—Leap year is only 52 days off.

—The State is due this morning.

—Capt. Alexander is reported ill in Santa Barbara, Cal.

—Large quantities of geese and ducks from Shoalwater bay.

—The new buildings on Water street are filling up rapidly.

—The Episcopal general convention recently held in Philadelphia is said to have cost \$70,000.

—The second mate of the *Roseland Hill* had the first mate arrested in Portland for cruel treatment.

—Andy Campbell, accused of robbing the Oregon City post office was discharged in Portland last Wednesday.

—Capt. J. E. Lombard has been appointed port surveyor at Portland for the San Francisco board of underwriters.

—Messrs. D. K. and J. F. Warren returned yesterday afternoon. Their excursion extended as far eastward as New York.

—Aug. Danielson has been to considerable expense rebuilding and refitting his place and has a well-stocked sample-room.

—Ducks from up the Columbia are coming in in large quantities. Those from Mr. LaDu's place at Mt. Coffin, are particularly fine.

—The annual meeting of the Pythian Land and Building Association will be held at Pythian castle on Wednesday evening December 6th.

—The gilt figure-head of the *Lee King*, a wood carving representing Henry Tudor, of Boston, is as fine a piece of work of the kind as is generally seen.

—At the store of Foard & Stokes, at half-past ten this morning, E. C. Holden will sell all the rigging, etc., recovered from the wreck of the *J. C. Collins*.

—One of the Washington Territory legislators says he has quit drinking whisky and begun drinking coffee. He considers this to be a "constitutional amendment."

—A Walla Walla councilman acknowledges that five per cent of the money that burg subscribed for the Villard celebration stuck to his hands and wants to know what they are going to do about it.

—Work on the new O. R. & N. dock progresses; there are over 100 men employed; the framing will all be in place next week; the roofing is being put on, and a row of fenders five feet apart are being driven along the front.

—At the annual meeting of the Washington Packing company last Wednesday, the following were elected as a board of directors for the ensuing year: Samuel Arndt, Henry Pias, J. W. Gearhart, John Peterson, Mark Schlusel.

—At the last meeting of the Portland city council, the chief of police charged the *Telegram* with having proposed to his clerk to audit bills for printing, charging double, and then dividing the swag. What is the world coming to, when even printers take a hand in such games? The *Telegram* has not told its side of the story yet.

—Two vessels with the romantic and fanciful names of *Star of Erin* and *Spirit of the Dawn*, arrived in yesterday. The former is a British bark, 949 tons, Coulter, master, 142 days from Glasgow; the latter is also a British bark, 56 days from Brisbane. The *Field* left for Tillamook; the *Miles for Gray's Harbor*; the *Portland* arrived at Knappton; the *Fiery Cross* cleared and went down to Baker's bay. There is a vessel outside.

—It is to be regretted that public statements are not more accurate. Whether through malice or ignorance the announcement in various quarters concerning the loss of vessels on this northwestern coast is almost invariably attributed to "crossing the Columbia bar," when it is an indisputable fact that the loss of a vessel crossing the Columbia bar is of very rare occurrence. The last number of the *Maritime Register* to hand speaks of the loss of the *Cairnmore* "on the Columbia bar." This is on a par with the San Francisco *Merchant*, which located the wrecked *Tacoma* in the same place.

Washington Pioneers.

An organization known as the Pioneers of Washington Territory was organized in Olympia recently with the following officers: Hon. Alexander S. Abernethy, president; Hon. C. C. Howitt, first vice president; Hon. Benjamin F. Shaw, second vice president; John M. Swan, secretary; Geo. A. Barnes, treasurer. The meeting then proceeded to the election of directors, who, together with the president, first vice president and secretary, ex-officio, constituting a board of directors, resulting in the election of Dr. N. Ostrander and James Longmyre to be members of said board. There are now forty-eight members in the society. The society defines the word "Pioneer" as follows: "All emigrants, male and female, who reside within the bounds of the original territory of Oregon, under the joint occupancy by the United States and Great Britain; and all those who came to make a home in California, Oregon and Washington Territory prior to the first day of January, 1856, are eligible to become members of this association."

On motion the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That we cordially and respectfully invite our early compatriots throughout the Territory to become members with us in this association now organized, or to organize branch societies at their respective localities.

Postoffice Department Changes.

James McDowell, of Washington, D. C., assistant superintendent of the railway mail service, has been ordered to duty in charge of transportation of the United States mails and service on the Northern Pacific railroad, west of Bismark, with headquarters at Helena, Montana.

The order took effect November 1, 1883; and relieves Capt B. B. Tuttle from the superintendency of this branch of the postoffice department service. All complaints and inquiries relative to mail matters on the Northern Pacific railroad between the points named, should hereafter be addressed to Mr. McDowell, Captain Tuttle retaining charge of all other railroad lines in the district, comprising Oregon, Washington territory and Idaho. This change is caused by increase of postoffice business in this section, and the necessity for assistance in facilitating the transportation of overland mails.—News.

J. B. Joris, of Olympia, has recently patented an improved toggle for boom chains, which should reconnoiter itself to lumbermen generally. It consists of a boom chain toggle formed of a metallic bar having a medium eye projecting down from its under side, and fits into a hole in the boom stick, the bar being provided with right angle points which stick in the log.

—During the month of October, 1321 emigrants left St. Paul by the Northern Pacific railroad destined for points west of Spokane Falls. A large proportion stopped at stations in Spokane county for the purpose of settling there. A few came on to Oregon and a very considerable number went to Puget Sound. The newcomers are mostly Germans and Swedes, and they come to settle upon government and railroad land as farmers.

Writing of the Short Line road, a correspondent of the Baker City, Oregon, *Tribune*, says: While the Short Line road has been rapidly built, the work has been done in a thorough manner. Indeed, it would be hard to find a railway more thoroughly constructed in the west than this. The road bed looks like that of an old road, and they can run their passenger trains forty miles an hour with perfect safety from Granger to Pocatello. The train which I came in on was a little over two hours late when we left Granger, and this was all made up and we were running on time before we had gone 170 miles.

At Ham's Fork, forty-two miles from the main line, there are as fine coal fields as have been found west of the Missouri river. They cover a large extent of territory and are well-nigh inexhaustible. The Short Line road traverses the winter range of mountains by a zigzag course on a grade of 180 feet to the mile. A tunnel is now being constructed through the mountain 1400 feet long, which will shorten the distance one and a half miles and reduce the grade to 80 feet. These mountains are composed entirely of solid coal. The tunnel is timbered with California redwood, and will be completed about the 1st of January, 1884.
