.
