News From Various Sources.

Public Land Grants.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—The committee on public lands to-day considered the further extension of the Northern Pacific land grant.

Anderson moved that all land contiguous to that portion of the road not constructed within the time specified by the act be declared forfeited.

Brents offered a substitute, declaring forfeiture of lands between Portland, Oregon, and continuing the remainder of the grant, on condition that the road be completed within two years from January 1, 1884, and that unsold lands should be sold to citizens or those who declared their intention to become citizens, in quantity not exceeding 160 acres, and at a price not exceeding \$2.00 per acre.

Scates offered an amendment, providing for forfeiture of the land alongside that portion of the road not finished to date.

Voting on the various propositions was postponed until to-morrow. Members of the committee express the opinion that the proposition of Scates will be passed. Before adjourning the committee agreed to report the bill for forfeiture of the land grant to the "backbone" road. Anderson was not present when the latter subject was voted upon Saturday. He was present to-day, and cast the deciding vote in the affirmative.

The senate committee on public lands held a meeting to-night at which a general discussion of the question of forfeiture of unearned railroad land grants was had. No conclusion was reached, as the committee finds the question a complicated one, which cannot be disposed of without considering various collateral questions; among other questions, the disposition of forfeited lands in the event of forfeiture being declared. In connection with the question of forfeiting the grant of lands to the Northern Pacific railroad, for which bills are pending in both houses of congress, the discovery has been made that the act of July 9, 1882, ratifying the agreement between the Northern Pacific company and the Crow Indians for the sale of a portion of the reservation of the latter for the use of the former, may be construed as a recognition by congress of the right of the Northern Pacific Railroad company to proceed with the construction of its line after the expiration of the time fixed by congress, in the act creating the company, for the completion of the road, and so may be used as an argument against the forfeiture of lands granted to the company. This bill passed the house without discussion under suspension of the rules, and does not appear to have been discussed much in the senate.

Spokane Falls and Coeur d'Alene Railway.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—In the senate this morning, Duff introduced a bill incorporating A. J. Brown, A. M. Cannon, A. L. Davis, H. L. Cummings, and O. F. Weed into the Spokane Falls and Coeur d'Alene Railway Company. The bill empowers the company to lay out and construct, equip, maintain and enjoy continuous railroad and telegraph lines from the city of Spokane Falls to Moscow, Idaho, and from the city of Coeur d'Alene, St. Mary's and St. Joseph, to near the sources of the same, and also railroad and telegraph lines from the city of Spokane Falls to Moscow, Idaho.

The Egyptian War.
CAIRO, Feb. 27.—The advance of English troops on Teb commenced before daybreak to-day. Two hundred and fifty men left the garrison at Trinitat, and a force of 3500 advanced to the attack. It is expected a battle will be fought about nine in the morning. The naval brigade joined Gen. Graham, with two nine-pounders. There is growing anxiety in Cairo about the result of the expedition, and less confidence that the English will be victorious. Black troops at Suakem have been found in communication with Ahmed Baroudi second in command under Osman Digna. Admiral Hewitt has forbidden them to leave camp, and stationed the gunboats Decoy and Sphinx so that their guns command the camp, with orders to open fire if there are any symptoms of mutiny.

Trinitat, Feb. 27.—The beach presents a lively appearance. The blue jackets, up to their necks in water, are landing stores and carrying soldiers through the surf. The Gordon Highlanders and Irish Fusiliers are advancing to occupy the fort erected by Baker Pasha. They waded bare-legged through the morasses which lie between the harbor and mainland. The distance to the fort is about eight miles. It was built February 2d to protect the guns while crossing the morasses. The rebels regard with exultation the landing of the force. They are convinced that Allah has sent all as a prey for them.

Khartoum, Feb. 27.—A man who left El Obeid ten days ago arrived this morning. He reports the garrisons of El Fasher, Darra Masteri and Foga still surrounded, while the garrisons of Enshanch and Ghazi Bay surrendered. He says there has been no fighting at Bahrgazelle. He saw three Englishmen at El Obeid who were captured at Khartoum. They were well treated. Missionaries were not molested. Mahdi has only a garrison at El Obeid. The Arabs have gone to their villages, but are under promise to assemble in case of war. Merchants are passing freely between here and Dongola.

Cairo, Feb. 27.—General Gordon reports that the Sudan is tranquil, and he is sending 800 invalids down the river.

Trinitat, Feb. 27.—The British camp is well protected with earth-

works. Spies report that Osman Digna is threatening Suakem. Admiral Courbet has returned to Suakem. Rebels are massing one mile from Fort Baker and firing at the British videttes, without, however, doing any harm. A Krupp gun has been mounted at the fort.

Suakem, Feb. 27.—A light took place to-day on the Berber road, nine miles from Suakem, between rebels and friendly tribes. Some of the latter cut their way through. Two thousand men, gathered from tribes numbering 10,000, wish to come in to-morrow. Friendly tribes desire to fight, if supported.

Suakem, Feb. 27.—The captain of the Egyptian steamer *Damenhauer* refused to obey to proceed with his vessel to Trinitat. Admiral Hewitt arrested the captain and placed his lieutenant in charge of the *Damenhauer*.

LONDON, Feb. 27.—According to mail accounts of Baker Pasha's defeat, fifteen Austrian, four German and four Swiss officers were killed.

Presidential Probabilities.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—A preposterous story was told here last week to the effect that Representative Holman had persistently refused to meet Mr. Charles A. Dana, editor of the *New York Sun*, and promoter of Holman's boom, on his recent visit to this city. An official contradiction of this story is authorized. Mr. Dana had the pleasure of making Mr. Holman's acquaintance at a dinner party given by Governor Dorsheimer of New York last week. The guests were the most distinguished members of the majority in the house. Knowing that Mr. Dana had never had the pleasure of meeting the "great protector" in person, the dinner was arranged to give the two gentlemen an opportunity for private conversation. One by one the members of the party left the table, until the host, Mr. Dana and Mr. Holman sat together over nuts and wine. Governor Dorsheimer at last arose to leave, surmising that the great editor and the distinguished "objector" would be glad of an opportunity to converse in private. Greatly to the astonishment of Mr. Dorsheimer, Mr. Holman did not avail himself of the opportunity that his host proposed to give, but promptly left the table, made Mr. Dana goodnight, and departed to his lodgings in the Hamilton house. Mr. Holman, it is said, thinks the editor of the *Sun* has been making game of him.

A Canvass of Five States.

ERIE, Feb. 27.—The *Dispatch* prints to-day the result of a careful canvass by means of correspondents of the 499 counties of the states of New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois, in regard to first and second choice of republicans for presidential candidates, the first choice for the president, the feeling toward President Arthur as a candidate, and the prospects of the party in the several states. These states were chosen because they contained, according to the Garfield vote of 1880, a republican vote to the number of 1,925,497. Hancock's votes numbering 1,785,693, and a population of 17,810,296, or over one-third of the total population of the union. The total result shows that Blaine is first choice as presidential candidate in 151 counties, Logan in 66, Edmunds in 33, General Sherman in 32, President Arthur in 23, John Sherman in 13, Postmaster General Gresham in 8, Harrison in 7, Lincoln in 5, Foster and Cullum each in 2, and Washburne, Miller and Evans each in 1. The details from which this total is made up presents some very interesting facts. Blaine has a strong lead in New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio and Indiana. Lincoln leads in the choice for vice president in all the above named states, also in Illinois. General satisfaction is expressed with Arthur's administration, but there are few advocates in any of the states for his re-election. Assurance is poured in that the republican party is thoroughly united, and ready to enter the political lists with its old time vigor.
