

Grubbing Stamps,

Mr, — of Lake Labish, was in Salem, and informed us that it pays to take newspapers. He recently read an item in a newspaper which saved him at least \$50. He had a lot of large fir stumps to be grubbed up, and had estimated that it would cost nim from three to four dollars each to have them taken out. Seeing an limited that it would cost nim from three to four dollars each to have them taken out. Seeing an item where Major Hallet recommended giant powder for the purpose of blowing out large stumps, he wrote to him and got full particulars. He finds that he can take out stumps sinds that he can take out stumps with giant powder for 75 cents each. For directions, just run a crow bar under the body of the stump, and place the giant powder there, connecting with the usual cap and fuse—then light the fuse and get out of the way. Three pounds will blow up the largest fir stump in Oregon, tearing up the side roots as far out as ing up the side roots as far out as they are large enough to raise the earth over them without breaking off, sending the whole in the air several yards and then it falls clear of everything, ready to be hauled off or burned. Giant powder can be pur-chased for 25 cents per pound, and we think it will be used a great deal soon and revolutionize the grubbing business, doing the work of many men, and aiding the farmer to clear his land at a reasonable cost.—Salem


