JOHN SWINTON'S PAPER.

We are in receipt of John Swinton's Paper, published in New York city. It is distinct and unique; it follows no style, but is a style of itself. The editor runs the paper, and no advertiser shall say him nay. He publishes no advertisements and seems to have room for little else than denunciations of men who are rich. The editor's style speaks out in every line. There is no mistaking what he says and what he means. Every sentence is an autograph; discards the editorial "we," and says "I" think, "I" say, "I" believe. This is very pleasant to read, and his paper covers of that good time when all men will be ready to put their angel garments on, and clothed in crystal wing their way to the heavenly shore. The trouble is, Mr. Swinton is altogether too good. He means well, and had he somebody behind him with a big sack of money he would doubtless make a sensation. It is with regret that we prophesy Mr. Swinton's failure. To start out to reform the world now-a-days, a man must have an unlimited supply of that which all reformers profess to disregard—money. From nothing, nothing comes. The reformer undertakes a big job. People listen to him; they say "that's so; you're right," and go ahead as usual. We all laugh in reading "Don Quixote," at the doughty hero's encounter with the wind mills, but it is no less amusing, in our set-up, to see any one man start out to bend down the existing order of things and stay the course of events. That it is amusing to see the effort and the attendant lurch, realizing at the time how futile it all is.

In another sense it is the reverse of amusing. An enthusiastic man, full of good intent, energy, lofty purpose and determination, starts with a set object in view; that object the forwarding of humanity's cause, and as day by day slight are offered him, confidence is withheld from him, opportunities are denied him, obstacles are shown in front of him, he day by day loses a little, and a little more of all that impels him to the conflict. Now and then before he falls another hand snatches the flag and advances with it in determined confidence of the conflict; now and then the blast of victory is blown above the grave of the dead hero; now and then the principles for which he fought are vindicated and his memory honored though success be denied him in life; but, in general, the world is too big, too busy, and too selfish to listen.

The Washington Territory legislature adjourns this week. Whitman county has been divided, two new counties are cut off. Franklin county begins at the Snake river junction and comprising that territory between the Columbia and the Palouse river. Adams county lies west of range 38. Douglas county was cut off from the western part of Spokane county, with Okanogan as the county seat.
