Hirsch, chairman of the state central committee. Henry Failing was elected chairman and W. G. Wright secretary.

At the meeting of the city council held on last Tuesday evening, ordinances were passed legalizing the collection of the estimated cost of improving West Ninth street and also of West Eighth and Genesee streets. These estimates were prepared by the city surveyor and we have no doubt they are as near correct as can be. The proposed improvement of the streets mentioned was by law advertised in THE ASTORIAN as properly required, and it was stated at the council meeting that not one of the property holders interested had sent in any remonstrance against it. This is gratifying and evidences the fact that, no matter what the cost, the owners of city lots eligible for building purposes and in close proximity to the business center, are anxious and willing to have the streets in front of them improved. The improvement will be somewhat less than when called upon to pay into the city treasury the amount which has been assessed against them. On West Eighth and Genesee the cost per lot was estimated at from \$245 to \$1,100. On West Ninth, from \$80 to \$500. Now the question arises will these property holders in view of these high assessments sanction any action of the council tending to increase the salary of already well paid officials, whereby the heavy taxation for city expenses may be rendered still more burdensome. The interests of hundreds of our citizens is involved in the question, as the improvement of many other streets, besides those mentioned, is already before the council, as well as, in the near future, the expense of constructing drains and sewers, all of which is necessary and for the general welfare of the whole community and not, as in other cases, for the benefit of local politicians.
