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**Around the City.**  
 The intometer doesn't know what to make of this weather.  
 The Standard's report is either sent us a copy that can be read, or else—  
 Something of more importance must be going on—the lines are down in every direction.  
 The dictionary is not as big as the post office, but it contains more letters to the square inch.  
 The newly elected officers of Temple Lodge No. 7, F. & A. M., will be installed this evening.  
 Kam's knock down and gift sale is in full operation. The drawing takes place next Monday.  
 The regular quarterly examination for teachers begins at 8:30. School office at nine o'clock to-morrow morning.  
 C. H. and Griffin Read will give a unique entertainment at Liberty hall this evening in aid of the Y. M. C. A.  
 The Seattle Herald publishes a fine Christmas edition. The Herald is a painstaking paper and deserves its success.  
 The regular entertainment of the Astoria Social Club will be at Pythian Castle Hall this evening, beginning at half-past seven.  
 In another column will be found an official transcript of the docket at the next term of the Circuit court which meets next Wednesday.  
 The R. R. Thompson came down in flying style from Portland yesterday. She was light, swift, and freight being remarkably scarce at all river points.  
 The proprietors of the pilot schooner City of Nepe intend sending the vessel to San Francisco after January 1st, and will go out of the piloting business.  
 Attention is directed to the advertisement of Mr. C. W. Leick, a practical architect and draughtsman, who comes well recommended in his profession.  
 "Zampierostationist" is the name which some one says is the correct one to apply to a roller skater. This will make the exercise more widely exhibiting than ever.  
 Christmas was quietly spent in Astoria, home pleasures furnishing the principal enjoyments of the day. Several private gatherings took place, and nearly everyone "had a good time."  
 Cushing Post No. 14, G. A. R., intend giving a ball on the occasion of the visit of Gen. Calkins to the Post, which will be about the middle of next month. A series of card parties is also contemplated.  
 Rev. J. V. Milligan was handsomely remembered by his parishioners on Christmas. Among his presents were Paul's "Haven," Colbridge's, "Ancient Mariner," and a purse of \$20 from the Bible class.  
 Henry Kemp, down from Cathlamet, informs us that the mill men in his vicinity have been quite successful in getting a good supply of logs to their mills. Over \$300,000 worth of logs were taken down Flanagan creek this season.  
 Nearly every Astorian who rents a box in the postoffice finds nowadays a lottery advertisement therein. Planning an announcement is made of the man who won the \$2,000 prize. There is no mention of the fifty thousand who lost.  
 However it may be in other places, real estate transfers in Astoria show that prices are falling up to previous figures. There is no steady index to the permanent prosperity of a city than that afforded by the price of real estate within its limits or adjacent thereto.

 About ten o'clock last night a loud outcry from the ship between Wilson & Fisher's and Hume's, attracted the attention of some passers-by, who, hurrying to the spot, dragged out a party by the name of Heymann who was clinging to the piles. He was profuse in his expressions of gratitude, and offered to "see 'em up" for all hands.  
 A very enjoyable time was had at the residence of E. C. Holden last evening; the occasion being a surprise party given Miss Emma Holden. About twenty couples were present, and all enjoyed themselves to the fullest extent. A beautiful repast was served and with music and song the evening passed so pleasantly that it will be one long remembered by those participating.  
 To REMEMBER.—At a citizens meeting, held at the city hall at half past seven last evening, it transpired that the total cost of the recent trial in Portland before Judge Deady wherein certain citizens of Astoria were fined \$1,000 and costs, aggregated \$2,235.53. It was decided that the parties in the suit be reimbursed. About \$1,200 of the amount is already pledged, the remainder to be raised forthwith.

**Council Proceedings.**  
 The city council having met and adjourned on Christmas evening, a special session was held at the city hall last evening, Mayor Hahn presiding; present, Councilmen Case, Cooper, Hume and Tronehard; in attendance, T. S. Jewett, Auditor and Clerk; C. W. Loughrey, Chief of Police.  
 The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved.  
 A communication from the fire warden was read recommending change of ordinance concerning terra cotta tile fire; referred to committee on fire and water.  
 The committee to whom was referred the matter of C. W. Loughrey and Thos. Hunter, reported, recommending that C. W. Loughrey be fined \$25 for neglect of duty, and that Thos. Hunter be allowed his salary up to the adoption of the report; likewise recommending that if present police force be sufficient, Thos. Hunter be honorably discharged. The motion adopted the report was carried.  
 The report of the superintendent of streets for October was adopted. The report for November was referred.  
 The report of city sexton for October was adopted.  
 The following claim was ordered paid: W. R. Headington, \$108.03.  
 The following resolution offered by Councilman Tronehard was adopted:  
 That the superintendent of streets be and is hereby instructed to at once commence the improvement of the present five traps by placing or making the same three inches higher than at present, that they be more easily observed.  
 On motion council adjourned to meet January 7, 1884.

**May Lose Her Charter.**—On Sunday the British bark *Race*, 209 tons, Barbours, master, 75 days from Newcastle, N. S. W., showed up. The following day a pilot was put aboard, but the weather since then has precluded all possibility of getting in. As the vessel has a 656 tons, and no charter expires unless she gets to Portland next Sunday, it is an even bet who is wishing the strongest, the captain that he can make it, or the charterer that he can't.

**Tough Punishment.**—For two or three days past the chief of police has had a prisoner serving a sentence for some infraction of the city laws, standing in the cold rain on the street with a ball and chain attached to him. It appears that the prisoner refuses to work out his fine on the streets, and is therefore placed on exhibition, which is according to the statute. It is a privilege that prisoners are to work out their fines, and if they do not wish to, no power can be vested in the city to compel them. A prisoner is sent to jail for a term of days, and not worked on the street, or to stand on the streets, where people can see them and have their sympathies enlisted in his behalf.—Standard.

**The Result.**—In the police court yesterday appeared A. Manson and Henry Sawmill on a charge of resisting a police officer. They had an interesting hand through whom they entered a plea of "not guilty." Judge Coffinbury held them in default of \$50 bail to appear to-day. This trouble arises from the row in the old Scandinavian house last Tuesday morning when Officer Stebbins arrested Victor Johnson for the alleged cutting of John Brinkman as reported in full in Tuesday's ASTORIAN. Stebbins had arrested Johnson, whereupon Manson and Sawmill took him away, when he ran, pursued by Officer Bousley, who finally captured him. Johnson was moved to the hospital, and is badly hurt; one bullet penetrated his body at the base of the spinal column and coming out at the groin. It is considered impossible for the unfortunate man to live. Brinkman, who had been badly cut out of danger yesterday.

**Yesterday's Storm.**—The wind and rain that lulled on Christmas awoke in greater fury yesterday morning and all day the storm blew furious from the south. The wind came in short strong gusts that played havoc with the few ladies and children that ventured out. Signs, fences, trees, chimneys, etc., received a severe shaking up, and travel was seriously interfered with. A pile driver near Devlin's cannery toppled, and one or two roofs suffered, but the casualties were light. In the stream, our sheltered harbor demonstrated its safety. The vessels simply put out an extra line and let the storm pipe on. At the cape the wind blew great gusts; the sea came in in immense green waves, and navigation of all kinds was stopped. Porpoises in immense schools came up in front of the city and sportively gambled the live-long day. As the short day darkened into night the wind whirled around to the southwest and roared at every crevice. At midnight the storm moderated, and about half past two this morning the parting clouds gave promise of a fine day.
