The church may hold firmly to the ideas which it believes to be essential to salvation, and which have been handed down from a venerable past, and yet adapt itself, in its practical work, to the changed condition of modern life. A wise development is just as necessary to its well being. and even its existence, as a wise conservatism. And if, as it claims, it has a message for the living men and women of to-day, it must in some way come to them with that message; for they may never come to it. Besides the old truths which it is set to guard, there are new and deep problems of life demanding solution, and upon the right solution of which depends the welfare of myriads of human beings. Who better than the church can help men to the right solution? It is therefore absolutely necessary that the clergy should be men of the world in the best sense of that muchabused phrase. They should know a great deal not only of the people of the first, but of the people of the nineteenth century. They should be acquainted not only with the speculations of the school-men, but also with the speculations of men and women who surround them. Thus, the church, though in a different way, may again become the power which it was in the so-called ages of faith. and represent not only the splendid achievements of a vanished past, but the more splendid triumphs of a living present.

"Is a year or two," says Mr. William H. Vanderbilt, our American ezar, "we may have no government, but we must have railroads." His opinion seems to be that while the government, state and national, is a mere bagatelle which the people can easily get along without, the railroads are the great controlling power the supremacy of which we must all acknowledge. It must be admitted that he has always acted on this peculiar Vanderbilt theory. But the ezar is wrong. The government is in no danger whatever. 


