A REPLY TO "EXPORTER."

ASTORIA, Dec. 26. To the Editor of the Oregonian: In studying the comparative costs of loading vessels at Astoria we should be exact. It is not difficult to get at the cost of vessels loading at both Portland and Astoria, and the disbursement sheets are with the owners and agents.

I fear "Exporter" did not take the time to look at the disbursement sheets in his office, for he has underestimated the cost of bringing a vessel to Portland to load, and omitted very important items of expense. In the first place, he places the cost of towing the Ice King to Portland and return at \$400. The real cost would have been \$573 for this service, in accordance with the O. R. & N. Co.'s rate of towage. The lighterage would have been \$125 per ton on 800 tons to be lighterage. So we shall now have extra cost of loading Ice King at Portland instead of at Astoria. Towing up and down \$573 00 Pilotage up and down 96 00 Lighterage down at \$1.25, 800 tons, help taking ship up and down, average, 1,000 00 Four days' time of vessel (average) in going up to Portland from Astoria and back again, at the rate of 3 cents per reg. interest per day 447 44 Entire cost, total \$2,236 44

There are other items, such as risk to vessel, etc., that I have not included, but I think I have shown enough to prove that the Ice King or any vessel can make more money to stop at Astoria, and have the grain brought to her at Astoria in barges, than to go to Portland for the loading. Let "Exporter" turn to his books, and not state from memory, and add the cost of the ship's extra time at what it is reasonably worth, and I think he will find that "axioms" don't have much to do with this Portland-Astoria business. Figures obtained from exporters are a better guide, for they will not lie. But "Exporter" wishes the Columbia river improved. For what purpose? If the river was deepened so that the very deepest vessels could ascend to and descend from Portland with the greatest draft, it would still be cheaper to carry the grain to Astoria in large barges and steamboats, to meet the ships at Astoria and load them. My own experience is that grain can be carried from Portland to Astoria at fifty cents a ton. We carried in the barge "No. 1" at less cost than forty cents per ton. If "Exporter" with two or three others of the heaviest exporters of Portland will give us a contract to carry all their grain to Astoria for shipment at fifty cents per ton, I will agree that the facilities are ready for them within ninety days. Fifty cents per ton is, you will observe, only 1 1/2 cents per bushel.

"Exporter" has a parting shot at the "little town by the sea." This Astoria that he speaks of has a population of 6,000. It has twenty-four salmon canneries which packed last year one million and a half dollars worth of salmon. We have waterworks, gas-works, and a sawmill and box-factory, which has a capacity of 40,000 feet of lumber per day. Two more sawmills are now building here. One will cut 50,000 feet per day; the other will cut 20,000 feet per day. If it were not for the opposition of the holders of the land grant, we would have had a railroad long before this. If we only now succeed in getting this grant forfeited, our railroad will be begun in the spring. Astoria also has two daily newspapers and takes 240 copies of the daily Oregonian. Yours, CLATSOP.

Says the Independence, Oregon, West Side: It is rumored that Jay Gould has purchased the Tiebenor's interest in Port Orford, and that the deeds were executed and delivered last week. This comes pretty straight, and coupled with the fact that an agent of Gould's has been in this section for months, there may be something in it. A number of Northern Pacific and Short Line engineers are at work near the Malheur reservation, which geographically lies in the direct route from the present finished west end of the Oregon Short Line and Corvallis, Oregon.
