duce the number of boats for the season of 1884.

In order to bring the matter to a settlement one way or the other at once we enclose herein, a plan which we would be pleased to have you approve or disapprove, with reasons for disapproval if any, in writing, and return before February fet, 1884, to M. J. Kinney at Astoria."

HERE, THERE AND ELSEWHERE.

The project of cutting a canal through Nicaragua peninsula is reported to have failed.

The bodies of the victims of the Jeannatte arctic expedition arrived at Moscow last Monday. American residents placed flowers and wreaths upon the hearse.

In the senate last Monday Senator Slater presented a petition from citizens of Oregon and Washington Territory, pray-ing that lands granted the Oregon Cen-tral railroad be restored to the public domain; also lands granted to the Northern Pacific.

Antelope have recently been so plentiful between Green River and Granger, on the Union Pacific railroad, as to impede the Union Facine railroad, as to impede the passage of trains at times, a train to-day being obliged to come to a full stop. Owing to the snow in the mount-ains and foot hills, they congregate in large droves on the alkaii desert between the places named, as but very little snow ever lies in that locality.

The ship Juno, from Liverpool for Cal-cutta, foundered in the Mersey on the 28th, and all hands were lost. Many barges were sunk in the Mersey during the storm. At Newcastle-upon-Tyne the spire of All Saints church was badly damaged, and the roof partially destroyed. In Ireland a railway train was overturned near Londonderry. Sixty yards of embankments on the Northern railway were swept away.
