The secturer assumed in the latter part of her lecture the Socratic method of discussion, and propounded a series of questions that would be distrassingly difficult for any presumptuous opponent to answer. She paid particular attention to the recent pronunciamiento of Dr. Dix of Columbia College, New York, and in her expose of thet gentleman's fallacious statement; made new contributions to cause which she so ably advocates statistics in reference to co-educa tion were admirably prepared and forti-fied her position by their direct and con-clusive proof of her assertions. ### An Unusual Snow Fall.
