And they think it is far better for the publie to have a man make inquiry into current events and give an unbiased opinion of them, than to have one known to sell out whenever a purchaser can be found. There is evil enough in the world at the best, but it is not quite time to say that all men are liars-if they are paid for it.

THERE is trouble in Washington, and society circles are rent into factions as to who is the "first lady" of the republic.
