The new boat to be built by the Astoria The new boat to be built by the Astoria and Coast Transportation company will be pat into service immediately upon completion. The contract names July 2d, 1884 as the date on which she is to be finished. Her hull will cost \$15,750; her machinery, \$12,750. She will be 128 feet over all, 25 feet beam, and have a draft when loaded of about 10 feet. She will carry 200 tons of freight, have accommodistions for 12 passengers, and have considerable deck room, being in every way calculated for the comfort and convenience of patrons. 




